WIPAC is still on a high note! We welcomed and presented 21 pianists from different walks of life coming from Asia, Europe, North America and the US,

ages 34 to 84. Out of 21 at the preliminary round held at GWU Music Department B120, jurors chose 13 to advance to the Semi-Final Round (one more than I planned for), ending with 6 finalists for Sunday performance with the best concert grand piano ever, from Pianocraft.

My sincere thanks to the Competition Committee Chairs, Ben Cox and Elizabeth Cummings; to Clayton Eisinger, WIPAC President whose counsel and support, we value and the hard working volunteers, Diane, Mary, Carol and Walter. To Alix and Erik Sundquist, to Jean Wigham, the Davidsons and Mary Hood, hosts of pianists, most importantly the Board, my deep appreciation.

Special thanks to our Festival jurors headed by our Parliamentarian, Michael Davidson, who has chaired this competition 4 years running. Yes, we had a star, Ms. Susan Starr of Rutgers University and new additions such as pianists extraordinaire Jay Gottlieb from Paris and Larry Berman of Boston who studied with Nadia Boulanger. David Witten, Haskell Small, Eric Himy and Janice Weber, Malinee Peris completed the circle with our mainstay jurors headed by Dr. Raymond Jackson of Howard University, Prof. Tzvetan Konstantinov and Frank Conlon of GWU.

Press Jury has a new face, Henri Polgar of FestivalDC who is Executive Director of PaPa Council joining Cecelia Porter, former respected music critic of Washington Post.



WIPAC Festival of Music Piano Competition Enhancing the Lives of the DC Community. By Henri and Lisa Polgar

If a phrase could embrace the spirit of the 12th annual Festival of Music and Washington International Piano Artists Competition, it was that which Co-Chair of the event, Elizabeth Cummings, articulated in the closing remarks "... the festival is a great affirmation of great music and an omen for world peace. Where music is concerned there are no borders, there are no boundaries, and there are no nations."

Indeed, the six pianists who made it to the final round of the Competition took the stage in the ballroom of the Fairfax Hotel, after a very rigorous juried selection process of the 23 initial contestants who represented pianists from Europe, Asia, the US and Canada. It was Michael Slavin of the USA who was chosen as this year's first place winner; Daniel Chow of Canada received second place and Robert Finley from England was third place winner. The audience enthusiastically selected US pianist Dana Morgan for the Audience Award. She was also selected for the Press Award.

It is because of the commitment of WIPAC Founders and Co-Chairs Chateau and John Gardecki, together with the hard work of the WIPAC Board of Directors and the support of George Washington University, that the Festival continues to bring to the city of Washington, DC the talents of pianists from all over the world who perfect their pianistic talents whilst continuing other professional pursuits. This year the Competition Co-Chairs were Elizabeth Cummings and Ben Cox.

The keynote speaker, Lola C. Reinsch of the Reinsch and Pierce Family Foundation, and one of the Festival's major Benefactors, commented that the tradition of amateur pianists competitions is one that was started in Europe, a continent which has traditionally valued "amateur" pianists who are devoted to the highest standards of piano performance whilst at the same time choosing to earn his or her livelihood outside of the music profession.

Michael Davidson, the Chairman of the Jury stated, "This is an 'amateur' competition, and we use that term in the finest sense of the word, because believe me, every one of these competitors is



excelling in his own field and his own profession... one of our competitors teaches snowboarding in the Canadian Rockies, another is a professor in chemistry... we have an optical engineer who has designed some of the devices on the Hubble Space Telescope." And the quality of the piano performances equally demonstrated exceptional talent and ability.

Michael Slavin won first prize with his final selection, "Le Tombeau de Couperin" by Maurice Ravel. The work is known for

its harmonically complex structure and a challenge to the most accomplished pianist. Indeed, Michael Slavin's performance of the work confirmed his pianistic skills and accomplishments. Intended to evoke the style of the musical Baroque era of the 17th century, it was composed as a dedication to Ravel's friends who were killed in World War I (Ravel himself served as an ambulance driver). The suite has a bright and carefree flavor. When asked of this contrast with the music and the dedication, Ravel responded "The dead are sad enough in their eternal silence." Michael Slavin captured the poignant sadness with an interpretation that had profound depth. As to combining a career as an ophthalmologist and a pianist, Michael Slavin commented, "All the years that I was a physician I would play concerts at ophthalmology meetings and some of my fellow ophthalmologists who were some of the most wonderful chamber musicians also performed at our conventions."



Daniel Chow is the natural performer captivating the members of the audience who sat on the edge of their seats during his performance of Franz Liszt "Reminiscence of San Juan." He is the kind of pianist who in addition to his pianistic prowess has an engaging personality that captures your attention even before he plays a note. His performance of the Tchaikovsky-Pletnev "Concert Suites from The Nutcracker" in the previous semi-finalist rounds made him a sure winner from the start.

Music is the language of peace!

Robert Finley, a more introspective artist, equally captivated his audience with great pianistic ability, choosing to emphasize the lyrical quality of his musical palette. His interpretation of Billy Mayerl's "Jill All Alone" was deeply emotional. The Third Prize was given in honor of pianist Robert Pritchard, who was born in 1927 and was one of the first African-American concert pianists to gain viability on the world concert stage in the 1950s as a performer and recording



artists of classical music.

Of Dana Morgan, a jury member commented that her performance of the George Gershwin "Rhapsody in Blue" was so captivating that she retained the audience's interest and admiration with a dynamic performance, despite the fact that the piece has to overcome the obstacle of being so well known and heard so often. Indeed her performance of the Shubert Impromptu No 3 in B flat, demonstrated her understanding of

the nuances of the romantic period.

The distinguished jury included concert pianist and professor at the Curtis Institute, Susan Starr (a winner and judge in the Tchaikovsky Competition), Eric Himy, Frank Conlon, Jay Gottlieb, Raymond Jackson, Tzvetan Konstantinov, Laurence Berman, Malinee Peris, Haskell Small, Janice Weber and David Witten. On the press jury was Cecilia Porter, music critic of the Washington Post and Henri Polgar, contributor to FestivalDC.com



The 12th annual Washington International Piano Artists Competition was off to a great start today when pianist competitors from around the world participated in the preliminary round of the competition held at George Washington University.

Representing the USA, Canada, France, Germany, Japan and Taiwan pianists performed before a distinguished jury comprised of Dr. Raymond Jackson. concert pianist and professor of piano at Howard University; Tzvetan Konstantinov, concert pianist, professor at George Washington University and President of the International Leopold Godowsky Institute; Jay Gottlieb, concert pianist, composer and author; Frank Conlon, professor in the music department of George Washington University, and attorney Michael Davidson.

Madame Chateau Gardecki, founder and director of the Washington International Piano Artists Competition, graciously presided over the rounds introducing each performer.



Indeed, for music lovers and especially devotees of the classical piano repertoire, the WIPAC is a great opportunity to enjoy hours of wonderful piano performances. The next rounds will take place on August 1 at 1:20 pm at the George Washington University Music Department at 801 22 St, NW in Phillip Hall.

The Washington International Piano Artists Competition is one of the leading worldwide

events devoted to the "amateur pianist." These are musicians who have pursued their dedication to piano performance while working in other professions. Today an array of doctors, surgeons, attorneys, educators, railroad officer, scientists, engineers and entrepreneurs gathered to make wonderful music. Gerard de Botton, Casey Churko, Dana Morgan, Andrew Celentano, Daniel Chow, Neil McKelvie, Jeremias Mameghani, Michael Slavin and Andrew Celentano were the pianists that participated in the preliminary rounds. There is a sense of "grandeur" to the lives of these pianists who have developed expertise in their own professions as they preserved their dedication to the art of piano playing at a very high level. Although some contestants performed more successfully than others, they all succeeded in making "time stop" for their audience which is the sign of true artistry.

WIPAC continues to live up to its pledge to "creating a renaissance of interest in the Art of Piano Performance....making music flourish in our communities....promoting international friendship, and cultural understanding, through the arts of classical piano music." Hurrah for WIPAC.
