Lesson Outline Sample

Below is an outline to aid you in planning your lesson presentation. Each lesson is going to be different and may not fit into the sample. This is just a guide to help you plan—not a requirement and does not need to be turned into anyone. Keep age of your audience, length time available to you by classroom teacher, objective/topic of lesson, school policies, etc. in mind when planning your presentation.

Materials Needed for Lesson	Quantity	Description of Item
My Introduction <i>60 second “Who I am”</i>	<i>Introduce yourself to the class. Name & your background in agriculture</i>	
Lesson Purpose <i>60 seconds or less</i>	Today we are going to learn....	
Topic Background <i>2 minutes or less</i>	Give basic information about the agriculture topic your presentation is on. (i.e. introduce vocabulary specific to what you are going to present)	
Lesson Presentation <i>10-15 minutes</i>		
Activity Directions <i>3 minutes or less</i>	<i>Break directions down into steps. If doing stations have a card at each station with what they are going to be doing at that station so they can double check.—Some students will comprehend more easily if they can read the directions instead of only hearing</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <i>Check for understanding, ask a student to repeat back part of the directions—or do so as a class. “What are you going to do first?”</i> 	
Activity <i>10-15 minutes</i>	<i>Perform activity. Include clean-up time.</i>	
Wrap –Up and Reflection <i>2-3 minutes</i>	<i>How can they use what they learn in their daily life.</i> <i>May ask “Review” questions for students to share what they’ve learned.</i> <i>Have a closing statement.</i>	
Assignment <i>Optional</i>	<i>What do you want the students to do with the information you shared?</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ <i>The next time you go to the grocery store....</i> <i>Leave supplemental materials with the teacher</i>	
Teacher / School Follow-Up	<i>Send a thank you note or email to the teacher and/or the building principal for letting you come and share.</i> <i>Collect Evaluation from teacher and submit to Indianapolis office</i>
