In a way, I wish that I could write this column after the High Holydays in order to reflect a bit about what transpired both for me and, I hope, for many of you. Alas, the exigencies of the calendar (namely, the lead-time needed to produce this modest newsletter) require the timely submission of an article. So, instead, I want to use this opportunity to speak about two projects that I've been involved with.

Many of you know that I, together with my colleague, Joel Grishaver have, for the past five years, edited and produced a weekly fax/email/snail mail collection on *Parshat Hashavua*, called "Learn Torah With ...". It is written by hundreds of people from all denominations. At the end of each year, we publish the hardcover edition which contains all the articles (by *parashah*) along with comments that have come in by interactive email. Volume One appeared last year, Volume Two has just been issued (and is available from the office), and Volume Three is currently in production. "LTW" has been a unique voice in the world Jewish community, reflecting both an author and a subscription list that moved well beyond traditional groupings.

We've learned two things: that given the growth of the Internet, subscription-based electronic publications are no longer viable except in very specialized circumstances, and that our readership - especially our faculty- begged us not to stop. As of Simchat Torah, 5760, Torah Aura

JEWISH MEDITATION: AN IMPORTANT STEP IN DEEPENING JEWISH SPIRITUALITY

As a nation of priests, we are committed to Tikkun-Olam, to healing the world. Our tradition prescribes three paths to this healing - Torah, Avodah, and Gemilut Chasadim.

Torah refers to the path of learning. We are blessed to have a rich body of sacred texts to receive guidance in every aspect of life.

Gemilut Chasadim is the path of action - deeds of loving kindness. One of the distinguishing cornerstones in our tradition is that spirituality is grounded in action. It's not enough to have ideas and dreams of healing the world; we do it most concretely through our action.

Avodah is the path of worship - of prayer and meditation. Our tradition tells us that in order for us to understand the depth of the learning, and for our action to be truly healing, our consciousness must be pure. We need to learn and act from a deep experience of G-d, of Truth, not from intellectual ideas about spirituality.

Our liturgical prayer provides powerful doorways in to the experience of G-d, but most of us have never learned how to open them. Our Shabbat morning service can be an enjoyable time for us to come together in song, but it can also be a profound experience of Divine Presence, connection, and understanding. In order for prayer to be a doorway, we need to deepen our inner experience of the liturgy. Our sages teach us that this can be done through meditation.

Meditation has been a vital component of Jewish spiritual teachings for four thousand years. Traditionally this practice has been part of the "histar", or hidden tradition. At certain historic moments however, this hidden tradition was made available to the broad community - most notably during the Prophetic period, the Safed revival in Northern Israel in the 16th century, by the Baal Shem Tov in the late 17th century, and again today.

During the Holocaust, the majority of the world's Jewish meditation teachers and schools were destroyed, losing almost an entire piece of the tradition. It has taken fifty years for the surviving

teachers to transmit this type of wisdom to a generation of teachers competent in the tradition, yet able to use a modern idiom suitable for contemporary Americans.

Netivot Shalom offers the Meditative Minyan which meets from 9:30 am - 10:30 am on the third Shabbat of the month. The Minyan weaves Jewish meditation techniques and insights into the Shacharit service allowing its participants to engage deeply in the liturgy. The service ends after the Amidah so that people can join the rest of the congregation in the Torah service. The service is led by K'vod Wieder - member of Netivot Shalom and assistant director of Chochmat HaLev - a center for Jewish meditation here in Berkeley. We hope to see you there.

MY TRIP TO ISRAEL

So here I am writing on my airplane ride from New York to L.A. Just a few hours ago I got off the plane from Israel with the 117 people on my trip. I'll be home in another ten hours, and the five and a half weeks I spent in Israel will be behind me. I think back to the first time I heard about the Israel trip. It was in ninth grade on a Midrasha weekend. My older peers - who had just come back from the Israel trip - were excitedly telling us all about it. From then on it just kept building up to be bigger and bigger. For the next two years I planned and I planned on how I could get the money for such a worthwhile experience.

The cost of the five and a half week trip was \$4,375. The initial reaction my parents had was: "there is no way we can afford that." And the truth is, they really couldn't. However, it didn't mean I couldn't go. When I talked to Midrasha staff, parents of previous kids who went, and others, everyone said I could apply for a scholarship. Still it was hard to believe. I didn't give up though. I applied and received a scholarship that paid for over half the cost of the trip. Netivot Shalom gave me some money, and the Jewish Federation of the Greater East Bay gave the rest. It surprised me, and my parents even more. Because of the people who give money to this Israel fund, many kids who couldn't afford the trip were able to go on this amazing adventure.

My main point to this writing is to give something back. I want to encourage everyone who feels they can to look into just giving a little bit of money to this cause. It matures young people an incredible amount. We are immersed into the Israeli culture deeply. We went through a week participating in the Israeli army; a week on a kibbutz with kids our age, and learned about all the peace problems. We spent a one and a half weeks in Jerusalem where we learned all of its history. We were in the North, in Haifa, Masada, Tel-Aviv, the Desert, Eilat and so much more. We became an amazing community and will never lose each other. This is an incredible trip and should not be missed. From now on, I will be doing my best to give back what was given to me. Help me and every other teenager. Make sure your kids go to Israel, and if you can, help others go too.

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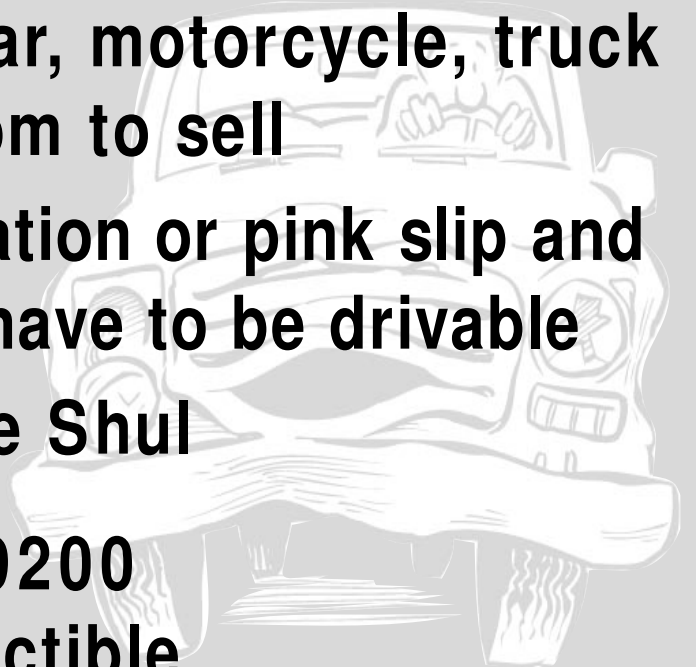
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THE BAR OR BAT MITZVAH!

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HERE ARE A FEW THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT HAVING YOUR SIM CHA AT NETIVOT SHALOM:

- It is a synagogue policy to have a child's bar/bat mitzvah as soon after the child's 13th Hebrew birthday as possible.
- In order to have a bar/bat mitzvah at Netivot Shalom a child must have had five years of formal Jewish education and enroll in the Amitim program.
- In order to enroll your child in our Amitim (B'nai Mitzvah) program your family must have been a member of Netivot Shalom for at least one year prior to enrollment.
- Amitim is a year-long commitment. Students are expected to complete the program even if their bar/bat mitzvah falls during the amitim year.
- Amitim grads are expected to continue their education at Midrasha throughout high school.
