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### 66th Annual Custer County Fair

The Fair is fast approaching! The dates are July 15-21, 2013. That is (counting from June 1) only 45 days!!!!!! Please review the newsletter for any information that may pertain to you. Also, PROMPTLY open and respond to any mail that you get from the Extension Office. Entry forms will be mailed out to all 4-H and FFA families. Please fill them out. You may mail the entry forms back to the Extension Office, OR call 783-2514 OR e-mail to the email address above. YOU MUST RESPOND BACK WITH THE INFORMATION REQUESTED BEFORE 4 P.M. ON FRIDAY, JUNE 14<sup>TH</sup>.

The Extension Office will move out to the fairgrounds and set up on Saturday, July 13<sup>th</sup>. We will not have the office in the courthouse open during the week of fair.

### **4-H Project Requirements**

The Custer County Fair follows the Colorado State Fair requirements on all your indoor projects: archery, foods, cake decorating, gardening, leadership, robotics, sportfishing, rocketry, visual arts, photography, woodworking, entomology, and scrapbooking. The 2013 CSF requirements are posted on the State 4-H website @ www.colorado4h.org. You can find your requirements, e-records, tip sheets, score sheets, etc. on this website.

#### **Record Books**

All 4-H and FFA livestock (market, breeding, dairy), horse, dog & small animal record books are to be turned in to the Extension Office **no later than 4 p.m. on Friday, July 26<sup>th</sup>.** You must turn in your record book to complete your project. If you miss the deadline, your record book WILL NOT be eligible for judging to compete for CASH PRIZES!

### 4-H General & Consumer Science Record Books

All 4-H General and Consumer Science record books (photography, foods, woodworking, rocketry, gardening, shooting sports, visual arts, sportfishing, cake decorating, ceramics, etc.) must be turned in with your projects on Monday, July 15 from 7-8 a.m. After 8 a.m., your record book will be considered late and points will be deducted from the score sheet.

Questions likely to be asked during the interview process for your indoor projects are:

- 1. Why did you take this project?
- 2. What did you think you might learn in the project?
- 3. How much experience did you have before you started this project?
- 4. What did you like the most about the project?
- 5. What did you like the least about the project?
- 6. What did you do for the first time in this project?
- 7. Who helped you decide what your project would be?
- 8. Where did you get help?
- 9. What new things did you learn?

- 10. How will you use what you have learned?
- 11. What would you like to learn next?
- 12. If you were to do the project again, would you do anything differently?
- 13. How do you feel your project could be improved?
- 14. Technical questions about your project: about your sewing machine, completing your project, what tips you used for your cake, how high your rocket flies, etc.

We will have fair schedules available for you to send to your buyers, families and friends. Pick one up for yourself so you will always know what is going on and when.

### **2013 Fair Livestock Weights**

Market livestock weights must fall in the following weight range in order to sell at the Livestock Sale:

Beef - minimum 1000 lbs., no maximum

Sheep – minimum 105 lbs., no maximum

Swine - minimum 220 lbs., 290 maximum

Goats - minimum 55 lbs., no maximum

Remember that the scales will not be available to preview weights on the day of the official weigh-in for the fair. The scales will be unlocked and ready to go on Wednesday, July 17<sup>th</sup> @ 5 p.m.

### **Livestock Sale Buyers**

All 4-H and FFA livestock project members need to start working on contacting their previous buyers. Also try to visit with any new businesses or individuals who may become new buyers. Your contacts with these people and businesses help to promote their continued support of the 4-H and FFA Livestock Sale.

### **Fair Livestock Pictures**

All 4-H and FFA market livestock exhibitors are required to pose with their animals to take a picture to be given to their buyers after the Market Livestock Sale. The Custer County Livestock Sale Committee is once again offering the chance to get access to make extra copies of those pictures. You may request the e-file copy of your pictures for a donation of \$5 each. Please call the Extension Office to request your copy.

### **Fairgrounds Clean Up Scheduled**

All 4-H and FFA members are to participate in the clean up in order to get the fairgrounds ready. Mark your calendar NOW and plan to be there – Saturday, July 13 beginning at 8:00 a.m. A sign up sheet will be your proof of participation. Bring your rakes, shovels, weed eaters, mowers, fuel, etc. to help get things ready. If you are unable to attend on Saturday, you will be given some clean up duties to do during the fair.

## **June 2013**

**Westcliffe Farmer's Market** - The kick off market will be held on June 12<sup>th</sup> at Jess Price Park in Westcliffe from 9am to 1pm and run every week through September. Lippis Farms of Florence will anchor the market this year. There will be new vendors as well as long-time favorites, providing a diversity of local produce, herbal products, baked goods, live plants, and unique crafts. All are invited to come and support tour growing local food economy and make this the best season yet for the Westcliffe Farmers Market.

## Study reveals opportunities for Colorado agriculture

A newly released Colorado State University study reveals various linkages that tie Colorado's agriculture industry together, and provides an opportunity to build bridges between the different commodities and communities that make up Colorado agriculture, including the food, beverage and green industries.

### Value Chain a collaborative effort

"The Value Chain of Colorado Agriculture" is a joint project funded by CSU's Office of Engagement and the Colorado Department of Agriculture. The study maps the economic relationships among the various sectors of Colorado's agricultural industry, which is one of the largest contributors to the state's economy.

"The value chain analysis is exciting for Colorado's agricultural industry," said Colorado Commissioner of Agriculture John Salazar. "We can now base decisions that shape our future on comprehensive information encompassing all of Colorado's agriculture industries instead of individual commodities. This provides everyone from consumers, to producers, to policy makers the opportunity to form decisions based on a common starting point."

## Agriculture touches many

Colorado agriculture, which annually contributes at least \$40 billion in sales to the state's economy, is often seen as a collection of separate commodity groups. The value chain study makes connections among the sometimes disparate industries and sectors that nonetheless share common resources, constraints and opportunities.

"Colorado's agriculture industry is vital to the economic health of Colorado and the way of life cherished by Coloradans," said President Tony Frank. "Because we all have an shared interest in the viability of Colorado's agriculture, it is imperative that we have a strong, well-researched understanding of the available resources, challenges, and opportunities related to Colorado's land and water. This value-chain analysis represents Colorado State's continued effort to help position Colorado agriculture for a sustainable success for years to come."

Five broad segments were included in the study: agricultural inputs; primary agricultural production; agricultural output marketing, processing and manufacturing; wholesaling; and retailing. In all, more than 125 distinct economic activities, sub-sectors and industries were tied to the value chain.

"This study reveals that our connections to Colorado agriculture are both broad and deep," said Lou Swanson, vice president for the <u>Office of Engagement</u>. "The value chain focuses on these interconnections, leading to growth opportunities and innovations in agriculture and other sectors of our economy."

## New way of talking about agriculture

Results of the value chain can aid with strategic decision-making on issues ranging from workforce, to natural resources, to regulatory policies. In the end, the study is designed to promote additional conversations that can result in calculated investments and innovative solutions for Colorado agriculture.

"There are only a few regions in the U.S. with a comparable confluence of agriculture, research, technology, and urban resources; bringing together farmers and foodies; bringing together farm sector investors and venture capitalists to enable them to learn from one another," said Gregory Graff, associate professor in the <u>Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics</u> and the lead author on the study. "This overlap of agriculture on a significant scale and scope and a high-tech urban corridor holds all of the ingredients necessary to spawn an innovation cluster."
