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
The Department of Health has spent its summer listening. A medley of concerns – from professional bodies, from public health experts, and prominent amongst them Dr. Clare Gerada from the Royal College of GPs – have been voiced about the Coalition government's Health Bill. The sacred NHS principle of free and fair access at the point of need is invoked by the government's critics, and defended by the Health Secretary, with equal passion. For us the question is a different one. Long the Cinderella even within the mental health sector are we now an equal priority for GPs?

Who and what should guide the clinical commissioning decisions in the new GP-led NHS? We are delighted that Dr. Helen Lester, a GP who has been closely involved with the Quality Outcomes Framework that forms part of the GP contract, and Sir Mike Rawlins, the Chair of NICE, will be giving keynote presentations to start day 1. No one is better placed to help orientate us to the features of the new commissioning landscape, and the evidence that must underpin GP-led commissioning, than these key speakers. 50 Years On from Enoch Powell's famous 'water towers' speech Paul Burstow, Minister for Care Services, Dame Sheila Shribman and Peter Fonagy, National IAPT Adviser, and Peter Kinderman from the British Psychological Society will each offer keynote sessions that focus on the challenge ahead if we are to reach older people, children and young people, and people with serious mental illness, respectively.

Day 2 approaches the subject of mental wellbeing from another direction. What is the relationship between economic growth, subjective wellbeing and reducing national levels of depression - so that people are less dependent on welfare benefits? Sir Gus O'Donnell, the Cabinet Secretary, launched the first national survey of wellbeing earlier this year. Lord Freud, the Minister for Welfare reform, has the task of getting the long-term unemployed back to work. Their keynotes on day 2 will address how the Coalition expects us to help towards improved 'public mental health'. Bruce Calderwood, Director of Mental Health, will close the conference setting out next steps for implementing the government's mental health strategy, and its comprehensive talking therapies plan.

Each year, your support for this conference renews our collective commitment to the New Savoy Declaration. At our Evening Reception this year, we hope to take that commitment a significant step further. When the devil of year-on-year efficiency savings drives, whose needs must: will the principle of free and fair access to a comprehensive range of psychological therapy services be defended? Or will it be a case of 'last in, first out'? In welcoming you to Savoy Place, you will be standing firmly in support of the former. Do not stand by and watch the latter! "Choice and personal responsibility have always been at the heart of what we offer in Talking Therapies. But how we develop a Payment for Outcomes Framework that now balances patient choice with clinical collaboration and fair competition will determine whether evidence based psychological therapies should keep their place at the heart of a modern healthcare system."
