

#### **Sundance Farm Hosting First Horse Trial**

If you'd love to spend some time in the countryside watching galloping horses maneuver a cross country jumping course, you need to clear your calendar for September 27 & 28th.

For the first time, ever, Plymouth will be the host site of a USEA recognized horse trial, the triathlon of the horse world. On Saturday, the 27<sup>th</sup>, horses from around Wisconsin and Illinois will be competing in the first phase, dressage, starting at 8:00am. Horses and riders will be riding specific maneuvers to demonstrate their abilities in control, suppleness and communication. This part of the competition will take place at the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds.

After riders have ridden their dressage test, they will make their way to Sundance Farm, about 4 miles away, to get their first look at the cross

country course. The horses are not permitted to see the course until they are galloping around it, so riders must assess all obstacles and terrain beforehand so they can pilot their horse safely through it, within the specific optimum time allowed. Penalties are incurred for exceeding the time, refusing a fence, or going off course. The obstacles for cross country include things like banks, that the horses must jump down or up, a water obstacle, and ditches. Other obstacles are mini log cabins, cord wood piles, log piles, a wedge, fallen trees, benches, and many more. This course will be testing the bravery, endurance, and skill of the horse and rider.

RESTERER SCHNELLS:

"We have built numerous jumps that replicate everyday items in Sheboygan County and are quite excited to see how the competitors handle the wheelbarrow jumps and the Swiss Cheese Wedge" writes Kelly Mahloch, organizer and owner of Sundance Farm. "This is the most popular phase of the horse trial. Horses

and riders will be decked out in matching colors and are a real treat to watch galloping the course". This phase starts at 9:00 am on Sunday

Shortly after cross country, competitors will be maneuvering through stadium jumping on the farm grounds by noon. Stadium jumping is a brightly colored course of jumps that can easily be knocked down, testing the horse's carefulness and obedience. The course can involved sharper turns, wide jumps and tall skinny ones. Causing just one jump pole to fall down can mean a competitors placing dropping from first place to 9<sup>th</sup> in one easy step.

Last year, the farm and volunteers ran a mock horse trial to work out the bugs and get ready for the nationally recognized horse trial this year. "We plan to make it an annual event and hope to get community support for this exciting venue"

Anyone interested in watching the horse trial is welcome to arrive early and see it before the horses are on course. That way you can decide which jumps you would like to watch.

To get to the course come to W6224 Woodland Road, Plymouth. There will be a show office with information about the event as you come onto the grounds. Activities are expected to be finished by 3:00 pm.

#### **JCDHA** by Jackie Schuster JCDHA secretary




The Jefferson County Draft Horse Association was organized in 1985. Our mission statement is "The association is organized for the purpose of promoting the draft horse and the preservation of farm technology." The club name belies our actual geographic membership. We have members as far removed from Jefferson County as Wisconsin Dells to Grays Lake, Illinois and communities in between. The club organized with a small core of six to eight families and has grown to over membership units in recent years.

Some of our events include exhibiting at Midwest Horse Fair, Jefferson County Fair, sleigh rides, wagon trains,



trail rides, field days, fair readiness, farming demonstrations, obstacle course, barefoot pulls, parades, Old World Wisconsin and selections of an ambassador.

We are at Old World Wisconsin for the Rituals of Spring, May 17-18 plowing, Laura Ingalls-Wilder for threshing and Autumn on the Farm, September 20-21 and October 18-19 plowing and logging.



Jefferson County Draft Horse Association has been the grateful recipient of the Wisconsin Horse Council grant. These funds have enabled us to carry out our appearances at Old World Wisconsin. Every spring, summer and fall we

plow, disk, drag, plant the field and harvest the crops. There are also rides in the Omnibus that is pulled by Clydesdales or Percheron horses. The fall demonstrations have been expanded to two weekends because of the increase of visitors during our demonstrations. We receive no compensation from Old World Wisconsin, other than a delightful lunch, so the Wisconsin Horse Council funds have been critical to us to continue these education events. We use these funds primarily to help out the teamsters with money for fuel. This has made it possible for many of them to participate. We encourage you to join us each spring, summer and fall.

Our source of funds is our affordable family dues and selling raffle tickets for a filly that we giveaway the last day at the Jefferson County Fair. We usually donate to Johnson Creek Library, Wisconsin State 4-H Horse Show, Watertown and Jefferson Equestrian Teams, youth classes at area fairs, to the Jefferson County Fair for the draft horse arena and the Wisconsin State Horse Council scholarship.

Each year we choose an Ambassador who represents us at public events. Our representatives have been both female and male between the ages of 13 and 21, who are chosen every year based upon an essay submission.

#### **Animals at Large**

Often there is confusion surrounding loose animals such as livestock as to the extent of town, county sheriff and private citizen responsibility. Actually, all three such actors are required to play certain roles when it comes to livestock at large. (This article on Wis. Ch. 172 does <u>not</u> cover dogs; they have their own separate laws largely in Ch. 174.) There is no town or village board, or town chairperson or village president duty in the statutes to chase down and capture loose animals. Instead, the below is how it really works.

#### Animals on the highway

The county sheriff should be called to write a ticket to anyone whose animal runs at large on a highway. § 172.015. Running at large is not an orderly animal crossing from one side of the highway to another. A town could also adopt this statute locally if it is willing to take on the expense of enforcing such an ordinance. The owners of animals are liable for damages that the animal might cause, not the municipality.

Wisconsin's agricultural fencing law in Ch. 90 requires a line fence whenever at least one of two neighbors has either grazing animals or crops. § 90.03. However, there is one big exception to the neighborly lot line fence: when one of the two parties is the state government or any municipality those entities cannot be forced to build a fence. Only with the agreement of your town or village will your municipality be responsible for any fences or costs related to them. § 90.035. This applies to town or village owned land, such as a park or where the hall sits, and also to the public highway right of ways. It would be prohibitively expensive for e.g. a town to build and maintain fences along all of its highway right of ways. Therefore, it is generally the sole responsibility of an animal's owner to ensure that they have appropriate enclosures such as fencing, even if along public highway right of ways.

#### Not quite lions and tigers and bears, but still . . .

Some animals are considered so dangerous that they are required to never be at large: stallions over one year old; bulls over six months old; and boars, rams and billy goats over four months old. § 172.01. Owners of these animals are always liable for them if they get out and cause damages, even if it was not the owner's fault and they had tried to enclose them.

The animals listed above can be captured by anyone if found running at large. § 172.02. What follows next is the process of "distraining" the animals. "Distraining" means essentially that the finder can hold the animals as collateral unless and until the finder's damages and costs are paid by the owner. Generally no one is entitled to just destroy a loose animal.

Notice of distrained animals must be given to the owner if known. If the owner is unknown, notice is made to the town clerk who, if an animal is valued at over \$50, must make a Class III notice with certain details required by statute and also provide a copy to the county clerk for filing. §§ 172.02 & 172.03. The actual value of the animal is set by a disinterested appraiser that the town chair or village president appoints for the task. § 172.04.

If the owner turns up within 90 days of the notice and sufficiently proves ownership of the animal(s), that person can reclaim the animal after paying to the finder all damages caused, the finder's costs of keeping the animal and a \$5.00 forfeiture. If the parties cannot agree on the figures a request is made to the town chair or village president who settles the matter. If costs are due in excess of an animal's value that excess amount becomes a lien on the animal.

If the owner never turns up and the animal(s) are individually appraised for not more than \$10 in worth the finder becomes the absolute owner of each such animal. Any animal appraised at over \$10 is sold at public auction by either the sheriff or any constable in the county, if any. After deducting finder's charges and costs any remaining amount is split between the finder and the town or village treasury. § 172.06.

#### For all other animals:

In addition, any landowner who finds any type of animal on their property doing damage to the premises may capture the animal, even if that is done in immediate pursuit of it as it escapes the property. § 172.51(1). So this and the following statutes concern all livestock-type animals other than stallions, bulls, boars, rams and billy goats of sufficient age.

If the owner of the animal captured is both known and known to reside within the same county then notice must be given to the owner providing certain details. § 172.51(2) & (3). If the owner is unknown, or known to live in a different county, no notice has to be given. Either way the finder contacts the town chair or village president who then appoints three landowners of the municipality to act as appraisers. §§ 172.51(4) & (5).

The appraisers work to set the value of the damages done to the premises and line fence, if any, determine the finder's costs of keeping the animal and the appraisers' own fees. § 172.52. If the owner desires to recover the animal he or she will have to pay these costs as they are conclusively determined by the appraisers before the animal may be recovered.


Otherwise, the animal may be delivered to a pound where the poundmaster will sell the animal. §§ 172.53 & 172.54. In the likely case that your area does not have a pound, some other suitable enclosure can be used and the sheriff or any constable in the county is authorized to sell the animal. § 172.55. In either case the sale is after six days with a brief public notice made first.


Proceeds from the sale go towards the costs of everyone involved. If there is any remaining money it is paid to the owner of the animal if that person is known. If the owner is unknown the money is given to the town or village for safekeeping. The owner has up to six years to request the money from the municipality, which in that case must be paid back less a 2% fee. § 172.56. If a longer period of time elapses the municipality can keep the money.

#### Conclusion

Although the laws themselves seem quite ancient, by the statute book at least, the above summarizes how the relative participants share in the obligation to deal with animals at large

### WISCONSIN DRESSAGE & COMBINED TRAINING ASSOCIATION CENTRAL CHAPTER NEWS Sharon Johnson

On February 9<sup>th</sup>, the Central Chapter hosted an Integrative Medicine Seminar in Westfield, Wisconsin, with Dr. Michelle Weidenkopf. We had a great turn out with 18 people attending.

Dr. Weidenkopf gave a wonderful presentation on how Western Medicine (regular veterinary medicine) and Holistic Medicine can be used together to take care of some of our horses medical problems. She talked about how important proper hoof balance, dental balance, and proper saddle fit is for our horses' healthy body mechanics. She also uses chiropractic and acupuncture as a treatment option in her practice. We cannot thank her enough for donating all of the proceeds from this seminar to our Central Chapter.

After the seminar, Central Chapter held it's first meeting of 2014. We discussed some clinic options for 2014. We took suggestions from members, on what they might like to have, and some of the ideas were clinics with Dressage rider and competitor, Shelly Reichert, an October Dressage clinic with Megan Dischler and a jumping clinic with Clare VanderWoude. Dates and locations to be announced when all details are finalized.

Other ideas from members were a Learn how to call a Dressage test /Scribe for a judge seminar, a lunge lesson demo after a meeting and a braiding/show grooming demo. A possibility for 2015, would be a combined traditional/western/cowboy dressage show.



**Cowboy Dressage™in Wisconsin** The Wisconsin Western Dressage club (WWDC) is a non-profit organization with an educational mission on improving horsemanship through the use of Cowboy Dressage™. The WWDC has created a series of Educational events to help riders of all ages and skill sets create an enriching partnership with their equine. We invite you to learn more and participate in our efforts to create better riders for our horses.

Cowboy Dressage (CD) is the creation of Eitan Beth-Halachmy. It is not to be confused with Western Dressage as the two are very different things. From CowboyDressage.com, "Soft Feel (or Fresh Rein) is the guiding principle of Cowboy Dressage™. It is a wordless, intimate and for some a spiritual communication within the partnership between horse and rider. Soft feel is not only sending messages but having the sensitivity and awareness to feel and receive the message the horse sends back. The timing and use of the Release, Relaxation, Preparation and Execution are the basic fundamentals of Soft Feel. Since Soft Feel is the mission of Cowboy Dressage™ it will be scored with emphases on lightness, harmony, finesse and partnership as a priority. Balance, cadence, carriage, control, and performance are additional areas the horse and rider will be judged and scored.®" Cowboy Dressage has its own 20m x 40m Court that is based on perfect geometry with letters spaced on 5m and 10m increments. Eitan designed the court with shorter intervals to better accommodate Quarter Horses, Arabians, Gaited breeds, Morgans and many other stock breeds way of travel. The shorter intervals make for extra challenges and demand more maneuverability from the horse. The use of 16 letters means more transitions and maneuvers are possible. Cowboy Dressage is to be scored with emphasis on lightness, harmony and partnership as a priority. Balance, cadence, carriage, control, and performance are additional areas the horse and rider will be judged and scored.

"Western Dressage is no different from Classical Dressage. The gaits for Western Dressage parallel those of traditional dressage, allowing for the fact that Western Dressage is suited for a different conformation and type of horse, generally speaking.", states WDAA Advisory Member, Jec Ballou. The judging is based foremost on the horses movement, followed by the horses willingness to move forward, its submissiveness and finally the riders positioning and use of aids. Western Dressage tests are to be Judged by USEF judges in either the large or small arena.

To put it simply "C In competition, Cowboy Dressage will reward Soft Feel and Partnership first, while Western Dressage will reward the horses movement first.

The WWDC is working on changing its name to Wisconsin Cowboy Dressage as we feel Cowboy Dressage is about the everyday rider. CD uses competition not as an end goal but as a way for participants to get together and celebrate their accomplishments. CD Tests are designed to help riders train their horse for the task at hand, whether that is cattle work, trail riding, obstacles or other competitive venues. The goals and training techniques are influenced by both the Spanish Riding School and Vaquero cowboys of the Old West. Riders are asked to demonstrate their "Soft Feel" by the sensitivity to the leg, seat and weight aids and are asked to ride with the goal of self carriage as evident through some slack in the rein. Soft Feel and partnership are Cowboy Dressage's most important training and judging objectives. Regardless of age, breed or skill set, WWDC is encouraging riders to make Cowboy Dressage their daily practice of putting the horse first, allowing them to create a deeper harmony and partnership with their equine friends. The idea and practice of Soft feel isn't a new one, it has been around since the days of Xenophon. What is new is the creation of a competition that encourages and rewards Soft Feel, partnership and try.

Cowboy Dressage<sup>™</sup> is on FIRE. The WWDC has members in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois and Iowa and is setting the stage for riders to participate in Cowboy Dressage through demos, trail gatherings, judging and horsemanship clinics. The goal of all of these venues is to educate riders to help them deepen their partnership with their horse to allow them to enjoy participating in various equine events and activities around the state. The WWDC fully supports and promotes Cowboy dressage as all breeds can perform these movements. WWDC clinics will focus on teaching riders how to enhance the quality of their horses movement, develop suppleness and create a two way street of



communication. The appeal of CD is its inclusion of all breeds and the ability to foster a spirit of camaraderie. Riders are allowed to move at their own pace and will find a CD test for every ability.

The WWDC is leading the way in the Mid-west by hosting clinics with the founder of Cowboy Dressage™ and members from Cowboy Dressage World. With 2014 being the year of the horse, the WWDC has lined up clinics to cover the Judging and riding of CD in May, Vaquero Traditions and Horsemanship in June and top the year off in September with a repeat appearance of the cr″8″tor of Cowboy Dressage, Eitan Beth-

Halachmy. In addition to the WWDC Educational Series, the club offers smaller clinics through our Sanctioned Instructors. 

Evidences of Insurance may not to be posted on websites or reproduced in any fashion without written consent from Equisure.

How would this insurance apply if I have homeowners insurance? This policy is excess over any other valid and collectible underlying insurance. If you have underlying insurance, such as homeowners insurance, this policy is excess over that insurance. If you have no other underlying insurance this policy would become primary.

I am a trainer and run a horse breeding operation, does this insurance cover me? No. Insurance coverage for businesses and business related activities are excluded. If my horse is boarded away from my residence, do I have coverage? Yes. You are covered for equine related incidences away from your residence for which you are personally liable or negligent.

If I lend my horse to someone to ride, am I covered? Yes. You are covered for bodily injury and/or property damage for an equine related incident you are held legally liable for.

**Is my horse covered if it dies?** No. This policy does not provide animal mortality coverage for horses you own. **Horse Mortality Insurance** can be purchased by calling Equisure (800-752-2472) or email **www.equisure-inc.com**.




