HopeTree Family Services provides residential care to at-risk youth as well as adults with developmental disabilities. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. No discrimination will take place on the grounds of race, color, sex, or other classification protected by law. All children will have equal access to nutritious meals in accordance with federal law and USDA policy.

The Developmental Disabilities Ministry shall develop, carry out, and regularly monitor policies and procedures governing discrimination in the provision of services to adult residents with developmental disabilities. HopeTree Family Services shall comply with all state and federal laws, including any applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 USC 2101 et seq.), prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, ethnicity, age, sex, disability, or ability to pay.

WOODS


HopeTree congratulates two young men who recently earned their high school diplomas from the Wilderness Outdoor Opportunity Discovery School (WOODS) in Craig County.

Arthur came to WOODS because his troubles in school stemmed from associating with the wrong people. After 11 months at WOODS, Arthur now understands the importance of associating with friends who will support him in productive, positive ways rather than encourage him to follow them into trouble. While at WOODS he became determined enough to apply himself to his studies so that he has graduated

with his high school diploma as a 16-year-old. Arthur's key to success was realizing he could make his own path through life instead of following others'.

Arthur has returned home to live with his mother. He plans to enroll in an apprentice program with a company in his hometown.

Ty came to WOODS because his family knew he needed a highly structured environment to overcome his personal challenges. As a result of the WOODS program's structure, Ty completed an enormous amount of school work using Independent Studies as a platform to earn his high school diploma.





Ty completed his 12th grade English class in record time for WOODS. He also achieved the highest score on the end of class test ever recorded at the program.

Ty has transferred to a less restrictive group home/independent living setting where he can continue to develop his personal living and academic skills.

Arthur and Ty were able to make such great academic progress due to WOODS' small class sizes and unique school environment.




