


### **"BOOKING 2014"**

"There are so many things Jesus did. If every one were written, the world could not contain the books." John 21:25

Call it book providence, whatever, the right book showing up at the right time; it happened again. The Books That Mattered: A Reader's Memoir was a birthday gift from friends. About my age, Alabama author Frye Gaillard recounts, groups, connects a broad swath of books he read early and along the way up to now, some to return to and read again. I nodded at the ones I've read; was a bit dropped-jawed at ones I'd missed, or whose depth I'd missed.

No one can grow up in Alabama without dealing with how race interlaces our reality. Gaillard revisits the background of To Kill A Mockingbird, the likely connections with the infamous Scottsboro Boys case, the price Athens Judge Horton paid for seeking to rule justly. Gaillard moves forward to



Birmingham writers Diane McWhorter's Carry Me Home journalism and Sena Jeter Naslund's novel The Four Spirits, fine efforts to tell the story of the church bombing and the bigger picture. He recounts an interview with Cynthia Wesley's father several years later, an amazing man with suffering-burnished forgiveness and hope.

Gaillard goes far and wide. I didn't get all he sees in Robert Penn Warren's All The King's Men, when I read it as a Birmingham-Southern freshmen. I may revisit. He touches on the enjoyable stories of veterinarian James Herriot, southern teacher become writer Clyde Edgerton. He goes into the dark of Ann Frank's diary and life, John Hersey's Hirsoshima, and concentration camp survivor Elie Wiesel's Night. I've added to my to-be-read stack Geraldine Brooks historical novel, Year Of Wonders. And hey, I have not come close to citing the books known and new to me that Gaillard touches on in 200 delightful pages.

Gaillard suggests people read to find escape from reality, enjoyment, or "something that will touch the heart". For me, all of the above, but heart mainly, often an expected fun book surprisingly comforts/discomforts my heart. As a person and pastor: I read to make sense of life; see glimmers of God's light that shines in the glory, monotony, and tragedy of it all; try not to bore you or waste your unrepeatable life time when you sit through my sermons. Like John Wesley (yes, I know you know John Wesley, and I am no John Wesley) "I am a man of one book" who, like him, reads all I can to read/understand that one book and mystery who permeates our birthing, breathing, dying from whom all of it flows and returns.

Another providential find, new author to me is a young Florida writer Michael Lister, youngest person in Florida history to be a prison chaplain: mysteries, a book about Jesus, about movies and others. In The Meaning of Life in the Movies, he quotes Thomas Carlyle. What we become depends on what we read after all the professors have finished with us. The greatest university of all is a collection of books.
