I had heard the news reports back in 2007 about Michael Vick and his 'friends' and about some of the ways they treated their dogs besides the dogfights but I have to admit I wasn't ready to know more. I didn't think I could handle it so I stuck my head in the sand. I hoped Vick would get his just desserts but after the verdict, I moved on along with the news reporters. One day while browsing at the book store I saw a picture of a pit bull with a curious look on its face, then I read the title, Lost Dogs: Michael Vick's dogs and their tale of rescue and redemption by Jim Gorant, and I knew it was my time to learn more.

The book (in my opinion) was well written with enough detail to let you know what happened without bogging down on the terrible things that happened to these dogs and what is currently happening to other dogs. It never ceases to amaze me how cruel people can be to other living things, especially when these living things have done nothing to provoke the cruelty. I will never understand how they could have done the things they did but I now understand why the poster of Michael Vick getting creamed into the ground by Clay Matthews was such a hot item at the 2011 auction.

The book does go on to show how a few caring people made sure these dogs were considered victims and not just evidence. It also focuses on the people dedicated to helping pit bulls lose their bad rap in society. The book highlights how caring people could make most

of the Vick dogs become (almost) normal dogs. Almost half of the dogs moved on to loving forever homes, and with the handful in foster care that takes the number to over half living a loving home. Best Friends is taking care of the dogs that needed more attention, with a number of these dogs being adopted and more are looking like they have the potential to move into forever homes. More than several of these dogs have received Canine Good Citizen Awards (even a few living at Best Friends) and a few have their therapy certificate. (These results are from a few years ago.) Luckily, this story has a pretty happy 'middle', as the story is still being written, partly because Vick had the money to pay to take care of these dogs, but mostly due to the hard work and love of the people that thought these dogs were worth a second chance.

While human cruelty never ceases to amaze me, I am always awed by the people willing to step in and clean up the mess of others. They try to make amends for those so cruel and uncaring. It was heartwarming to learn about the people in this story that fought to make sure that some of these dogs had a chance and weren't all condemned to be euthanized. (Only one of the original 49 dogs was put down and that was because she was aggressively over-bred to the point where she had psychological issues, leading to aggressive and unstable behavior.) When that hurdle was won, there were a number of organizations

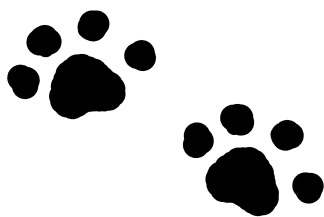

PET SMARTS

~ How to Respond to an Unwelcomed Dog ~

In our last newsletter, we addressed how to safely approach a dog. This time, we'll cover the flip side of that issue by discussing how to stay safe when a dog approaches you. This does not necessarily encompass what you should do during a full-on dog attack, which we'd need to discuss as its own topic. Instead, this applies whenever you are simply uncomfortable in a dog's presence, whether you are approached by a stray dog, a dog that's new to you at an acquaintance's home, or even when your own dog is acting overly exuberant. This is a method we teach to young children when we provide educational talks at schools, but it applies equally to adults. In short, you should "be a tree".

1. **STOP.** If you are walking, running or wiggling in any way, stop all motion and make yourself as still as a tree trunk.

2. **FOLD IN YOUR "BRANCHES".** Bring your arms down in front of your body and interlace your fingers. This may seem counterintuitive, as many folks are quick to pull their hands up and away from an approaching dog. However, our hands, usually full of smells, are often our most interesting attribute to a dog and studies suggest that raised hands may cause dogs to jump

up on a person, often bringing the dog muzzle-to-face with the person. With your hands interlaced in front of you, the approaching dog may immediately sniff or even lick your hands, but hold your ground and don't move. Remember, you're a tree.

3. **WATCH YOUR "ROOTS" AND COUNT.** Do not look at the approaching dog, which could be interpreted by the dog either as a challenge or as an invitation to play. Instead, look down at your feet and start counting quietly in your head. We tell young children to count to the highest number they know and then start over until the dog goes away. You adults can just wait patiently until the dog is gone.

Typically, after you've completed these three steps, the average dog will find you too boring and continue on to something more interesting. You may then begin to move but if the dog returns, simply act like a tree again. If the dog happens to knock you to the ground and you feel it is unsafe to stand again, do not try to resume your tree position but instead, act like a rock. Curl up in a fetal position on your knees with your hands interlaced behind your neck and, again, stay there until the dog is gone. Rocks are just as boring as trees.
