Wolverhampton Grammar School is launching a new and improved online education platform for Junior School, Senior School and Sixth Form students from September.

Known as Firefly, the new secure, online system will help students and teachers create and access resources from anywhere.

"We'll be gradually introducing Firefly to students from September and eventually, parents will be able to access their children's reports and students will be able to access teaching and learning guides, information about our academic departments and extra-

curricular activities." said Nic Anderson, Deputy Head.

Mr Anderson added "Students have seen how their teachers are using Apple iPads in lessons and Firefly is another great example of how our school is very much at the forefront of online learning. We recognise that Apple is leading the way in terms of educational resources and we want to make sure we do everything we can to ensure our students make the most of that opportunity."

The school will always ensure that all students (no matter how they choose to obtain resources) will be able to access the very best teaching and

learning support. However, if you are considering replacing the mobile device that your child uses to access the internet, we would recommend choosing one of the Apple products including the iPod, iPod touch, iPad, iPad Mini or iPhone - essentially any device that will enable your child to access iOS (the mobile operating system created and developed by Apple Inc). This will ensure your child can use the same Apps that their teachers are during lessons. Please, contact the school's IT department for more advice, but do remember that ALL children will always be able to access the online resources that they need, here at school.

Head Boy and Girl Announced

Two Week Timetable Special

Your Questions Answered

Wolverhampton Grammar Senior School is preparing for the introduction of a new, two week timetable from September.

At the moment, lessons last 35 minutes. The move to a two week timetable will increase lesson length to 50 minutes. Two week timetables are common place across the best independent schools and research shows that 50 minutes is an ideal lesson length - ensuring lessons are long enough

to allow students time to develop higher order skills like critical thinking and problem solving, and to enable students to work both independently and collaboratively.

There are many benefits to the two week timetable and the transition will be very easy. To help, we've collated what we think are helpful FAQs to help ensure you have all the information you need to prepare for the change.

When does the new two week timetable start?

From the start of the new term in September 2015.

Will the timetable changes make a difference to the start and end of the school day?

The school day will start at 8.50am and end at 4pm (the same times as now).

The implementation of longer lessons will reduce the feeling for your child of being "rushed" to get to the next lesson as there will be fewer lesson interchanges during the day.

What will a typical day look like?

Each day there will be six lessons, with break after period 2 and lunch after period 4. The week will therefore consist of 30 periods in all, and a cycle of two weeks will contain 60 periods.

To the right you will see what a typical day for Senior School will look like, with a 5 minute changeover between all periods.

You will note that assembly time for the Senior School remains as an important focus for the community at the beginning of each day, except Wednesday, where lunch is slightly earlier to facilitate block fixtures in senior games.

Another feature of the new timetable is slightly more teaching time, so students will have an enhanced learning experience and more of it!

When will students know what their new timetable will look like?

The new timetable will be issued (as usual) to students at the beginning of September when they return from their summer break. Form Tutors will spend time with their students to ensure they know how the new timetable works and where to find advice if they need it.

How will I be able to remember which week we are in?

Each week will be known as either a Blue or Red Week. The start of the new academic year in September will be a Blue Week and there will be handy reminders around school. For example, all student planners are being designed so that students can tell what week they are currently working on, computer and information screens around school will act as a constant reminder for students and the calendar on the school website will also highlight whether we are in a Blue or Red Week.

Form Tutors will also ensure that all children know where they need to be at any one time. Heads of Year will also make sure that students are fully supported and not worried about the changes.

What about lunchtime activities?

Lunchtime activities including music, sport and extra-curricular clubs will be available as normal. The Music and Sports Departments will talk to students about what activities are available when and all clubs will be listed on the school website's club calendar. Form Tutors will also talk through available lunchtime activities with their students.

Will there still be enough time for Assembly and Registration with Form Tutors?

There will be an assembly on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday.

All students will still have time with their Form Tutors and, in a two week timetable, students in the critical transition period of Years 7 and 8, will have increased tutorial time.

Are there any other benefits?

The restructuring will also allow freeing up of some academic options too, so for example Art and Design & Technology have traditionally been studied in half yearly blocks by students below Year 9, they can now be studied continuously throughout the year. Additionally the move has enabled us to offer the sciences as option subjects, rather than all three being compulsory at GCSE level. Whilst all three sciences are strong at our school and we expect most students will wish to study them, we want to offer choice to those whose strengths and interests lie elsewhere. In the Junior School, this change will also enable us to provide more science and language teaching, something we know our children really enjoy.

What help will be available for OpAL, or other students, who may need extra support to adjust?

As for any student, Form Tutors and Heads of Year can help them make sure they understand their new timetable. As OpAL students have small group and individual support they are also encouraged to speak to their OpAL tutor if they have any worries. In addition, all OpAL tutors will be talking to their students about the two week timetable to make sure we are doing everything that we can to help them with the transition.

How will the Junior School fit in with the two week timetable?

Wolverhampton Grammar Junior School will continue to have a one week timetable as now, and the timing of lessons will dovetail seamlessly. Their lunch will continue to be at 12.10pm.

If you, or your child are at all worried about anything related to the two week timetable, please come and talk to us so that we can reassure you about the change.




44th Annual Art Exhibition

Mia Seager from Form 8Q has provided her take on what looked like a great day.

“ We were taken up to the armoury where we were told all about the different weapons that were used and how they were set up ready to use. A few of the pupils got to hold some of the weapons (such as the pike or musket) and they were surprised at how heavy they were. It made us all realise what a hard life a soldier in the Civil War had. When we had finished in the armoury we went into another room where we were told what clothes men and women would wear in this era. The two pupils that put on the outfits said that they had to put on a lot of layers and they got very warm quickly. The female pupil that put the dress on also found it hard to walk.

After lunch in the beautiful gardens of Harvington Hall we were taken on a tour of the house. We saw the kitchen and the spit with the manual turning apparatus and various other rooms. It was interesting to compare how the rooms were used then to nowadays. We also had a chance to go into the swing-beam hide that the priests would have used when they were hiding from the Parliamentarians. It was pitch black and very tight-fitting but exciting all the same.

So, all in all the day was fantastic and we would all do it again in a heartbeat. ”



Classic Start for the Junior School

Students Win National Engineering Award and Boost Local Business

A group of Design & Technology students have been awarded “Best in Show” at the national Engineering Education Scheme’s celebration day in Birmingham.

The event was the culmination of weeks of practical support from the students to two local companies as part of the nationally recognised Engineering Education Scheme. The students displayed and presented their work to a panel of judges at the scheme’s celebration day with host Lord Digby Jones. Ninety other schools from all over the West Midlands were also in attendance.

The students had previously been challenged to work on a real engineering and technological problem by two local companies. The companies, Nuclear Engineering Services and HS Marston Aerospace invited our students to solve live briefs including the manufacture of working prototypes:

- The Nuclear Engineering Services team designed and manufactured a working electro mechanical positioning system for the removal of nuclear waste.
- The HS Marstons team was challenged to create a universal jig that will enable the production of heat exchanges to be manufactured accurately and reliably.

The Nuclear Engineering Services Team was awarded the honour of ‘Best in Show’ and was presented with a VIP day out at JCB World Headquarters in Staffordshire by Lord Digby Jones.



Both teams have been awarded a Gold Crest Award from Engineering Education Scheme as an indication of the high quality work that was produced.

Simon O’Malley, Head of Design & Technology at Wolverhampton Grammar School said “To solve a live brief on behalf of a company really helps bring what students learn in the classroom to life. Then to receive national recognition at a time when business support is so high up in the political agenda was a great way for our students to demonstrate how young people become the engineers and manufacturers of the future.”

One Small Step for Peter Lloyd, One Giant Leap for Wolverhampton Grammar School

Sixth Form student, Peter Lloyd has become the first Wolverhampton Grammar School student to send an object into the stratosphere.

Inspired by a recent Geography module on Extreme Climates and a challenge to create an experiment that would combine interests from all his chosen A level subjects (Geography, Physics and Maths) for his Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), Peter decided to set himself the challenge of sending a weather balloon up into the stratosphere.

Thanks to additional project funding from the school, the balloon was also fitted with a state-of-the-art GPS tracker and GoPro HD camera to enable Peter to not only track his balloon, but also capture some truly stunning pictures from the stratosphere. Peter filled his weather balloon with 3.2 cubic metres of Helium and

released it into the sky. After around 60 minutes the balloon reached 33,000 metres above sea level having stretched to approximately 5 metres in diameter. As planned, the balloon then burst allowing it to return back to earth taking around 90 minutes to land, amazingly just 50 miles from the launch site.

The GoPro camera captured the journey and revealed the changing cloud formations at different altitudes, as well as truly stunning footage of the balloon reaching the stratosphere.

Tom Baker, Head of Geography at Wolverhampton Grammar School said "The experiment was a huge success and went exactly to plan. Thanks to Peter's hard work and his commitment to ensuring its success, we'll now be integrating the experiment within our Year 8 Geography syllabus, enabling the next generation of possible



meteorologists and astronauts to have the experience and thrill of sending an object into the stratosphere."
