FEATURED KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Anne Mahlum is the Founder of Back on My Feet, a nonprofit organization dedicated to creating independence and self-sufficiency within the homeless and other underserved populations by first engaging them in running as a means to build confidence, strength and self-esteem. After launching in Philadelphia in July 2007, the organization has expanded to Baltimore, Washington D.C., Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Indianapolis, Atlanta and New York City. Anne has led the organization to grow to a staff of over 40 professionals with thousands of volunteers and hundreds of members.

Anne is responsible for the vision, strategy and national fundraising efforts for Back on My Feet as it expands across the country. The organization has seen revenue growth of 92% from 2009-10 and 32% 2010-11, and is deliberate in diversifying its funding streams. To support the organization's aggressive growth, Anne created unique fundraising events and campaigns such as the Stroehmann Back on My Feet 20in24 Challenge, a 24-hour race with seven events. The race celebrates its sixth year in 2013 and is expected to raise more than \$300,000 for the organization.



Anne attended graduate school at American University where she obtained her Master's Degree in Political Communications in 2003. She is an avid runner and has completed 10 marathons. It's her goal to run a marathon on every continent and Antarctica is the last one on her list. She is originally from Bismarck, North Dakota and currently resides in New York City. ABOUT HER PLENARY PRESENTATION

People say one person can't change the world, and Anne's response is - it doesn't happen any other way. In 2007, Anne started a running club for 9 men living in a shelter that was by her apartment. Today, this running club is a national \$6.5M 501(c)3 with operations in 10 cities, 47 staff, thousands of volunteers, hundreds of members and close to 1.000 success stories. She has been called crazy more times than she can count, but her vision that it was and is possible to substantially change the lives of the homeless by using running and community to rebuild their self-worth and self-value persevered through all the doubt. Anne will share with you her lessons of acceptance, vulnerability, risktaking and the commitment to never stop asking what is possible.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD



The renowned author and poet Maya Angelou once said "that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."

Through their professional and philanthropic work and sheer content of their character, Joan and Lee Thomas spent a lifetime to ensure that all people, all human beings, felt valued and respected.

Joan practiced family medicine in the West End of Louisville for over 20 years providing quality health care for her diverse group of patients. Lee, a successful businessman, was also a founding member of Louisville Friends Meeting.

They were long time peace advocates and strong voices for at-risk children and racial harmony.

Joan and Lee nurtured a loving and caring family, but they also had a special place for children who were abused, neglected and abandoned. Buildings at the Center for Women and Families and the Home of the Innocents campuses bear Joan's name.

They were quiet leaders, preferring that the spotlight be shone on those working to build peace, understanding, harmony and compassion in the community. However, that did not stop the Louisville Urban League when they presented Joan and Lee Thomas its first Arthur M. Walters Champion of Diversity Award in 2004.

"The generosity of Joan and Lee Thomas will touch the lives of Louisvillians for generations yet to come. Just about everywhere you turn in the Metro area you will find not-for-profit groups that have been empowered by Lee and Joan to make Louisville more peaceful and a better place to live," said Terry Taylor, Executive Director of Interfaith Paths to Peace.

Larry McDonald, President of the Lincoln Foundation added "Joan and Lee Thomas have been community champions for education, social justice and peace for many years. I had the honor of serving with Joan on three boards. Lincoln Foundation has benefited tremendously from 56 years of continuous service by Lee Thomas on the Board of Trustees."

It is clear that many have felt the understated, but deep social impact that Joan and Lee have made in our community. Their compassion and humanity for all make it an honor and privilege for the Center for Nonprofit Excellence to recognize Joan and Lee Thomas with our 2013 Lifetime Achievement Award.

Inspire Change: Taking action to be fearless

And in the non-profit sector, the incentives to get people to change their work behaviors is sufficiently vague to keep you guessing about the right things to do and the right things to say.

Up to 70% of organizational changes fail. And while there are no absolute answers or formulas for leading and managing change, we know there are 'suspects' who are known to be Change Killers. So what can you do to prevent these suspects from killing change in your organization?
