ying to self is the most challenging part of the Christian walk. In the case of Social Entrepreneur, Tim Marusich, this has been a gradual, painful, but richly rewarding journey.

Tim was raised in a culturally Christian home. His mother was a single divorced mom with five children. In his early years he focused on worldly success and had a side business in high school. "I was nominated most-popular, had lettered in two sports, had a couple of girlfriends I was interested in, and was riding around on a motorcycle, as if I was cool," says Tim. But this all changed his freshman year of high school when his brother died tragically. Tim

fondly remembers his brother as a quiet, smart, sensitive, and giving young man. "I stopped being self-serving that day. That's when I asked God to come into my life."

After high school and college, Tim embarked on a flourishing career in technology and landed an executive position at Microsoft, where it didn't take long for his pursuit of worldly success to leave him feeling empty again. He pulled out a list of goals he had written five years earlier. "I wanted In his freshman

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to be married, to be a father, to be involved with church, to teach, to give back, and to have a certain financial goal. After being with Microsoft for over six years, the only thing I had achieved was the financial goal. In everyone else's eyes I was a success, but I wasn't a success in my own eyes. I had to change course." Tim walked away from his unvested stock options and financial security and resigned from Microsoft.

Upon returning to San Diego, he met Steve Murray who introduced him to many volunteer opportunities. His faith grew as he got connected to his church community. It was while volunteering that God gave Tim an opportunity to make use of all he had been equipped with for a greater purpose. He volunteered to mentor two Point Loma Nazarene students seeking help for a start-up called BlueHornet.com. When the funding ran out after the tech bubble burst, Tim stepped in to fund and run the company. "We grew from one employee to being now one of the leading email service providers in the U.S. We donated time and money to many great causes even before we made a dollar of profit; it created a culture of gratitude and generosity that continued for years".

Since leaving BlueHornet after it was acquired by another company, Tim has devoted his time to his passion and mission, which is to encourage and support the building of generous businesses or in Tim's words, "organizations that exists for making a difference, both in the lives of the employees and the greater community."

This transformation to serving others has been richly rewarding for

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ow many prayer postures are pictured in the Bible? Jesus "fell with his face to the ground and prayed." (Matt 26:39). He "knelt down and prayed." (Luke 22:41). In John 17:1 at the dinner table He "looked toward heaven and prayed." Prayers are offered with hands lifted, with heads bowed, sitting, standing, and lying down.

As church began recently the man in front of me was sitting alone. A few minutes into the service his wife slipped in. It was obvious they belonged together not only because she took the seat beside him but also because she immediately slipped her right hand under his arm. Throughout the service she sat with her whole body and head tilted slightly in his direction. Her adult daughter, sitting on her left, would occasionally lean in to whisper a comment or question and the woman would respond, but by posture and touch she stayed oriented toward and connected to her husband. And at the end of the service, as the congregation rose, she and her husband reached for each others' hands at precisely the same instant. It was a tiny, private gesture and beautiful to see. Without a word exchanged, volumes were spoken between them and about them as a couple.

Those moments that I witnessed of a loving, respectful, longstanding marriage also pictured to me our most important prayer posture as the bride of Christ—holding onto Him and leaning toward

right. In our prayer closet, stuck in traffic, wherever we arrive throughout our day, He is already there waiting for us. We have only to settle in beside Him and slip our hand into His through prayer. And when our time of prayer ends and we rise to head back out into the world, He reaches for our hand at the very instant that we reach for His. We study the Bible, we incline ourselves toward Him. We lean in to whisper our secret pain.

And so we head out there neither alone nor empty-handed. After all, this was entirely His idea—this fellowship, this salvation, this thing called prayer, this new life in Christ. He so wanted the feel of our hand in His that He came to die to make it possible. He reached across the impossible divide to each of us. Kneeling or standing, lean in. And thank Him for saving you a seat.

Father, thank You for the many ways you picture Your love to us throughout each week. And for putting Mary and Gene Rumsey right in front of me to illustrate, through their love for each other, your love for each of us. We love You too. Amen.

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EN WHAT MY LIFE GROUP MEANS TO ME

A little more than two years ago, Janet Murray invited me to join her life group. I was surprised and honored to be asked, especially since I'd stood up at the LJCC Women's Retreat the week before and admitted to everyone that I wasn't really a "joiner."

Not only did that weekend open me up in ways I hadn't thought possible, but by accepting Janet's invitation, I've now been part of a life group that sustains me and helps me grow spiritually. Six of us meet on Friday mornings; currently we are reading *How People Grow* by Henry Cloud and John Townsend, which is a study

on what the Bible reveals about personal growth. For me, in part, the book is metaphor on growing with six beloved sisters in Christ who are my life group.

While it's true we discuss highly meaningful topics you would expect six women to cover—shoes, the relative merits of shopping at Nordstrom Rack vs. Nordstrom, recipes, schools, jobs, kids, our husbands (don't worry guys)—because we are connected on a deeper level, we have quite literally, a sacred trust. The

foundation of our relationship is Jesus, and so everything, be it the smallest details of our days to the profound events that shape our lives, is informed by His holy word. We are seeking to know God better, and as such, are being transformed as a group. We root for each other in a way that is similar but different from other friendships I've known. I believe it's because we are here to share an intimate relationship with God, not just each other.

I can come to my life group with whatever is on my heart; I can share unflattering stories where I look frankly terrible without feeling the need to protect my image, my reputation or my character. These women will pray with me, will challenge my thinking when I'm going down the wrong path, will weep when I am weeping and will laugh loudly at things that are ironic and funny. During the week, I think and pray for them, I wonder about their days, the challenges I know they're facing, the celebrations they're experiencing, the ordinary and the amazing things that make up all of our lives as we're walking with God. And I know they're doing the same for me. I can't think of a better gift.

LJCC COMMUNITY LIGHTENS HER LOAD

Matthew 11:29-30 "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

Do you ever feel like you're walking on the spine of a knife-edged ridgeline with no road or trail to follow and no safety net should you stumble and fall? Mary Kwan recalls feeling that way... literally, when she did something completely out of character five years ago and embarked on a life-changing Outward Bound hiking excursion through the southern province of Malaysia.

It was the hardest thing she had ever done. After surgery four months earlier to remove four lumps on her breast, she was still rather weak physically and emotionally. "I was down on myself for being so young and having all these health issues." A teacher at her high school, worried about Mary's life direction, encouraged her to go on the trip.

It was on Mary's ascent up Mt. Kinabula in Sabah that the air became so thin she didn't think she could go on. She began to cry because she thought she was dragging everyone else down. Someone offered to stop and pray with her. Others sensed that her backpack was too heavy and offered to carry things for her so she could traverse across the narrow ridge with greater confidence.

At the top of the peak, Mary shook with excitement as she marveled at God's creation. "I never thought I'd be at a point where I could feel the clouds under my feet. I felt like I could reach the sun! It was the most amazing thing I've ever experienced."

When she looks back on this experience, Mary is astonished at how it mirrors her life now. She is so grateful that God led her to LJCC back in December 2010 -- a time when she was feeling very stressed due to final exams and projects to complete. Everyone was so welcoming and she has



felt very much at home at LJCC ever since. She loves how the worship services revive her emotions. She's had a chance to join LJCC's Chinese students at their weekly Bible study. "It's so much easier to study scripture and talk about Jesus with a group of mentors and friends."

Mary says her stress load is a lot lighter and she feels more sure-footed about her life journey now that she has Christian brothers and sisters alongside her to love and support her and lighten her load. And she knows the end of her journey with Christ will be even more glorious than any mountain ever climbed!

It also gives me a better understanding of the perspective of God and helps me see what God is doing in all my friends' lives. We're a real tight group, but it's always great when new people come in. We're a welcoming bunch and nothing would feel worse than people feeling unwelcome in our group. I hope people think of our youth group as a safe place like I do."

As parents, we owe Chris and Karrie Tardiff a huge nod of appreciation. They invest and devote a huge amount of time as adult mentors to the youth of our church, taking them to camps, to lunch every Sunday, caring about them, inviting them into their home and being available whenever needed. These young guys are blessed in so many ways, but they still live in a time and place where the temptations and distractions are no less challenging than anywhere else. They've chosen God as their guide, and it shows in who they are and the choices they make. If they are tomorrow's leaders, then I for one, have great hope for our future and the world we will live in.
