2. These lyrics were composed by Stephen Foster in 1856, so some of the words or phrases may sound a little odd today. What words are unfamiliar to you?
 - a. Underline these words or phrases. This includes words you might know in other contexts, but seem to have a different meaning in this song.
 - b. Look up these words in a dictionary. Pick the meaning that makes the most sense in this context.
 - c. In the space below, write the words and definitions you found:

3. This song is meant to persuade people to vote for James Buchanan. What argument is Foster making in verse 1? Rephrase it in your own words:

4. In verse 2, what simile is made on the fourth line?

Explain what you think it means. (Hint: the first two lines of this verse show how their opponents behave, but the last line shows how Democrats are different.)

5. Reread verse 3.

- “the bones of Washington” refers to George Washington’s grave at Mt. Vernon, Virginia.
- “Where Jackson fought...” refers to Andrew Jackson’s famous battle at New Orleans, Louisiana, during the War of 1812.
- “...and Marion bled” refers to Francis Marion, an important leader in the Revolutionary War who fought in North Carolina and South Carolina.

Look at a map of the United States and find Virginia, Louisiana, North Carolina and South Carolina.

Why do you think Foster mentions these men and these places in a song about James Buchanan?
