Here are some more spring safety tips for our walkers, runners, and bicyclists; all of whom have to share our narrow roads and streets with motor vehicles.

- ♦ Pretend that you're invisible Sounds sort of funny but it's a good way to keep from getting run over. Make it irrelevant whether drivers see you or not. If you always assume that a driver doesn't see you, you'll be a lot safer.
- Never run or walk more than two abreast, and make sure you face traffic, keeping as close to the shoulder of the road as possible – in case you have to take evasive action. Bikers should travel with traffic, and obey the rules of the road, while always wearing a helmet.
- ♦ Wear reflective clothing Take a look at the next police officer you see on traffic duty. They're wearing reflective colors you should too, if you're going to be in the roadway.
- Be attentive to the lighting conditions. It's harder for drivers to see during dusk and dawn. Remember that solar glare is a factor in a lot of accidents.
- ♦ Keep a cell phone with you. It's good to program the word "ICE" in your cell phone contact list. 'ICE" stands for "In case of emergency". Just enter your emergency contact person (Mom, dad, husband, wife, brother sister, etc.) under the name "ICE", so police, fire or EMS personnel will have a point of contact in case you're involved in an accident and we don't know who you are.
- ♦ And, finally, drivers should keep their windshields clean. It's also an excellent idea to wash off your headlights and taillights when you gas up. It makes a big difference.

Pastor's Perspective

*Fifth Sunday of Easter

Throughout John's gospel Jesus gives us a series of metaphors or images to contemplate—"I am the living water; the light of the world; the bread of life; the good shepherd; the gate; the resurrection and the life; the way, the truth, the life;" and so on. In today's gospel reading Jesus uses yet another image to help us understand what it means to be in a relationship with him. He says "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in them will bear much fruit." (John 15: 5). These images are the way that John's gospel brings out both who Jesus is and what it means to be his disciple.

Who is Jesus? John's gospel starts with "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God." He goes on to say "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Very clearly John's gospel has no doubt about who Jesus is. The very Word of God spoken forth into creation, now united inseparably to the humanity of Jesus. And to emphasize what this means, John's gospel has Jesus saying "I am" without qualification in five encounters: to the Samaritan women at the well (John 4:26); to the disciples as he walks on the Sea of Galilee (6:20; to those challenging him near the Temple on the feast of Tabernacles (8:24,28,58); again to the disciples at the Last Supper (13:19); finally to those coming to arrest him (18:5,6,8).

In Greek "I am" can also be translated "I am he" and be a simple declaration. But it is also the Greek translation for YHWH, the sacred name that God revealed to Moses in Moses' encounter at the burning bush. "I am who am" says God, when Moses wants to know who is sending him. So important was that name to the Israelites that they wouldn't pronounce it aloud. So, when John's gospel has Jesus saying "I am (he)" it is deliberate. For those with faith, they hear the deeper

meaning that Jesus is truly that Word of God, one with YHWH, God encountering the world through Jesus' humanity. For those without such faith, they only hear the statement "I am he" and think that Jesus is making himself more than he truly is."

To be a disciple of Jesus, then, is to hear that deeper meaning and to live one's life in intimate relationship to Jesus and the Father. The series of images mentioned above—"I am the living water, etc.—all act as invitations to seek that close, personal, intimate, disciple's connection to Jesus. They help to make more concrete what it means to trust in that relationship. In today's gospel, in particular, we get a beautiful invitation to "remain in Jesus and he in us," just as Jesus and the Father remain in one another. An intimate, deep communion of life and love. We live and receive nourishment so long as we are connected to Jesus, the vine. Moreover, just as the Word of God chose to "abide" or "dwell" among us in Jesus of Nazareth, so now the resurrected Jesus continues to dwell or abide or remain in us and we in him, if we live the faith of true discipleship, keep the Lord's commandments, and are willing to lay down our life for others as he did for us.

As we move toward the latter part of the Easter season, we will not know what the resurrection of Jesus means unless we desire to be so intimately connected to him. One way to make all of this more practical is to take a moment in prayer and image Jesus giving you nourishment. If the vine and branches image doesn't quite work for you, then image Jesus sitting you down at a meal, preparing the food for the meal, serving you the meal, cleaning up, and talking with you throughout about the things that are important to you. Jesus wants to give us nourishment, wants us to know how closely he is connected to all that we are and do. Think about the people, situations, and decisions you face this week. Image yourself receiving wisdom, strength, and help from the risen Lord. He is the vine, we are the branches. If we remain in him, we will bear much fruit.

*Update on New Crucifix and Other Church Improvements

For those who have paid attention to these columns over the last couple of years, you know that we have been working on some beautification improvements for the church. Nothing huge but a few important items, beginning with a crucifix. The Worship Commission and its Art and Environment Committee have been working with a liturgical artist, Michael Northrop, from the southwest side of the state, to design a unique crucifix for our worship space and an appropriate backdrop for it on the main wall. We are getting closer to an agreement on the shape and size and look of the crucifix, but still have a ways to go on how to give it a proper backdrop. It now looks like the process might take another 10 months or so.

The current large cross of wood and cloth with the circles will not work with the new crucifix. But, if that is taken down, there is a huge blank wall. What to do? We are looking at a sculpted background that can be removed or re-positioned, if the church ever needs to expand the walls out. It would be covered with glass-type small tiles to create some texture and color as a backdrop to the crucifix. Along the lines of the SS. John and Paul icon, it would have a more organic shape than a geometric one. A similar though smaller such sculpted background would then be placed behind the tabernacle to give the tabernacle area more dignity and bring a greater sense of unity to the whole of the church. In the process the walls of the church would be painted and the sanctuary would be lowered one step to more easily allow a ramp to be built into the sanctuary. The carpet would remain on the main floor but the sanctuary area would be tiled.

These are all rather modest steps but will, I believe, create a much more distinctive worship environment that will do honor to our Catholic heritage. We took the first step by putting in windows that allow more light into the Church during the day. The sanctuary improvements would be a second step. If possible, we would then

also like to work on a more distinctive ambo (where the readings are proclaimed), altar and baptismal font (preferably one that allows for some flowing water). On the practical side, we also need to look at new lighting for the Church, although this would be a major undertaking, given our current electrical set up. Much of the money has been set aside in savings over the last few years and our budget for next year will set aside some more. I would like to see if we as a parish can handle the painting and the modest reconstruction and tiling of the sanctuary ourselves, after next Easter, in preparation for the new crucifix and its backdrop.

As with all artwork, some will really like it, some will not, some will be neutral. But well before we finish it, I will have the artist give us a larger image so that people can begin to imagine what the front area of the church will look like, when all is complete. The whole process started with a desire for a oneof-a-kind crucifix. For me, that is still the key to all that we are doing. At present it looks like the vertical height of this crucifix will be about 9 ft., made of one stretch of cherry wood, stained to be more in line with some of our current wood. The corpus of Jesus will be about 6 ft., made of a resin that can be painted to look like a dark bronze with a bit of a patina to bring out the features and the contours of the body. The face will try to capture what is called the "exaltation"the moment when Jesus breathes his last and gives himself over to the Father. The key is to capture both some of the suffering he went through but the sense of peace and hope as he offers himself over to the Father. For that reason the head will be tilted up, inviting us as every Eucharist to connect not just to Jesus' suffering but to his continuous offering up of himself and ourselves to the Father. The horizontal beam, like the vertical, will be of natural cherry wood, about 4 inches in diameter, with an arch to it, to capture the contours of our current main arch, from which it will hang. I hope relatively soon to share with you a picture, which will do justice to all these aspects we have negotiated with the artist.

*Looking Ahead

Remember that next weekend is a Registration Weekend for anyone who wishes to officially register in the parish. Members of our Evangelization and Hospitality Commission will be available after all Masses. In addition. all faith formation families are invited to a half hour information and registration session for next year's G.R.A.C.E. program. This will take place after the 5 p.m., 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. Masses. Next year's calendar will be available, along with an overview of how people evaluated this year's program, and an opportunity to sign up and lock in the specific night you prefer for the monthly G.R.A.C.E. sessions and the specific Monday or Tuesday slot you prefer for the grades 1-6 age-specific sessions.

Please try to keep our annual parish picnic date open—the last Sunday of June, June 28th, 2-6 p.m. Once again we will have some good food, refreshments, games for the little ones, karaoke, and more. I would like to see someone take charge of a horseshoe tournament and maybe even a bocce tournament for the adults (I got a new bocce set at Christmas as a gift!). If you are willing, I will pass your name on to the picnic committee. We transfer our namesake day—the Feast of the Martyrs John and Paul—to that weekend and so will once again be celebrating that feast on the picnic weekend.

I hope you notice that an area in the back has been cleared and marked out for our Community Garden. A new committee has been working hard to get it ready for planting. Thank you to all the children who brought seeds to plant as part of the Easter egg hunt. When it all begins to produce, we will have lots of food to share with Samaritan House or other places that can distribute it to those in need. If you are interested in helping in this venture call the office and leave a message for Bridget.

Once again I will celebrate each of the Masses on Corpus Christi weekend (June 13/14) as "Teaching Masses." Beginning in next week's bulletin I want to do a little preparatory teaching on what Eucharist and

communion means, how Eucharist differs from communion services, and the importance of Eucharistic communion for us as Catholics.

Making a Charitable Gift through an IRA Charitable Rollover

Helpful Tips on how you can realize Tax Benefits by Making a Direct Charitable Distribution from your IRA

If you are over the age of 70 1/2, you must take a required minimum distribution from your IRA. Normally, this money is taxed as ordinary income. However federal legislation enacted in October 2008 permits you, for the remainder of 2009, to make a direct gift from your IRA to the parish, the Catholic Services Appeal (C.S.A.) or other qualified charity. This gift counts toward fulfilling your required minimum distribution.

For 2009 you can exclude up to \$100,000 from your gross income for distributions made directly from your traditional IRA to a qualified charity. For married couples, each spouse can make a distribution from his or her IRA under the same provisions

The distribution must be from your IRA, not a 401(k) or other retirement plan. However, consult with your financial or tax advisor about the possibility of transferring funds from one of these other plans to establish an IRA with the distribution to charity coming from the newly established IRA.

The IRA distribution must be a direct charitable gift and not a distribution to a donor-advised fund, a charitable remainder trust or for a charitable gift annuity.

If you would like to take advantage of these income tax savings and support the parish, please review the following tips on how to handle your charitable gift correctly:

- Contact your IRA custodian or representative *before* making a gift to arrange for the proper transfer of funds from your IRA to the qualified charity. The check that is issued from the IRA must show that it is made *payable* to the charity.
- If you have elected to have income tax withheld from your normal IRA distributions, advise your IRA administrator not to withhold taxes from distributions to charity.
- While this topic is fresh in your mind, ask your attorney and financial advisor how the make the parish a beneficiary of your will, trust or IRA.
