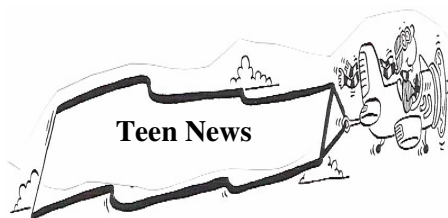

Pastor's Perspective

*G.R.A.C.E.

Our April monthly formation session for the whole parish takes place next week. We will look at another general catechetical area, this time *Growing as Sacramental People*. The specific theme of Jesus' healing ministry will allow us to explore how important that ministry was to Jesus; how it involved not just physical healing, but spiritual (forgiveness), emotional, and even social dimensions; how Jesus connects his historical ministry to the ongoing Church; and what our response to suffering in the world is or can be. Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday all have openings, if you have not attended before. Families of religious education students: please remember this is a core component of religious formation for them. It is not optional.

*C.S.A.

Our 2008 Catholic Services Appeal will begin in about one month. You will receive a mailing from me before the end of April, asking you to give a donation/pledge toward this annual appeal. As always it is one of the more significant ways the parish raises funds, along with meeting our mandatory obligations toward the diocese. I have not yet received the parish's mandatory target, but I'm expecting it to be very near last year's amount. In the past we have been able to exceed that target significantly and thus set aside money for capital improvement projects. Many of these projects will be coming due in the next couple of years, especially work on the parking lot and entranceway as well as church lighting, flooring, and painting, among other items.

The CSA pledge is an excellent way to donate to the parish, since 100% of the donation directly benefits the parish. It either helps us achieve the mandatory amount we must send to the diocese or comes back to us 100%, no tax taken out by the diocese, as from other donations. It does not matter how

much we exceed our target in previous years—none of that affects the mandatory target.

*Catholic Teaching on Just War (conclusion)

Please see my earlier articles in the March 2 and March 16 bulletins. They are available on our parish website. As mentioned in the last article, I bring these considerations up not simply as a theoretically interesting topic. Given the world situation today and the foreseeable future our young men and women need to be asking themselves what they truly believe about war and going to war. The Church has long affirmed the honorableness of serving one's country as part of the military, but it has also reclaimed its earliest roots of recognizing the need to be stronger proponents of nonviolence. Conscientious objection to war and a commitment to nonviolent ways of confrontation can be a very courageous way to serve one's country as well. But one must demonstrate a consistent, well-thought out and long standing commitment to these ideals, for them to be recognized by the government, if ever a draft were re-instituted. I encourage especially those in high school to do some serious thinking and soul-searching about what our commitment to Christ might ask of us.

I would like to conclude these reflections with comments on three topics. The first has to do with a proper understanding of nonviolence. Sometimes those who are opposed to war are labeled "pacifists." It is an acceptable term, but often used in a derogatory way, as though it is a weak response to realistic violence. Not at all. Many martyrs of the Church were such "pacifists." A better term is probably "non-violent responders." Such actions are far from weak or passive. Think of Gandhi standing up with his countrymen and women to the British army, not wanting violence nor death, but willing to be killed for the sake of the freedom and rights of his people. Protests, marches, symbolic civil disobedience (such as trespassing on government ground that contains weapons of mass

destruction), boycotts, educational and letter-writing campaigns, all can be ways that nonviolent responders engage the public and its leaders in serious discussion of issues and alternative responses to violence.

Clearly Jesus was such a nonviolent responder. His teaching on "turning the other cheek" and "walking the extra mile" and "giving not just the coat but the shirt as well" to those who would do violence to us, as well as his well known "love your enemies" were not just sentiments of a kind but naïve person. Just the opposite. It takes an extremely well-integrated, strong and secure person to stand up to injustice, especially violent injustice, pointing out that injustice but not being unjust or violent in response. One must risk one's life. And why? For the sake of a greater principle and deeper, more powerful truth. Precisely because a Jesus was so clearly such a practitioner of nonviolence the early Church had a very difficult time reconciling the Christian faith with any shedding of blood, even by those in the army. It believed there was a deeper truth that had to be witnessed to.

Even though the Church has felt called to modify that strict commitment to nonviolence over the course of centuries in the name of protecting the common good, we should not think of it as marginal or unimportant to our faith. The world needs young men and women who know their faith and are willing to live it, even if it means risking civil disobedience in the face of injustice at times.

The second point I want to focus on is the issue of "pre-emptive war." A few Catholic commentators, most notably George Weigel who gets a lot of media exposure, have tried to support President Bush's decision to go to war, even after knowing that there were no weapons of mass destruction or imminent threat from Iraq, by defining just war as including "pre-emptive action." In doing so they are extending the just war principles beyond their breaking point. For one country's pre-emptive action is another country's right to respond in self-defense, according to just war theory. Instead of honoring the

criterion of “last resort,” which is part of the classic just war teaching, pre-emptive action encourages just the opposite and can too easily justify any use of violence by a legitimate authority.. The whole point of just war theory is not to justify war. It is to hold the more powerful to a standard that will not easily start war, prolong war, or engage in conduct during war that violates basic human dignity.

We are in a very volatile, changing world. Russia has protested aspects of the missile-defense shield the U.S. is proposing to install in Poland, as well as the admission of Ukraine and Georgia to N.A.T.O. It has said that it sees such actions as potential threats on its sovereignty. Just war theory would never justify Russia’s pre-emptive use of force to stop such actions. But Weigel’s and other commentators’ recent thinking could easily lend itself to justify such conclusions. We have to be careful that we don’t try to fit Catholic teaching to our specific U.S. situation, in order to justify it. If we do, we might find ourselves unwittingly justifying many other actions throughout the world, which we would otherwise condemn.

In the end, and this is my third point, I think it is important to emphasize that Catholic just war thinking leads always to what is called “selective conscientious objection.” That means that we should have a reluctance to justify war, engage in war, or prolong war. We start not with “This war/action must be just” but with “Is this war/action truly just?” Some actions will be justified, some not. We never surrender our conscience to the will of the ones in power, though we try to listen openly and respectfully to those in authority, to see if indeed we can conscientiously agree.


Even though the United States government does not recognize the concept of “selective” conscientious objection (according to U.S. policy, you have to be either against all war or you must serve in the military if called up), it does have an understanding that we still are responsible for our actions. When military actions go horribly awry, kill innocent civilians with no justification,

and it comes to light, the ones taking such actions are held to account. It takes a very clear cut abuse to have that happen, but in principle it reminds all in the military that they are personally responsible for the decisions they make in a given situation, even as they carry out a superior’s orders.

For Christians, we are necessarily selective conscientious objectors, it seems to me, because we have a commitment to the life and dignity of every human being, not just those of our own tribe, ethnic group, nationality, or state. Yes, the legitimate defense of a nation’s citizens can justify the proportionate use of violence in certain situations and thus remind us that those who serve in the military and police and other such forces, can and do serve honorably. But such support for “just violence” and “just war” never permits us to give up our personal conscience in a given situation. It is very possible that those in such forces, in a given situation, will have to honor a deeper command of conscience at times. And it is very possible [clearly I think it is the case in Iraq, though others would disagree] that we might need young men and women to refuse to enter the military on the basis of a conscientious objection, to witness to a deeper truth. Generally, only a minority will take such a path, but they serve to remind us of Jesus’ own commitment to nonviolent rather than violent confrontation.

On this eighth day of Easter, the octave of Easter, the Church still celebrates as though it is Easter Sunday, in order to remind us that the Easter mystery has broken open all time and space to a new reality. May we believe and live in a way that allows that Easter reality to be part of our everyday life. May the risen Lord give us the strength and hope to always witness to the deepest truths, no matter the cost.

In today’s Gospel, Jesus tells us “as the Father sent me, so I send you.” Become who you are called to be — ambassadors of peace and forgiveness.

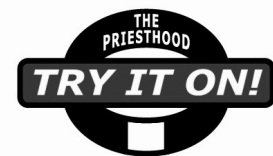
FLOWER: Families Live Out the Word in Everyday Routines
