## VNA of Hudson Valley Organizations Receive Accreditation from The Joint Commission

By demonstrating compliance with The Joint Commission's national standards for health care quality and safety, the Visiting Nurse Association of Hudson Valley, Hospice Care in Westchester & Putnam and VNA Home Health Services has earned the Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval<sup>™</sup>.

"We sought accreditation for our organizations because we want to demonstrate our commitment to patients' safety and quality care," said Michele Quirolo, President and CEO. "We view obtaining Joint Commission accreditation as another step toward achieving excellence. It shows that we make a significant investment in quality on a day-to-day basis from the top down."

The Visiting Nurse Association of Hudson Valley and family of organizations were evaluated against a set of national standards by The Joint Commission's survey team experienced in the delivery of home care services. Accreditation was received for all services as provided by the survey for "Comprehensive Accreditation Manual for Home Care." The Joint Commission conducted an unannounced, on-site evaluation of the Visiting Nurse Association of Hudson Valley from November 14th through the 17th. The accreditation award recognizes the VNA's dedication to complying with The Joint Commission's state-of-the-art standards on a continuous basis.

The Joint Commission is the nation's oldest and largest standards-setting

and accrediting body in health care, evaluating nearly 15,000 health care organizations and programs in the United States each year.



## Wound Care Services Expand

The Visiting Nurse Association of Hudson Valley (VNAHV) is taking a proactive approach in the field of wound care management. VNAHV Registered Nurses, Carol Jaconetti, Mary Avedisian and Maria Roehmer, have all received Wound Care Certification (WCC) by the National Alliance for Wound Care.

The Wound Care Certification Examination measures the academic and technical competence of eligible professionals in the area of Skin and Wound Care Management above basic licensure. Candidates must take a one week intensive training course in wound management before passing the certification examination with a grade of 85% or better. This certification is valid for five years.

Wound Care Certification qualifies these VNAHV nurses as experts on wound care and, as such, they are better prepared to treat complex cases and to discuss treatment options with doctors. VNAHV's certified nurses will also be able to support fellow nurses in the field with the diagnosis and treatment of wounds.

"Having certified wound care professionals on our staff is another way in which the VNA of Hudson Valley is demonstrating our commitment to excellence and quality. Wound care is an area in which timely and expert treatment can prevent re-hospitalization and unnecessary setbacks for patients," said Michele A. Quirolo, President & CEO

"Our certification in wound management will allow us to help all of our patients heal quickly with a lower risk for infection and with less trauma," said Carol Jaconetti, RN & Clinical Manager for the VNA of Hudson Valley

To complement our staff's wound care

certification, the VNAHV has recently purchased two Wound Management Telehealth systems. "Our biggest challenge in wound care is accurate communication between our nurses and the physician regarding the condition of a wound and its proper care," stated Rae Szymanski, COO. "These new systems will be used to transmit images to our wound care nurses and the patient's physician. As a result, our nurses will be able to immediately and accurately assess the wound and provide treatment."

In February 2003, the VNAHV became the first home health care agency in Westchester to offer Telehealth to our patients and today we are still leading the way in incorporating cutting-edge technology into our services as a way to enhance the care we provide to our patients.

With the introduction of the Wound Management Telehealth systems, the VNAHV will be able to achieve a reduction in the frequency of in-home visits, a reduction in wound healing time, prevention of infections and hospitalizations and an increase in patient's self-reliance in wound care.

The Caring Circle hosted its 3rd Annual Day Camp on Saturday August 4, 2007. This year, 56 children participated in the one day camp which took place at the Pound Ridge home of former Hospice Chairperson, DeDe Burke.

The sun shined brightly as the children and volunteers participated in the circus themed day camp. Laughter filled the air as campers learned how to juggle and spin plates like true circus performers. Other camp activities included colorful face painting, swimming and a visit from the Critter Lady. Concluding the day and bringing the circus to life was a performance by members of the Big Apple Circus.

The Caring Circle is a program developed by Hospice Care in Westchester & Putnam to help children, teenagers and their families or guardians learn healthy coping behaviors to aid in dealing with the thoughts and feelings associated with grieving the loss of a loved one.

The Caring Circle helps over 200 children each year cope with the loss of a loved one. Age-specific peer groups participate in discussions and activities in a safe environment that fosters healthy grieving and promotes healing for both children and adults. The program teaches participants grief management skills to help them cope with the death of a loved one in constructive ways. The Caring Circle also provides a forum for children to express their feelings, both verbally and non-verbally in a supportive environment. The groups are ongoing and confidential and participants are invited to attend the support groups for as long as the experience is beneficial. The groups are offered in Yorktown Heights on alternate Wednesdays and in Yonkers on alternate Thursdays.

# VNA Employee Reaches Out to Those in Need in Mississippi

WNAHV Registered Nurse Dorita Taylor recently returned home from a weeklong trip to the Mississippi Delta where she participated in a mission to provide medical assistance and education on the prevention and treatment of diabetes to one of the poorest and neediest areas in the United States. The mission was organized by Calvary Baptist Church in New York City.

The mission was staffed by 32 volunteers who formed teams to address three crucial areas of need: education, construction and medical services. These dedicated individuals worked in some of the Mississippi Delta's poorest counties, Mayersville, Arcola and Lambert. As a member of the Medical Team, Dorita and her fellow missionaries provided diabetic care and instruction with the help of representatives from the American Diabetes Association.

The VNA of Hudson Valley was fully supportive of Dorita and her decision to reach out to those in need. VNAHV vendor Henry Schein also recognized the importance of this mission by donating supplies including: glucometers, genie lancets, alcohol pads, gloves, band-aids, glucometer strips, sharps containers, hand sanitizers, and pamphlets on diabetic management and diets.

Dorita has always been interested in doing charity missionary work, but hadn't considered doing anything until after she retired. That changed after she read "The Purpose Driven Life." One chapter in particular, entitled "What on Earth Am I Here For?", influenced her decision to immediately get involved in missionary work.

"People in the south are suffering. There is a lack of education, healthcare, housing and more. Delta has the highest rates of diabetes, illiteracy and unemployment. I just wanted the opportunity to empower people to take charge of their health. I've never worked so hard emotionally and spiritually," said Dorita. "Thanks to the support of the VNA, I was able to use my expertise to make a difference for so many. This trip was a culmination of what we do here in Westchester County everyday - provide healthcare and support to all those who need us."

## Technology Shifts Focus from Paper Care to Patient Care

Technology is pervasive in our lives and healthcare is no exception. The VNA of Hudson Valley realized early on the importance of technology in caring for those we serve. In a concerted effort to streamline operations while increasing efficiency and patient care services, we recently purchased laptops to equip all of our VNA and Hospice Care clinical field staff including nurses and therapists.

Having a laptop at a patient's home offers immediate access to medical record information which provides a greater level of accuracy and medical care quality. Instant access to all medical information empowers our staff to provide the best, most consistent care possible utilizing critical, up-to-date information.

Many of the VNA Nurses have been using laptops for some time with great results. The organization has seen a reduction in paperwork, errors and processing time resulting in more efficient use of resources. The results are that clinical staff can devote more time to patient care, our number one focus.

The recent equipment acquisition includes outfitting our Hospice field staff to have the same access and to ensure a smoother transition for those patients that may use the services of two or more of our healthcare organizations.

Comprehensive laptop training is ongoing for all clinical staff. "The technology is a tremendous help in our push to maximize resources while enhancing patient care," says Michele Quirolo, CEO. "In order to make this process as smooth and seamless as possible, the training of our professionals is vital. It is the back office efforts that make our frontline point of care the highest quality it can be."

# Home Health Services to Provide Certification Training for Home Health Aides

As the tremendous shortage of Home Health Aides increases, training for these para-professionals is becoming ever more important to ensure the quality of care provided to



individuals in the community. With years of expertise in the field, VNA Home Health Services has applied to the New York State Department of Health to provide this specialized

training that leads to certification, which is required for employment in New York State. Upon final approval, the first training class is expected to be held in the fall of this year.

Individuals who can attend this training program include those with no prior experience, Personal Care Aides who wish to go a step further and Certified Nurse Aides who may want to work in the home as opposed to a skilled facility. Student nurses who wish to work while going to school can also receive competency evaluation and skills review which will certify them as Home Health Aides. The first hand patient care experience is invaluable to students and it also offers them an opportunity that may lead to a position with our RN program after graduation. Training is also offered to Certified Home Health Aides from other states who need a NYS certification.

As a training site, Home Health Services will receive approval of their site which includes an appropriate floor plan for the training room, required equipment such as a hospital bed, a commode and other equipment, review of the instructors' credentials and compliance with record keeping.

The training classes are free of charge and run for three weeks at a time. Instruction is provided by a Registered Nurse and a Physical Therapist. Students' skills will also be reviewed by an RN on at least ten occasions at a patient's home.

Applicants for the Home Health Aide classes must pass a basic reading and math test, have medical documentation of their good health and be screened thoroughly through the use of background checks, drug testing, finger printing and references. ## Geriatric Care Consultation Services Now Offered

WNA Home Health Services now offers Geriatric Care Consultation Services to families and individuals involved in the support of elderly people who need assistance to continue to live in their own homes. This new program guides families through the process of determining where to begin, what questions to ask and how to arrange for services.

A professional team of nurses, social workers and geriatric care managers will help families identify needs and develop a plan for personalized services which will maximize the independence, safety and comfort of their loved one at home. The service will help determine if a client is eligible for services under Medicare or Medicaid and if Long Term Care insurance or private pay resources can be utilized for the most cost-effective plan. It will also address issues such as the management of nonmedical needs, home maintenance and socialization.

A family member, friend or other responsible party may request a consultation. The initial evaluation is provided, at no charge, over the phone or at the VNA HHS office. Staff is professionally trained and experienced in assessing the medical, social and physical care needs of the client. Through the VNA HHS Care Plus Program, families and caregivers can choose from a wide variety of in-home support such as companionship services, light housekeeping, meal planning, doctors visit accompaniment, medication reminders or assistance with pet care. Ultimately, the Geriatric Care Consultation Services aims to make the process of care-giving as easy and simple as possible for the caregiver, the family and the patient.

## New Bereavement Support Groups Offered

This group started in January on a trial basis and, after much interest, the group has now been opened to the general public. The Tarrytown group meets on the second Tuesday of every month at the corporate office located at 540 White Plains Road.
