

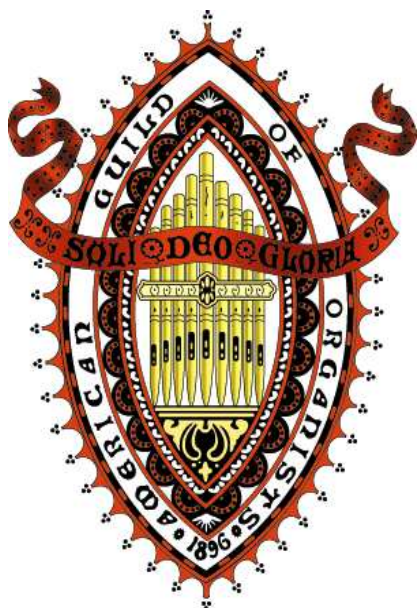

Hector Olivera -Renowned and legendary Argentinean organist has stunned audiences with his wizardry at the console. He is a passionate, gifted, and unique musician whose personal interpretations of both classical and popular music have delighted audiences around the world. Trained at the prestigious Juilliard School of Music, Olivera has performed for the American Guild of Organists National Conventions in 2002 and 2004 and numerous regional conventions spontaneously bringing large audiences of peers to their feet. In addition to playing the Moller organ at the Forum, one of Harrisburg's major performing arts facilities and home to the Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra, Olivera brings his Roland Attalier instrument, on which he plays organ concerti - performing both the organ and orchestra parts at the same time.

Diane Meredith Belcher - is widely known as a fine pedagogue, having taught at The University of Memphis, Westminster Choir College, The University of Pennsylvania, and several Pipe Organ Encounters of the American Guild of Organists. She is currently Organist-Choirmaster at Old St. Paul's in Baltimore, Maryland. A graduate of The Curtis Institute and the Eastman School of Music, Belcher is an internationally acclaimed concert artist, having made her solo debut at age fifteen. Her solo orchestral appearances are numerous, including the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Jacksonville Symphony, the Memphis Symphony Orchestra, and the Philadelphia Chamber Orchestra. She has been a church musician and choral conductor for over 30 years, having served churches in Philadelphia, Memphis, Syracuse and Baltimore, and was the founding director of the Memphis Concert Chorale.



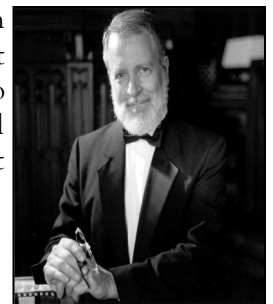
Craig Cramer - Professor of Organ and Artist in Residence at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana, grew up in the nearby community of Dillsburg, PA. Trained at the Westminster Choir College and Eastman School, he is one of the most traveled organists of his generation. Cramer maintains an active recital career across the country and in Europe. Cramer has performed for conventions of the American Guild of Organists and ALCM, as well as for many AGO Chapters across the country. He has also appeared as a soloist with numerous orchestras. Cramer was instrumental in the planning and design of a new organ hall on the campus of the University of Notre Dame, home of an organ built by Paul Fritts. Cramer is a frequent guest on the nationally-syndicated program, "Pipedreams" (American Public Radio).



Shelly Moorman-Stahlman - is Professor of Organ at Lebanon Valley College in Annville, PA. A graduate of the University of Iowa, she is a frequent recitalist throughout the Midwest and East Coast. Moorman-Stahlman has garnered an impressive array of competition credits, including semi-finalist at the St. Albans International Organ Competition in England, Audience Prize at Spivey International Organ Competition, finalist in the Arthur Poister Competition, second prize in the MTNA National Wurlitzer Competition and finalist in the Region VI AGO Competition. A past Dean of the Harrisburg Chapter, Moorman-Stahlman is currently Director of the Committee on Professional Education for the AGO.



John Tuttle - is Organist and Choirmaster of Saint Thomas' Church, Toronto. He teaches organ for the Faculty of Music and serves as Organist to the University of Toronto since 1979. In 2006 he was appointed Organist and Choirmaster of Trinity College at the University of Toronto. He is Founder and Conductor of the Exultate Chamber Singers. John studied organ at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia with Alexander McCurdy. He served in the United States Army as Organist and Choirmaster of the Post Chapel at the United States Military Academy, West Point, NY. He returned to Philadelphia to serve as Dr. McCurdy's successor at the First Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia in 1971. In the Fall of 2005 he was honored by a Doctor of Sacred Letters degree (honoris causa) from Trinity College at the University of Toronto, for his contributions to church and choral music in Canada.





Rhonda Sider Edgington - Rhonda Sider Edgington has worked and studied as an organist, pianist, harpsichordist, and carillonneur. Born and raised in Dillsburg, PA, Edgington was surrounded by music, growing up in a musical family. She has taught lessons privately and on the university level (Concordia University, River Forest, IL, and Houghton College, NY), worked as a church musician, given recitals in the US and Germany, and been a prize winner in several competitions. Arriving in Bremen, Germany in 2004 on a US Fulbright Scholarship to study with Prof. Harald Vogel the music and organs of 16th and 17th century North Germany, she remained there to work as a church musician and performer, and to continue her studies.



Marcos Krieger - Marcos Krieger is a keyboard artist with extensive training in early music and early keyboard technique. While pursuing his doctoral work under the supervision of the renowned Bach scholars Quentin Faulkner and George Ritchie, Marcos Krieger studied the keyboard literature of central Germany, specifically the Bach Circle. He expanded his repertoire by further studies in Spain, Italy, and Germany, exploring the Iberian and Italian repertoire and technique for early keyboards. He is presently Assistant Professor of Music at Susquehanna University (ELCA) in Selinsgrove, PA, where he teaches Organ, Harpsichord, and Music History.

Mark Laubach - Canon Mark Laubach is Organist and Choirmaster of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, the Pro-Cathedral of the Diocese of Bethlehem. In 1982, he received a bachelor's degree in Church Music, magna cum laude, from Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ. In 1984, he received a master's degree in Organ Performance and Literature from the Eastman School of Music (University of Rochester) where he studied organ with David Craighead and harpsichord with Arthur Haas. In May of 2006, Canon Laubach was invited to perform in a gala recital and reception in Philadelphia to honor Dr. Craighead, Professor Emeritus of Organ at the Eastman School of Music. Canon Laubach is a past regional chairman of the Association of Anglican Musicians and a past Dean of the Pennsylvania Northeast Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.



All of the recitals are open to the public however a ticket is required for the Hector Olivera concert held on Thursday, June 30th at 8:00 PM. The Whitaker Center will handle the sale of tickets for this event. **Please note: If you are registered for the convention, this concert is included in your registration fee.** Please invite your family and friends to come to this concert. 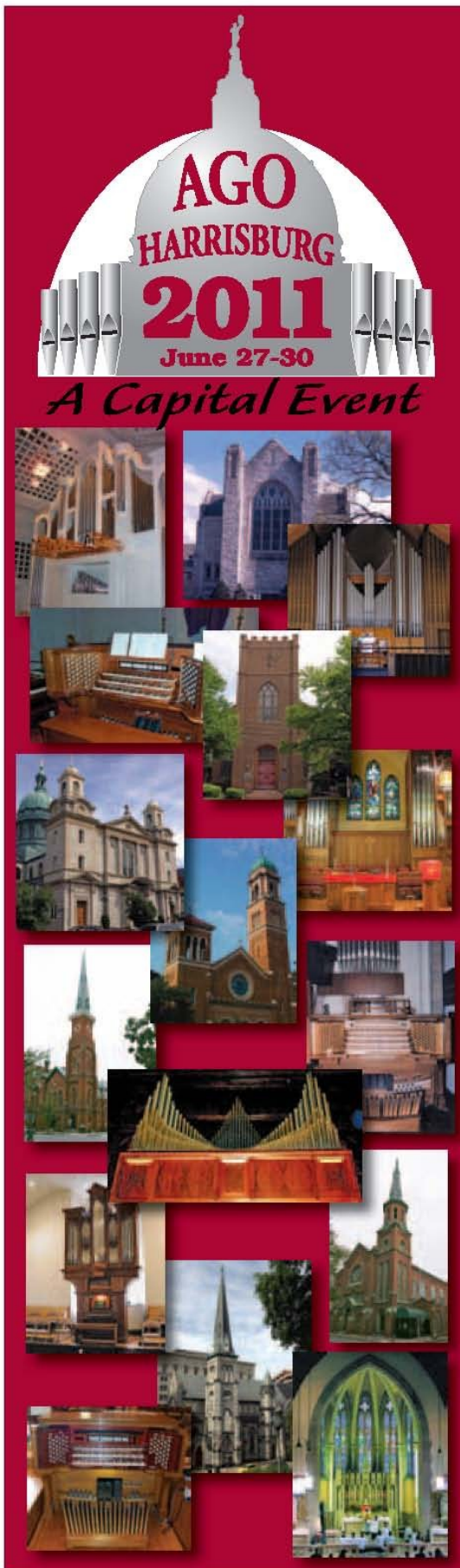

Cassel Competition Winner

Our local competition named in memory of Violette Cassel, one of the Quimby Regional Competitions for Young Organists (RCYO) of the American Guild of Organists, was held at First United Methodist Church in Hershey on Saturday, April 1, 2011. Our own chapter member **Ryan Brunkhurst** was awarded the first prize and will go on to compete at the Regional Competition on June 27, 2011 during the convention hosted by our local chapter.

Ryan Brunkhurst (b.1993) has been at the keyboards, both piano and organ, since the age of two. When a search for an organ teacher failed because he was too young, Brunkhurst began his first piano lessons at age five with Mary-Catherine Tierney in Hershey. He later began more difficult piano studies with piano teacher, Ann Layser in Palmyra, with whom he studied for six years.



In 2002, Ryan was awarded a Shenk scholarship by the Harrisburg AGO to study organ with Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman, Associate Professor of Music at Lebanon Valley College. Shortly after, Ryan began studies with Andrew Long, a Lebanon Valley College student at the time; Shawn Gingrich in Hershey; and Thomas Tielhel in Harrisburg. Brunkhurst has now been a private student of Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman for the last five years.

In 2003, Ryan was awarded first place prize from the National Federation of Music Clubs for the Akins-Cadman Organ Competition which is held annually. In 2005, he attended his first Pipe Organ Encounter (POE) in Baltimore, Maryland. He then took part in his second POE in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. In 2008, Brunkhurst won first place at West Chester Universities Organ Competition. This summer, Brunkhurst will Attend "Back Home in Indiana," a POE sponsored by Indiana University of Bloomington.

Brunkhurst has been fortunate enough to be featured in many publicity stories. He was featured in the Harrisburg Patriot News, the Lebanon Daily News, and was interviewed by the National United Methodist Church for his work with the Mount Gretna United Methodist Church choir. The video was then aired in news stations throughout the country and at the National United Methodist Convention in 2008. He was then interviewed by ABC 27 News as they conducted a segment to promote 'The Year of the Organ.'

When Brunkhurst was 11, he took on role of organist at Mount Gretna United Methodist Church in Mount Gretna, and when he was 13 assumed the position of organist and choir director at the church. After four years at Mount Gretna United Methodist Church, he became organist and choir director at Saint Mark Lutheran Church in Annville, Pennsylvania. He now serves as organist at Palmyra United Methodist Church in Palmyra.

Brunkhurst is very active in the Mount Gretna community and has played benefit recitals for the Mount Gretna Fire Company and the Mount Gretna United Methodist Church raising very large sums of money for both charities. He maintains a very active and rigorous recital schedule playing in many venues across the country and in Pennsylvania. Ryan currently holds the role of Member at Large on the Executive Board of the Harrisburg Chapter AGO

Brunkhurst performed on August 8th, 2010 with renowned trumpeter, Rodney Mack and his equally famous Philadelphia Big Brass Band in a Trumpet and Organ concert at the Mount Gretna Playhouse and Theater, sponsored by Music at Gretna and directed by *Paul Bryan*, registrar and associate dean of academic affairs, *Curtis Institute of Music*.

We thank our judges for the competition, Dr. Shirley King, Dr. Ralph Kneeream, and Dr. Robert Lau. Congratulations Ryan on this accomplishment and best wishes in the next step of competition.

CODE OF ETHICS - Revised by the National Council on April 16, 2007

Preamble: The purpose of the American Guild of Organists is to promote the organ in its historic and evolving roles, to encourage excellence in the performance of organ and choral music, and to provide a forum for mutual support, inspiration, education, and certification of Guild members. Voting members are entitled to enjoy the privileges and are expected to accept the responsibilities of membership in the Guild. Members shall be considered equally for Guild offices and participation in Guild activities. These are the rules that shall be considered binding upon all voting members in good standing.

RULE 1. Members shall promote good working relationships within the American Guild of Organists and shall respect the employment of colleagues. Members shall address differences between themselves and other members by following the procedures outlined in the Discipline.

RULE 2. Members shall not seek or appear to be seeking employment for themselves, a student, or a colleague, in a position held by someone else. Members shall apply for employment only for a position which the employer, with the knowledge of the incumbent musician, has officially and publicly declared vacant by announcement of the vacancy.

RULE 3. In cases pending under the Procedures or in cases where the National Council has determined that a position has been made vacant by wrongful termination of a member of the American Guild of Organists, members shall not seek or accept regular or permanent employment for themselves, a student, or colleague at that Institution until the National Council is satisfied that differences between the Guild and the Institution have been resolved. Interim services may be provided for a period of 90 days.

RULE 4. Members shall obtain the approval of the incumbent musician before accepting an engagement for a wedding, funeral, or other service requested by a third party. In such cases, the incumbent should receive his/her customary fee, and the third party is expected to provide it. It is the responsibility of the guest member to inform the third party of this rule. Members are advised to protect themselves as incumbents in this regard by negotiating employment contracts which secure these fees and which provide some responsibility, oversight, and control as to choice of music, etc.

RULE 5. Members shall conduct professional activities with truthfulness, honesty and integrity, and shall maintain sensitivity in matters of a personal or confidential nature.

RULE 6. Members shall not discriminate against others on the basis of race, national origin, age, religious affiliation, gender, marital status, sexual orientation, disability, or medical condition (including, but not limited to, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).

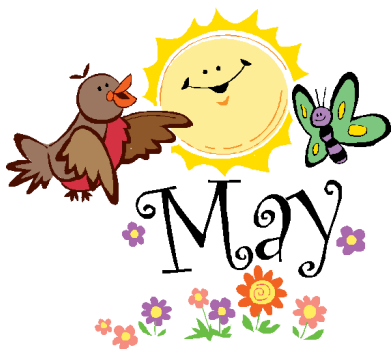

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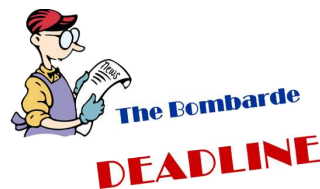
