The weather has been as changeable as the route has been challenging. #### **Public Inquiry result**

The disputed footpath at Seend Head Mill is to be upgraded to a restricted byway, which is WONDERFUL news. The four day inquiry heard a massive amount of evidence from both sides, nearly all of which was historical documentary evidence, and although the inspector said it was "finely balanced" he has approved the order.

The earliest evidence was from the Wiltshire Quarter Sessions of 1674, with a signed and sealed certificate confirming the inhabitants of Seend had sufficiently repaired the 'King's Highway' in a place called Seend Head Mill leading towards Trowbridge, sufficient to allow passage of horses, carts and carriages. This was considered in the context of all the other evidence and maps, and also much evidence from the landowner.

You were all prepared to spare time for the scheme, making my task pleasant, interesting and satisfying.

#### **CHURCH AND CHAPEL NEWS**

#### Maureen's ramblings.....

I was told this story by someone whose integrity I trust. A friend went to a church service whilst on holiday. The church was using its new, 'state of the art' sound system for the first time. The congregation heard every word of the service, some for the first time in years! But disaster struck at the end of the service. The priest proclaimed the words: "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord". At that very moment a local taxi firm came on air, loud and clear through the speakers: ".... go to number 37 Acacia Avenue". The link was so seamless, and the breakthrough of such quality that the taxi operator might have been standing at the altar with the priest!

I am reluctant to make too strong an analogy from this, but it struck me as a passable illustration of how God breaks through into our lives. We cannot ask the sceptical children of a rational age to expect God to speak from the mountain tops or in the flutter of angel wings. Those who hear voices may be sent to a psychiatrist; those who see visions may be advised to see an optician! The modern world is wary of miracles. But I do believe in miracles. Sometimes God reveals himself in ways that confound the laws of reason. For some people there may be neon lights and trumpets - experiences that are totally life-changing. But more often God speaks to us in breakthrough moments, making himself known through ordinary things. He speaks to us through the words of friends, through our reaction to our emotions, through an unexpected sequence of events, through the stirrings of our conscience, in a sudden crisis or a moment of joy. The God

who loves us, who is always with us whether we believe or not, whether we listen or not, is always seeking to find ways to say, "I love you", "I am here". God can use every facet of our experience as a channel of communication. Mind you, we might be better tuned in to God if we were to spend a little more time in silence and to actually invite his involvement in our lives!

A doubting friend of mine once prayed 'God, if you are there, show yourself to me'. God answered not with a thundering voice, but slowly, gently and almost imperceptibly. 'Coincidentally' she met people who shared their faith with her; she attended a funeral service that opened her heart to the possibility of eternity and, after a minor op, she found time to reflect on her life. Step by step, honest doubt turned to a fledgling faith.

Of course, if God speaks so quietly to us it means that we can dismiss his presence as coincidence or wishful thinking. It is only when experience is examined in faith that we can recognise God *breaking through* with a message of love, encouragement, challenge or guidance. I doubt whether God has ever used a sound system to pass on a message, nevertheless I do believe that God is always walking alongside us, longing for us to encounter him. And it is by reflecting on the ordinary things of our life that we can sometimes recognise God *breaking through* to us.

#### **FROM ROY**

I am in the middle of reading Marcus Borg's most recent book 'Jesus' (published this year by SPCK). Borg is a well known American Jesus Scholar, but less well known in this country. There is a very interesting chapter in the book called 'The Shaping of Jesus – His experience of God', where Borg outlines a picture of Jesus as being in mystical relationship with God, whom he encounters and addresses in the intimacy of a relationship in which Jesus uses a child's familiar name for father (Abba – best translated not as father, but perhaps as Daddy).

Jesus stands in a long tradition, where God or the sacred are known as an experienced, personal reality. God is known through visions, long hours of prayer and the presence of God's Spirit. So at his baptism, Jesus has a personal sense of God's Spirit coming upon him. In the wilderness, he sees visions. At his transfiguration, Jesus is filled with the radiant presence of God that reflects two of the most mystic experiences of God in the Old Testament: Moses face shining with the glory of God at Mount Sinai and Elijah's experience of the still, small voice at Mount Horeb. Perhaps what marks these experiences of Jesus is that they are direct encounters with God. Jesus sees God anew. His vision of God is not shaped by a received, conventional understanding, but arises out of personal re-connection with God beyond traditional images and ideas, and even

transcends them. It is a sense of a presence beyond our human comprehension, but life giving and life-affirming.

All this leads me to wonder: how given are we to seeking the presence of God as sacred other? Where in our lives do we seek to transcend the ordinary and the conventional and discover the one who is both life-giving and life-affirming.

As part of **Christ Church, Bulkington's 150th Anniversary** celebration year (from September 2010), the Church Council set itself the target of raising £900 to be given away to local and national charities. We are delighted to say that we actually raised over £1000!! Thanks to everyone who supported our efforts.

<u>The July Meeting of the Parish Council</u> started on a sad note with notice of the recent death of Charlie Bath. He had lived many years in the village and was known to all - Bulkington will not seem the same without him.

The Parish Council went on to co-opt Mrs Christine Parkyn as its seventh Councillor. She replaces Tony Bradford who had to retire because increasing deafness made taking part in meetings impossible, and will take over as the Bulkington contact for Footpaths and Parish Stewards.

After hearing about the problems caused by HMRC's sudden demand that small Parish Councils register as employers for tax and National Insurance purposes, Councillors went on to happy news of the Playing Field Lottery Grant. Not only

had the Grant been finally approved, tenders had been awarded and work had actually started. A grand opening was fixed for Saturday 3rd September.

There are still problems with drivers speeding through the village; the Chairman will try to get the Police to do a check at around 4pm, which is the worst time according to most residents. Many ideas for slowing traffic were suggested, but none was decided on.

Finally, Councillor Mrs Read said it was time to get planning for next year's Diamond Jubilee underway, with a group combining representatives of the Parish Council, the PCC and the Village Hall.

#### **Bulkington Playing Field**

#### **The Launch Party**

A successful launch party on 3<sup>rd</sup> September heralded the re-opening of the Bulkington Playing Field, the culmination of over a year's hard work by the Playing Field Committee and many notable others. The lottery and Community Spaces provided funding and guidance. Thankfully, the rain kept away and crowds of villagers of all ages joined together for a glass of fizz, BBQ and home-made cakes. It was great to see so many people using the new equipment, and to hear the positive feedback. Liz Futter opened the new playing field by breaking through a red ribbon as she travelled down the zip wire!

A wooden bench provides a permanent memorial to William (Bill) Breach who gave the field to the village. The Committee would like to thank the Parish Council for donating the bench. The inscription on the brass plaque reads;

#### **SEEND PARISH COUNCIL**

The meeting held on **Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> July** was attended by 9 Councillors with Mrs. Heatley in the chair. Apologies received from Mrs. G. A'Bear, Mrs L. Waylen, Cllr. J. Seed and PC Emily Thomas.

Prior to the start of the meeting, the Chairman showed Councillors a gavel that had been made by, and presented to the PC, by Cliff Inns, which has now been engraved. The Chairman said that she had written to Mr. Inns, thanking him for this kind gesture.

**Relocation of postal sorting office** – The Clerk of Melksham Town Council had forwarded a Press Release, following a meeting on 22<sup>nd</sup> July between Melksham TC and Royal Mail. This stated that Royal Mail was seeking to contract with Post Office Counters to provide a collection facility for undelivered mail, preferably at the current location, but if not at an alternative site within the town centre.

War Memorial – It was agreed that the Clerk would submit a bid to the Area Board on behalf of the PC for a grant towards the refurbishment.

Allotments – An e-mail had been received from Andy Cadwallader, Area Highway Engineer, confirming that any work on the highway or in conjunction with access on to the highway would require highway authority approval. He expressed concerns about the PC's proposals to improve the access to the allotments; these included allotment holders parking on Bollands Hill by the entrance for loading and unloading, and asking for the PC's plan for tenants travelling to and from the allotments and their parking. The parish should also ensure that any planned works do not require planning permission. The Clerk to advise Highways that tenants live locally and will not park on Bollands Hill by the entrance. The Clerk to ask Wessex Water to supply a plan showing the location of the water main. The Clerk to ask the Probation Service if they could clear the northern section of the allotment site.

Love Walk, replacement of stone steps – The Clerk would be meeting with Jason Willcox of Longs to obtain a quote for repair of the steps.

Canal Bridge, Barge Inn –A report of the bridge inspection has been received from British Waterways, and had been circulated by e-mail to members of the PC.

Bus stop, Bath Road – The Clerk to contact Adshel about provision of a bus shelter.

#### Highway Matters

The Clerk had obtained the cost of a grit bin for The Lye. A tonne of salt would be requested, to be delivered to Egypt Farm.

The Clerk was asked to check whether the tarmac had been tested on the path from The Bell to The Stocks.

E-mail received from Mark Stansby to advise that all requisite Children (school) warnings signs are in place at either end of School Road.

Mr. Stansby advised that Vehicle Activated Warning Signs (Road Narrows signs) at the pinch point at the western end of the High Street by Wesley Cottage could cost a five figure sum. He suggested that if the PC wished to pursue this matter it should be reported as a new issue via the Area Board to request it be considered as a community priority scheme, for future funding. In the meantime he will arrange for replacement static road narrows sign to be positioned on the eastbound approach.

E-mail sent to Mark Stansby on 25 July to ask if he can advise if historical information on speed limits can be obtained.

Spiderweb Paddock –E-mail sent to Trading Standards re. Spiderweb Paddock; acknowledgement received from Hannah Sargeant, Public Protection Officer (Animal Health & Welfare), based in Salisbury advising that she will make enquiries and contact the PC once they have been completed.

Horse manège, Broad Lane – Email from Steven Jenkins to advise that he received an email from the owners' agent, indicating that they are going to submit an application in August. He will advise when it is received.

Old Railway Bridge, Station Road –It was agreed to continue to try and reduce the speed limit. Remedial works to the bridge should be completed by the end of August. A further accident had taken place, with a car leaving the road travelling south to north; this has been logged by police.

*Public Enquiry, footpath* – Still awaiting the result.

Mrs Savage reported that the last meeting dealt mostly with the care of the elderly. The next meeting is on 20<sup>th</sup> September.

#### Village Appraisal

Mr. Murch reported that all forms were delivered. He had encountered some negativity whilst delivering forms. Collection was now due. He needs support to input data. The final report will be considered at a meeting in October, with participating organisations present. Marion Rayner has agreed to attend at 7.00 pm, prior to the September PC meeting, to talk about Parish Plans.

#### **Planning Matters**

Plans for approval

E/11/0799/FUL Wych Elm, Seend Hill, Seend

Alterations to access; first floor extension over car port and existing utility room to create additional residential accommodation.

Councillors felt this application consisted of two separate issues, the extension to the bungalow, and the new access onto the A361, and they would consider them separately. With regard to the proposed extension, Councillors voted unanimously to support the application. With regard to the alterations to the access, Councillors voted by a majority not to support the application for the change to the access, taking the report of Highways into consideration. Vote 4 against, 2 in favour, 2 abstain.

E/11/0868/FULCleeve House, Trowbridge Road, Seend

Retrospective application for a change of use to allow the property to be used as a bed and breakfast establishment, wedding venue, conference and training venue, tea room and ancillary uses associated with the hire of the venue

Following discussion, the Councillors voted by majority in favour of the application. Vote 7 in favour, 1 against.

E/11/0875/FUL Hill View Farmhouse, Sells Green, Seend

External refurbishment of existing mobile home

Mr. D Nichols declared an interest and withdrew from the discussion. Following discussion, the Councillors voted by a majority in favour of the application. Vote 5 in favour, 2 against, 1 abstention.

#### E/11/0903/TCA 15 Dial Close, Seend

Works to trees in a conservation area

Following discussion, Councillors voted unanimously in favour of the application.

#### Appeal decision on application E/10/0516/FUL – Land at Berhills Lane:

Proposed creation of family golf centre. A site visit was made on 1<sup>st</sup> June. The Appeal was dismissed on the following grounds:

Road has restricted width and forward visibility in places and lack of footways.

Highway Authority is concerned that the Transport Assessment under-estimates the additional traffic that cannot be adequately accommodated by the C242.

The proposed site access, car park and bays serving the driving range would be close to a dwelling 'Equestria', undermining the living conditions of the occupants.

The meeting held on Tuesday, 30<sup>th</sup> August was attended by 9 Councillors, with Mrs. T. Carr in the chair. Apologies received from Mr. P. Manning.

#### Election of Chairman, following the resignation of Anita Heatley

The Chair was taken by the Vice-Chairman, Mrs. T. Carr. Mrs. Carr suggested that a letter of thanks be sent to Mrs. Heatley for all her hard work whilst Chairman of the PC. Mrs. Carr asked if there were any nominations, there were none, or any volunteers, also none. Mr. Diffey suggested that election of a Chairman be deferred because of lack of response. Mrs. Carr advised that she would not be present for the next meeting, and gave her apologies. Mr. Padfield offered to chair that meeting in Mrs. Carr's absence.

Relocation of postal sorting office – Response received from Richard Hall, Senior External Relations Manager, to advise that Royal Mail is planning to secure a facility in Melksham to enable customers to collect mail locally on the occasions it has not been possible to deliver.

War Memorial – An application for a grant towards the cost of refurbishment of the War Memorial had been submitted to the Area Board, and will be considered at their next meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> September.

Allotments – E-mail received from Andy Cadwallader confirming that Wiltshire Council as a Highway Authority has no objection to the proposal, subject to conditions. Wessex Water has submitted a plan showing the location of water mains. Community Payback have indicated their willingness to undertake further clearance work at the allotment site, work to take place in October.

Love Walk, replacement of stone steps – Quote received from James Long in the sum of £2,100 + VAT to repair and rebuild the steps. This has been e-mailed to Richard Broadhead and Esther Daly. Esther trying to obtain an alternative quotation for the work.

Bus stop, Bath Road –E-mail received from Clear Channel, to advise that they are no longer supplying Adshel bus shelters in Wiltshire and are unable to help. This matter has been reported as an issue to the Area Board.

#### Highway Matters

Confirmation from Highways that a tonne of salt will be delivered to Egypt Farm in September or October. It was agreed to order a bin of the same size as those supplied by Wiltshire Council. Mrs. Waylen to check the best location for the bin at The Lye and advise.

E-mail received from Peter Hanson, Divisional Highway Manager, to advise that the path clearance along the A361 has now taken place, and they will be checking the state of the bitumous surfacing. When the extent of the work is known, it will be put in for consideration in the next financial year's programme.

Cllr. Seed suggested putting any requests for additional signage at the western end of the High Street on hold, and continue to monitor the situation.

E-mail from Mark Stansby to advise that the Traffic Order Team have confirmed that there has never been a permanent 30 mph limit at Bollands Hill. The lack of frontage development excludes the road from meeting the current criteria to impose such a limit.

Spiderweb Paddock –E-mail received from Hannah Sargeant, Public Protection Officer, to advise that she had visited Spiderweb Paddock and confirms that it is registered correctly for keeping pigs, and she had no welfare concerns regarding the pigs at the time of her visit. Telephone conversation with Christopher Stratton at the Environment Agency in Chippenham, who confirms that he has no concerns about storage and removal of waste from the site, or contamination of underground springs as things stand at present. However, if the enterprise were to be expanded and pigs kept in units, then there would have to be changes to the way slurry was stored and disposed of.

Old Railway Bridge, Station Road -remedial works not yet complete.

*Public Enquiry, footpath* – Notice of confirmation of Rights of Way Modification Order 21 2008 received with effect from 10<sup>th</sup> August 2011.

Barbara Booth, trees in memory – Quotes awaited for trees. Two sites for trees had been identified in Seend Cleeve, one at the bottom of Miss Booth's garden, to replace a lilac tree that has died, and the second in Park Lane, where it was suggested a May or Hawthorn tree could be placed. Mr. Murch said that at the previous meeting he had suggested a tree on the triangle of land he owns in Bradley Lane, but this had not been minuted. Mr. Padfield proposed that the full costs of obtaining the trees, and the costs of maintaining them until they are established be obtained, seconded by Mrs. Savage. All in favour.

*Police Matters* – PCSO Baldock reported that an offender has been identified for the theft of tiles from Egypt Farm. On 20<sup>th</sup> August half a ton of logs had been stolen from Little Foxes, Rusty Lane during the night. Following Mrs. Heatley's

resignation, the PC needed a member to act as liaison with the Police. Mrs. A'Bear volunteered to undertake this role

#### Village Appraisal

Mr. Murch was still awaiting some forms. 420 forms had been returned. The other organisations have their forms. The PC information will now need to be input by the end of September with a view to having a general meeting in October. 800 forms were copied, 150 refused or were unable to complete, over 50% have responded. Mr. Murch has received a letter from Miriam Zacharelli of the Community Area Partnership, and he felt it would be helpful to have a meeting with her.

#### **Planning Matters**

An e-mail had been received from David Hawkins, re. his application to move the drive at Wych Elm, in which he has indicated that he wishes to make a complaint because of an internal dispute between Wiltshire Council officers seeking advice from superiors.

E/11/1009/FUL 56 Pelch Lane, Seend

Erect detached annexe

Comments – If this application is approved, it should be tied to the house, and the annexe not allowed to be sold separately. Vote -8 in favour, 1 abstention.

E/11/1013/FUL Owls Corner, Martinslade, Seend

Extension and alteration to existing studio/bungalow to create separate self-contained dwelling

There had been two objections from neighbours to this application. Mrs Savage said that there are a number of discrepancies in the application:

- The property is not on mains drainage, there is one septic tank for three properties.
- The annexe has always been a workshop, and has never been used as accommodation.
- Having looked at the site, she doubts there is enough room for vehicles to enter the site and turn around, and there is a danger that vehicles would need to back out onto the busy A365.

Mrs. Carr was concerned that windows are shown on the boundary to the neighbouring property, if windows are needed they should be dormer. The current windows will infringe the privacy of neighbours. She is also concerned about the entrance and the ability to turn vehicles.

Mr. Padfield also expressed concerns about the privacy for neighbouring properties and the parking and turning of vehicles.

Mr. Hicks and Mrs. Hawkins were present, and Mr. Hicks gave the background to the application. He confirmed that it was intended to amend the plans to replace the windows with skylights. The two small windows can be removed. It was intended to improve the drainage situation, the outflow will be registered. He understood the misgivings about the parking and turning, it was envisaged that vehicles will go into the frontage of the new property where there will be a turning space. Mr. Hicks said that the neighbours have permission to park two vehicles on the current drive.

Following discussion, a vote was taken, and was unanimous not to approve the current application, with comments to be passed to Wiltshire Council with regard to the drainage, highway concerns and windows.

E/11/1057/FUL Land off Broad Lane, Sells Green

Retention of manège and resurfaced hardstanding

Following discussion a vote was taken with 7 not in favour of the application, 1 abstention. Comments for Wiltshire Council that the PC feel this is over-development of this rural location.

#### Correspondence

Letter received from Wiltshire Police to advise that from 19 September, there will be a new non-emergency number to call when contacting local Police, this will be 101.

**Footpath SEEN 4, Three Magpies –** Dog walkers using this footpath are failing to pick up after their dogs. The caravan park to be asked to highlight this to campers using the footpath. The Area Board to be asked if rubbish bins could be placed in this locality to help the situation.

School Road – Mr. Diffey had advised the Clerk that a cement lorry had been washed out outside the school, leaving residue on the verge and in the road. The Clerk had advised the Environment Agency, who had confirmed with Wessex Water that water courses had not been contaminated. Mr. Nichols advised that it was the supplier, not the contractor that was responsible in a case of this kind. The Clerk to check again with the Environment Agency if any action was being taken.

**Spout Lane** – The Clerk to ask Highways if a sign could be placed at the T junction with Berhills Lane and the A365, signing left for Seend, so that traffic went through Martinslade to Seend Fork, then turned right for Seend, rather than turn right and go up Spout Lane.

#### **WILTSHIRE COUNCIL NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED**

The long awaited Boundary Commission report recommending the new shape of Parliamentary constituencies in the United Kingdom has just been published. Overall this reduces the number of MPs by 50 and makes the number of voters in each new constituency almost the same. In Wiltshire the proposal is for some

realignment with a new seat crossing the Dorset border in the south and west. The Chippenham Constituency as we knew it disappears with Chippenham and Corsham going back to North Wiltshire. One of the criteria for the Boundary Commission was that Council Divisions would not be split and that means that the Summerham and Seend Division (itself a creation of the Boundary Commission) will go into one constituency and not be split between three constituencies as it currently is. The plan is that we become part of the new mid Wiltshire constituency which will include Melksham, Trowbridge and Bradford on Avon plus surrounding areas. The proposal is to name the seat Trowbridge but given the inclusion of three large towns I would have though Mid Wiltshire or something similar would be more appropriate. The new seat will be politically very marginal and it will be interesting to see if any locals come forward with a view to representing a new and exciting Parliamentary seat. All these proposals are subject to consultation before a final decision is made. The big Regional meeting will be a Boundary Commission hearing on the local proposals in Bristol on 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> November. In the meantime any member of the public can make their own comments. Do look on the Boundary Commission website, see just what is proposed and then have your say.

In Seend I learnt of the resignation of Parish Council Chairman Anita Heatley with sadness. Anita brought a no-nonsense and common sense approach to her role as would be expected from an experienced Magistrate. She will be sadly missed but we all wish her successor, however temporary, Councillor Thelma Carr the very best of luck. Mrs Carr brings with her a great experience in local government and I look forward to working with her on your behalf.

#### Credit card scam

Someone claiming to be from a credit card company's fraud department calls and says there has been some unusual purchase activity on your card recently (a large sum) and they are checking to see if it is a genuine purchase made by you. After a lot of friendly and persuasive chat the caller says he needs to check that you are the owner of the card and it is in your possession. They already know your card number (easily obtained through normal sources) but need to know the security number of the back of the card just to 'verify' it is in your possession. This is of course just what the scammer is after. If you give that number they can and will make large untraceable telephone and internet purchases.

Card companies already know the card security number and would NEVER ask you for it.

#### 'Microsoft' telephone scam

An old scam has recently re-surfaced in this area. It starts with a telephone call seemingly from Microsoft (or it may be from a self-styled 'Computer Security Company'). The caller will tell you that you have problems on your PC/laptop, but will assure you that he is able to help you solve them. Please note that **Microsoft will never, ever phone a PC user**. If you get such a call tell them - politely or impolitely - to go away! But if you're not sure, call me (Bernie Prolze, 828391) and we can investigate further – at no cost to anyone!
