Non Violent Crisis Intervention – Core Training: 6:30 – 9:30 PM, Sept 14, 16 & 17 at the People Place

Non Violent Crisis Intervention – Refresher: 9 AM – 2:30 PM, Sept 16 For Foster Parents whose certification has not expired.

Non Violent Crisis Intervention is a system for defusing escalating behavior and safely managing physically aggressive behavior. This training provides an understanding of effective communication during aggressive moments, along with the core philosophy of maintaining care, welfare, safety and security. It is recommended training for <u>all</u> Foster Parents, whether they have children who are physically aggressive or not.

On completion you will receive certification from the Crisis Prevention Institute No charge, but you MUST pre-register with Noelle. Seating is limited

Foster Care Education Program: Series Two of the Foster Care Education Program will be offered in Vernon this fall. The instructor will be Alison Dennis

The Foster Care Education Program is <u>required training</u> for all caregivers. Foster Parents are expected to complete this training within two years of their home opening. New Foster Parents should start with Series One, which will be offered in Vernon early in 2010.



Bullies: Their Making and Unmaking - a 4 hour videocourse

In this videocourse, Dr. Neufeld sheds light on this dark side of human nature. This refreshing developmental analysis of bullies reveals instinctive roots embedded in the dynamics of attachment and the flight from vulnerability. The implications for intervention and treatment are profound and largely counter to prevailing approaches. Invited to keynote on Canada's first national conference on bullying, Dr. Neufeld shares the insights that



have evolved as a result of years of experience working with bullies of all kinds, combined with his mastery of the developmental literature.



The Power to Parent Series The **Power to Parent** series is a relationship-based approach to parenting that restores parents to their natural intuition and helps children realize their innate potentials as human beings. Dr. Neufeld takes the best that developmental science has to offer and delivers it directly to the people who are the child's best bet. Dr. Neufeld offers a coherent approach that can guide parents in all their parental interactions with children of all ages. The series is meant to be taken in sequence.

The Vital Connection (Power to Parent Part I) - an eight-session videocourse


In this first volume, Dr. Neufeld focuses on the child-adult relationship as the context for raising children. Parents and professional learn how this relationship is meant to develop, what can go wrong, why peers must not matter more than parents, the true meaning of shyness, how to cultivate a context of connection, how to win back one's child if need be, how to preserve the connection, and more. Parents and professionals also learn about the kinds of interactions and discipline that erode the relationship and effective alternatives that are attachment-safe.

Helping Children Grow Up (Power to Parent Part II) - an eight-session videocourse

How do we nurture our children and provide the necessary elements for growth? How do we remove the impediments to becoming their own persons? Building on the foundation of relationship in Part I of the series, this sequel focuses on how to help children realize their potential as human beings. Growing older is no guarantee of growing up. Childhood is when most of the growing up should occur but we need to know how to cultivate the maturing process. This course sheds light on the adult's role in the miracle of maturation.

Common Challenges (Power to Parent Part III) - an eight-session videocourse

Raising children is rewarding, but not always easy! Every child gets stuck from time to time on the road to maturation and every parent faces challenges at some point on the journey. At these times, we could benefit from experienced insight and practical suggestions that are in the best interest of our children. In this third part of the **Power to Parent** series, Dr. Neufeld helps equip parents to read the signs of a child in trouble, live with a sensitive child, cultivate resilience in a child, lead an alpha child, soften a defended child, discipline a stuck child, and more. Dr. Neufeld offers effective and safe practices that honor and preserve the relationship, even when the problems seem daunting. In making sense of a child's experience, parents are better prepared to lead them through challenging times.




Hold On To Your Kids: the DVD


Making Sense of Adolescence - an eight-session videocourse

Crossing the bridge from childhood to adulthood has never been so daunting. The time of adolescence is longer than ever and yet society today offers little support in understanding or facilitating this transition. What is nature's purpose? What is the developmental design? What is meant to happen? This course is designed to be used by parents, grandparents, teachers, administrators, professionals - anyone who desires to make sense of adolescence. Dr. Neufeld helps shed light into this often dark and confusing time. He gives both the tools and the eyes to see an adolescent through the journey, and articulates why now more than ever adolescents need our help to cross that bridge. Dr. Neufeld's unique distillation of



adolescent psychology and the integration of this material with his rich experience with teens both professionally and as a father, forms the basis of these insights and the suggestions he provides.


Power to Teach - a four-session videocourse for educators



Teaching is getting harder, not easier. This despite the fact that teachers have never been more educated, technology has never been more advanced, curriculum has never been so refined and pedagogy has never been so honed. Although these factors are important, the true problem in schooling lies elsewhere. Dr. Neufeld has been joining the dots for over 35 years and has concluded that the power to teach is being eroded in today's society. In his insightful analysis, Dr. Neufeld uncovers four natural sources of power and reveals the handicaps that result when these are missing. Dr. Vanessa Lapointe R.Psych. The ABC's of Mental Health in Children: Recognizing and Intervening with Children in Care

This workshop is designed to assist caregivers in identifying when a child may benefit from extra support in the area of mental health. Content will focus on children in the 0-12 year age range and differentiating mental health concerns from behavioural concerns. Topics addressed will include: an understanding of the origin of mental health versus behavioural issues in children; an understanding of how mental health issues "look" different from behavioural concerns in children; an overview of specific types of mental health challenges more typically experienced by children; information on common approaches to treatment of mental health challenges in children; and some resources/recommendations for behavioural strategies in working with children. The specific needs and potential vulnerabilities of children in foster care will be addressed throughout.

Dr. Lapointe has a background in school and developmental psychology, and currently works in private practice with babies/children and their parents. Her areas of expertise include psychoeducational assessment of children, as well as counseling children of all ages and supporting parents. Dr. Lapointe uses a variety of therapeutic approaches in her counseling work to help families and children with issues concerning parent/child attachment, parent/family empowerment, as well as anxiety, behavioral and mood difficulties. Dr. Lapointe's primary interests include understanding the wide array of psychosocial influences on young children's development, the utility and challenges of universal developmental screening, and promoting the healthy development of young children in foster care. Dr. Lapointe also enjoys teaching seminars to a wide range of professionals and parents, and consults with local and provincial organizations in a collaborative effort to improve outcomes for all young children.
