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# EADLINES From Around the World



### **GRANDMA RAN DRUGS FOR BINGO HABIT**

SIERRA VISTA, ARIZONA -- A grandmother found with a trunk full of marijuana was convicted of drug running in what prosecutors said was an attempt to earn cash for a bingo habit.

State troopers found 10 bundles of pot totaling 214 pounds hidden in Leticia Villareal Garcia's car trunk last year when they stopped her.

Villareal, 61, told jurors that her only regular income was a \$275 monthly welfare check, but she frequently played bingo and occasionally won thousands of dollars. Prosecutor Doyle Johnstun said the game was Villareal's undoing.

"People who play bingo almost every night of the week end up losing in the long run," Johnstun told jurors. "The underlying issue is that she's got a bingo problem, which explains why an otherwise nice person might get sucked into something like this." Jurors rejected Villareal's argument.

# **ROBBER CALLS POLICE**

IONIA, MICHIGAN - When two service station attendants refused to hand over the cash to an intoxicated robber, the man threatened to call the police. They still refused, so the robber followed through with his threat and called the police. He was quickly arrested.

# ABOUT THE TIMES SQUARE NEW YEAR'S EVE BALL

The Ball has been lowered every year since 1907, with the exceptions of 1942 and 1943, when its use was suspended due to the wartime "dimout" of lights in New York City.

The Ball is a geodesic sphere, six feet in diameter and weighs just over a 1/2 ton. It is covered with 504 Waterford Crystal triangles, varying in size. All 696 lights and 90 rotating pyramid mirrors are computer controlled, producing a state-of-the-art light show of eye-dazzling color patterns and a kaleidoscope effect. For the 2006 New Year's Eve celebration, 72 of the crystal triangles feature the new "Hope for Fellowship" design, consisting of a series of cuts suggesting the linking of arms signifying togetherness and community.



# KEEPING YOURSELF HEALTHY THIS COLD & FLU SEASON



Everyone has a theory. Some have been passed down through generations, or are based on outdated science. A few seem like common sense. But whatever their origin, many just aren't true.

*Feed a cold, starve a fever* - This old saying was popularized by Mark Twain, but it simply isn't true. Everyone who is sick -- whether they've got a cold, fever, or both -- need nourishment to get better

**Colds and flu are most contagious before symptoms appear.** Also not true. You're most contagious when symptoms are at their worst because that's when you cough and sneeze most. Even if you've just started feeling the symptoms or you're almost over it, you're still contagious.

**Don't kiss if you have a cold**. A peck on the lips probably won't hurt since the lips themselves harbor surprisingly few germs.

To break the cycle of never-ending colds and flu, and keep everyone in your family healthier is as simple as following a few suggestions.

*Get a flu shot* - October is the best time if they're available, but a shot by the end of November will still protect throughout the flu season.

*Wash your hands* often. No need for antibacterial agents - ordinary soap and warm water works fine. And *use paper towels to dry*. Towels harbor germs - especially after getting wet.

**Rub dirt on it.** You can't completely get rid of germs but that's not a good idea anyway. There's growing evidence that exposure to everyday dirt and germs in infancy helps the immune system develop and keeps adult systems "in fighting shape" by giving it something to "practice" on. So constantly wiping all your surfaces with antibacterials may not only be unproductive, but may in fact be counterproductive.
