## June is Adopt A Shelter Cat Month!

At Friends Forever, just as is the case with hundreds of other shelters, Spring is “kitten season,” when new kittens join the many other wonderful cats we have waiting for their forever homes. We’d love to introduce you to all of the fine felines at Friends Forever! Like any other pet, choosing a cat requires thought, so here is a short list of things to think about.

1. Consider taking home two. Cats require exercise, mental stimulation, and social interaction. Two cats can provide this for each other even when you’re not around.
2. Find a cat whose personality fits yours. We at Friends Forever can help you find the perfect feline friend – we’re great matchmakers!
3. Have a veterinarian selected ahead of time and schedule a visit within the first few days following the adoption so you’re sure to start out on a healthy note and get the proper medical records started.
4. Make sure everyone in the house is prepared before you bring kitty home – pets are a family affair. When adopting a new cat with existing pets at home, our shelter staff can give you tips on how to make a proper introduction. Socialization is very important, but don’t expect it to happen immediately.
5. Make sure you’ve thought about the short- and long-term costs of a cat. While it may not be a major part of your budget, any pet is a responsibility and there’s a cost associated with that.
6. Be prepared so that your new cat can start feeling at home right away, with a litter box, cat litter, food and water bowls, food, scratching posts, safe and stimulating toys, a cushy bed, and grooming tools.
7. Cat-proof your home. Don’t leave food on the counter as that will teach your new friend to jump up for a bite. Watch to ensure the kitten isn’t chewing on electric cords, and pick up small items like paper clips, which could be swallowed.

Please stop and visit anytime – *we’re ready to help you adopt your first cat*, or bring home a friend for whoever might already be enjoying your care!

## How to Help Your Dog Be a Good Neighbor

Now that the weather has improved, your dog may spend more time in your yard and you'll probably be out walking him/her more often too. Making sure that your dog is "neighbor friendly" isn't just a good thing for the neighborhood, but also will help ensure that you don't get an unwelcome call from animal control!

While you can do something about your dog, you can't do much if anything about how your neighbors perceive your dog. Here are some tips to make the process less stressful for everyone.

### Take the first step

If you have neighbors who appear to be frightened or annoyed by your dog, ask them what specific behaviors are bothersome.

### Don't get defensive

Don't explain or justify any behavior until you really understand what's happening, some of which you might not even know about. For example, you may not ever see Spot charging the fence or growling from a window. Focus on listening, and apologize for any problems.

### Be respectful

Some people just don't like dogs or are truly afraid of them, no matter what the circumstances. If this is the case, you need to respect that viewpoint; think of something that you really don't like or that scares you and imagine what it would take for someone to change your mind.

### Do something about it

Once you know what specific behaviors are freaking out your neighbors, focus on them. Chances are that unless it's something you really can't change – like a general dislike of dogs – improving a specific behavior is something that will make your dog a better dog overall, not just "more liked" by the neighbors. Work with people who know you – and your dog – to change your dog's behaviors, or consult a trainer.



### Don't force a meeting!

Remember that dogs are great at picking up on fear or discomfort, and you don't want that to be the perception they get from your neighbor, or you when you're around the neighbor! Make sure that you AND your dog are really ready before you encourage a

meet-and-greet. There may be plenty of positive steps you can take to help your neighbors feel more comfortable and/or be less annoyed without ever actually having your dog meet them in person. If you've done a good job listening, you'll have a better idea what the desired behavior looks like, whether or not that includes an in-person/dog get-together.

## BITE BACK During Flea and Tick Season!

Flea and tick prevention – or treatment, if it's too late for prevention – is an important part of taking good care of your cat or dog. We live in an area where these pests are a regular occurrence, no matter how careful you are or how clean you may think you are keeping your pets and your home.

Fleabites may be more than an itchy annoyance to some dogs and cats: they can cause flea allergy dermatitis, an allergic reaction to proteins in flea saliva. A pet's constant scratching in this situation can cause permanent hair loss or other skin problems. Fleas feasting on your pet's blood can also lead to anemia and in rare cases, death. The most common flea is *Ctenocephalides felis*, simply known as the cat flea, although it certainly does not discriminate among canines, felines, or humans. The cat flea is perfectly formed for its mission: to latch onto a warm body

and suck its blood. The entomological equivalent of Superman, cat fleas can jump as high as 13 feet and consequently have no trouble leaping onto tall dogs in a single bound!

Ticks are just as dangerous as fleas. The diseases that ticks cause and transmit are unpleasant for both humans and pets and serious cases can even be fatal, so do not take these bloodsuckers lightly. Some of the more well-known diseases associated with ticks include Lyme disease and Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

When flea and tick problems get out of hand, you cannot simply treat or apply preventives to your pet and possibly think you're going to win the battle. Pet owners must make a conscientious effort to really eliminate these pests by treating their pet, yard, and home.



## Here are our Top Ten safety tips and guidelines for flea and tick prevention this year.



1. Read the label carefully before using any insecticides or pesticides. If you don't understand the wording, ask your veterinarian or call the manufacturer. Even if you've used the product many times before, read the label because the directions or warnings may have changed.
2. Follow the directions exactly. If the product is for dogs, don't use it on cats or other pets. If the label says use weekly, don't use it daily. If the product is for the house or yard, don't put it directly on your pet.
3. Keep multiple pets separated after applying a product until it dries. This will help prevent one animal from grooming another and ingesting a drug or pesticide.
4. Talk to your veterinarian before using a product on weak, old, medicated, sick, pregnant, or nursing pets, or on pets that have previously shown signs of sensitivity to flea or tick products.
5. Monitor your pet for side effects after applying the product, particularly when using the product for the first time.
6. If your pet experiences a bad reaction from a spot-on product, immediately bathe the pet with mild soap, rinse

- with large amounts of water, and call your veterinarian.
7. Call your veterinarian if your pet shows symptoms of illness after using a product. Symptoms of poisoning include poor appetite, depression, vomiting, diarrhea, or excessive salivation.
8. Do not apply a product to kittens or puppies unless the label specifically allows this treatment. Use flea combs to pick up fleas, flea eggs, and ticks on puppies and kittens who are too young for flea and tick products.
9. Wash your hands immediately with soap and water after applying a product, or use protective gloves while applying (don't use those gloves for other purposes).
10. Store products away from food and out of children's reach.

Follow these guidelines to help keep fleas and ticks at bay, and "bite back" when you have to!

I'm firmly committed to increasing our adoptions, which means more animals out of the shelter and in safe, loving homes. So I'm focused on that, and I want to hit 400 in 2014!

Will you help me? You can do many things besides actually adopting a cat or dog. For example, spread the word about FFHS by continuing to remind your friends and families of the wonderful dogs and cats we have here waiting for their forever homes. You also help when you support our fundraisers, and when you take the time to visit and share a smile – and a scratch or two – with the great animals in our care.

With your help, we'll have hundreds of great reasons to celebrate a successful year in 2014.
