When Gail Jones discussed the opportunity for 4-H Clubs to design their own content for our new county website and asked for youth input on the venture (see article on page 2), John, who has experience with computers through a 4-H club project, lit up. He contributed to the discussion, obviously knowledgeable and interested in both the topic and in working with Gail to make our web presence great. It seems this is of-

ten the way it works in 4-H: A young person is exposed to a subject area, likes and pursues it, receives encouragement from leaders, and is offered opportunities to build their skills. This often colors their profession or path in life. Computers are a spark for John, and 4-H provides an avenue for him to follow his interest.

So what does nurturing "sparks" have to do with volunteer training?

The Thrive Foundation for Youth has provided \$1.4 million dollars over five vears to the California 4-H program, funds to be used to do what we do best: helping kids grow into competent, confident and caring adults. The really good news is that these resources will provide much needed training for our program volunteers. The Thrive model includes elements of 4-H which helps kid to:

Realize they have the • power to get better with practice and that mistakes are an important part of learning. (We call this a growth mindset.)

- Know how to set and pursue goals, and be equipped to switch direction when obstacles arise. (Goal set*ting* has always been a key element in our program.)
- Identify and pursue their passion and talents. (Ah yes, the spark!)

Beginning in January, we'll assemble our own Sacramento County Master Trainer Team, a group of volunteers, youth members and staff who will participate with other training teams from neighboring counties in a Train-the-Trainer session. This aathering will be interactive, informative, and a lot of fun.

For those of you whose sparks may be leadership or training, this might be an opportunity for you. If you are interested in being part of our training team, please let me know.



As you may know, we no longer have the WRP system on our website so registration for statewide events will be done through the on-line enrollment system. I've created a registration page for California Focus, Washington Focus #1 (Road to Democracy and Heritage Trail I) and Washington Focus #2 (Global Journey and Heritage Trail II). Registration occurs on the "Member List" page for youth delegates and chaperones. At the bottom of that page, look for the "register a member in an event". Choose the family member that is enrolling and the event they wish to attend. Then click on "Register". Then fill in the information requested. You can choose to complete this on-line registration in your office for

your entire county delegation or ask your members and volunteer leaders to do so themselves. If members and leaders complete the registration on-line, you will need to verify the registrations for your county.

Please remember that the California Focus requires a \$150 deposit with the registration form. Washington Focus requires a \$1,200 deposit with the registration form since we have to sign a contract with the National 4-H Center and purchase airline tickets by late January.

I've set the **registration due date for January 10** and hope to have all the registration forms and a county council check for the deposits in my office by January 14. Please make a copy of the registration form for your office and send me the original.

Don't put off giving a presentation another year! It's a great way to teach others about something that you have learned in 4-H. Start preparing now. Or just come by and watch, get some ideas, and start preparing for next year.

<u>THE</u> 4-H PRESENTATION MANUAL: Available from the 4-H Office or at the State 4-H website at: www.ca4h.org/ leadership/spd/4hpresentationmanual-3.doc. There is a lot of helpful information in the manual, but the actual rules for each type of presentation are never more than one page in length. So, don't be intimidated. Pick one up and get started today.

TYPES OF PRESENTATIONS

Below are <u>brief</u> descriptions of the different types of presentations. For detailed information, refer to the current Presentation Manual. Be sure to read the rules for your type of presentation carefully. Please note that in almost all cases, your subject matter should relate to your current 4-H project work. School assignments are not appropriate subjects for presentations.

DEMONSTRATION/ILLUSTRATED TALKS: The most common types of presentations are Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks. These are forms of teaching using both verbal and visual methods of communication. This form of presentation is one of the strongest learning and teaching tools available to us. It is used widely throughout the academic and business world and is a valuable life skill for our members to learn. Members must give Demonstrations or Illustrated Talks to be eligible for the Purple, Bronze, Silver, Gold, Sapphire, and Ruby Star Ranks.

Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks differ only in that Demonstrations teach by the "show how" method, while Illustrated Talks teach a concept or a skill that cannot be demonstrated in a classroom setting. They can either be organized in the traditional style (introduction, body, conclusion) or using the scientific process. These presentations can be found on pages 14 and 15 in the manual and each has specific requirements for visuals. Although posters are the most common type of visuals, "equivalent visuals" means that you may use tri-fold boards, felt boards, overheads, PowerPoint type productions, or anything else you can come up with provided the required material is presented. Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks may last from 3 to 15 minutes. They may be done individually or as a team of up to 3 members. Notes are not allowed.

<u>IMPROMPTU SPEECH</u>: Unrehearsed delivery of information and ideas. Implements basic research by the members that can be used during the speech. A single note card can be used. Member has 3 minutes to prepare the speech after selecting the topic. Limited to 5 minutes. Limited to individual participants. Props or costumes may not be used.

INTERPRETIVE READING: You may read any published written work, that is age appropriate and in good taste. Examples may include, but are not limited to: children's stories, poetry, essay, speeches, excerpts from novels that stand alone, etc. Reading limited to 5 minutes. You should state the title, the author, characters, the purpose or setting, and any other introductory information. The reading will be finished with a short conclusion. Both limited to 5 minutes. Use your voice to make the piece come alive. No stages, settings, props, or costumes. Limited to individual participants.

PROBLEM SOLVING: Provides members the opportunity to use a prepared fact pattern as the basis for developing an action plan. During the competition, the member will present the action plan using posters, overhead project, slides, or computer generated slides. Limited to 5 to 10 minutes. Notes are not allowed. Member judged on the overall effectiveness of the presentation and not the solution presented. Limited to individual participants.

<u>AUDIO-VISUAL PRESENTATION</u>: Any informational or instructional program presented with slide, video, or digital representation. A slide presentation lasts 5 to 10 minutes and should be supplemented with a verbal commentary, synchronized tape recording, or audio track. Video and digital presentations may last up to 15 minutes and require special equipment. Presenters must provide their own equipment for slide, video, or digital presentations. Member must introduce the presentation in the presence of the judges and without notes. Limited to individual participants. No costumes allowed.

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY: An organized visual presentation of a program or a concept. The displays should be designed to convey its message in a limited amount of time (60 seconds). Displays do not include science fair exhibits, other depictions of processes, project exhibits, or collections. Requires introductory presentation by the member. Notes are not allowed. Teams limited to 2 members. 4-H member may select one of the following kinds of displays:

- 1. **CARD TABLE DISPLAY** (30" x 30" flat space) This display may include a tri-fold poster board that includes title, member's name, 4-H affiliation, and a depiction of the program or concept. Table space may be provided; however, members should bring their own card table.
- PANEL DISPLAY (about 48" x 48") This is a vertical, free standing display that is presented on an easel. The display will include a title, the member's name, 4-H affiliation, and a depiction of the program or concept.

<u>SHARE THE FUN</u>: Groups perform acts, such as skits that focus on health, safety, community pride, recreation, or citizenship. It is performed by one or more youth to entertain. It may include props and costumes. Member must introduce the activity without notes. Not to exceed 15 minutes. A sound system will be provided for County Demonstration Day. Judged using the American System. Not open to individual participants.

<u>CULTURAL ARTS</u>: 4-H individual members and groups perform a costumed dramatic reading, musical, dance, or other such performing art. It is performed by one or more youth to entertain. Costumes, props, and decorations are encouraged. Member must introduce the activity and its purpose. Notes may not be used. Not to exceed 15 minutes. A sound system will be provided for County Demonstration Day. Judged using the Danish System.

NOTE: If you receive a Gold Medal at County Demonstration Day, you are eligible to give your presentation at North Central Sectional Presentation Day, *SATURDAY, MARCH 19, 2011*, at UC Davis. You will receive a form with your medal.

If you receive a Gold Medal at Sectional Presentation Day, you are eligible to give your presentation at State Presentation Day, *SATURDAY, MAY 28, 2011*, at UC Davis.

# **From the President**

#### The Plan to Build a Stronger 4-H Dennis Seyfer, Sacramento County 4-H Leaders Council President

I would like to share with you an opportunity in which Sacramento County 4-H has been selected to participate.

As many of you are aware, each time there is an economic downturn, 4-H program funding coming from government is scrutinized. The present downturn resulted in reduced funding impacting our program through the eventual loss of our Program Representative.

Earlier this year our Youth Development Advisor, Marianne Bird, along with four adult volunteers participated in an internet webinar presentation. As a result of their involvement in that event, combined with other factors such as the diversity of our County's 4-H programs, Sacramento County 4-H was selected by the California 4-H Foundation to receive special assistance via training and funding to develop a fundraising program.



The California 4-H Foundation raises funds from private benefactors to support the mission of the 4-H program by creating long-term financial sustainability for 4-H programs across the state. The California 4-H Foundation makes it possible for more children and families to benefit from the 4-H experience.

The Foundation's purpose is three-fold:

- to develop funding partnerships with individuals, foundations, and corporations to support 4-H in California;
- to increase public awareness of the California 4-H Youth Development Program as a valuable investment; and
- to provide training and support to 4-H county offices and clubs to maximize their local fundraising efforts.

In August 2010, a Leadership Team of 16 members formed, consisting of 4-H staff, adult volunteers, and youth members from across the county. This team's goal is to increase the sustainability and scope of Sacramento County 4-H to serve more youth through quality programs.

A sub-group of 7 team members volunteered to attend Fundraising training in order to develop the knowledge and skills needed to reach the stated goal. This training took place on October 27 and 28, 2010.

This fundraising activity is an ambitious effort and these 16 people are going to need everyone's help. We all have our personal 4-H stories to share and reflect upon. Within those 4-H stories, we communicate our contributions to the community and the opportunities we provide to youth. Here lies the spirit that will inspire donors to join us so that we can reach our goal.
