A Message from Rob

We have just wrapped one of our best Heart Kids awareness campaigns ever, and I would like to extend a very warm thank you to everyone who helped share the word about Heart Kid and CHD, right across the country.

We have received incredibly positive feedback about Born Soldier/Fighter/ Warrior campaign from far and wide. We were on Breakfast TV with Sam Wallace. Corey Anderson and some very special heart kids, and Auckland's Sky Tower was lit up red for a week with the top part flashing like a heartbeat. Westfield malls throughout New Zealand displayed digital posters, and we also had buses and bus shelters covered with our campaign artwork and messages, as well as street posters in our main centres. We had many wonderful collectors throughout New Zealand bucket shaking and helping raise awareness of Heart Kids, and our Branches had displays in malls in their areas. We had over 30 personal Heart Kids families' articles in local papers and magazines, and even made it to the front page of the Herald! All of this activity was to raise the awareness and profile of Heart Kids and CHD, and we are very grateful for the fantastic support from so many to make this great campaign such a success.

We have also been working very closely with the medical team at Starship and our Regional Hospitals to develop and enhance our relationships with these essential partners. From our dedicated Family Support Team at regional Hospital clinics to Starship and Auckland Hospital up to senior levels, the team has been working hard to build these crucial relationships. Together with the leaders of the paediatric cardiac team, we have jointly visited the Minister of Health to lobby for more funding for the National Service so

the Medical team can provide a better service and we're also hoping this will help decrease the surgical cancellations that are very difficult on our families.

We are collaborating on a nationwide compulsory oximetry testing of all new born babies, with a pilot programme to be undertaken in the Auckland area. This will ultimately save five of our Heart Kids lives a year if undertaken throughout New Zealand.

I am also pleased to report that the Heart Kids Board have made a decision on our new logo. We know that this has been a bit continuous and it has been a lengthy and involved process to ensure we end up with the visual elements which best reflect who we are as an organisation. I am confident that the consultation process that was undertaken as very solid and robust and all feedback - good, bad and indifferent - was given to the Board to

consider as part of the decision process. I am hopeful that when the new logo is announced, once the final legal steps have been completed, that we will all join together to support our organisation and use this logo to keep raising our profile.

Lastly this month we will have our first conference in five years. By the time you receive this Heartline, we will have had the pleasure of a full-on weekend of learning, sharing and connecting with heart kids, parents, medical specialists and supporters from all over the country. I am really looking forward to meeting more of our members, and reporting back to you on the conference in our next edition of Heartline.

Ages and Stages Questionnaire Explained

The Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) is a screening tool that may identify children at risk for developmental delay. Developmental and behavioural problems are a common issue for children admitted to Starship Children's Hospital. Whilst 2.5% of all children have developmental delay, and a further 7.5% have concerns requiring ongoing monitoring, these percentages are significantly greater in children referred to a Children's Hospital.

Currently, identification of developmental concerns relies on parental concern or a clinician including questions regarding developmental status in their clinical assessment. International research suggests this practice only identifies approximately 30% of children with developmental problems. The use of a standardised developmental screening tool increases the pick-up rate of developmental delay to almost 80%, allowing earlier identification and intervention thus improving developmental and social outcomes.

A pilot study was introduced in the Paediatric and Congenital Cardiology Service (PCCS) in May 2014. It aims to establish feasibility and gather preliminary data to support funding for the long-term implementation of the ASQ in cardiac services. The aim is to provide routine developmental screening for all children (1 month – 5 years) admitted. The earlier the identification, the earlier the intervention.

Why was the ASQ chosen as a screening tool?

- Parent lead
- User friendly
- Designed to be playful, fun, interactive and linked to children's milestones
- Affordable, quick and easily completed
- Few resources are needed
- High rates of reliability, validity, and accuracy
- Culturally appropriate

As the Hospital Play Specialists on the ward, Denise and Lindy have the educational background to assist parents with their child development questions. Denise also has a background as an Early Intervention Teacher with the Ministry of Education, and Lindy was an Education Support worker in the community.

We recognise parents as children's primary educators and caregivers. Parents inevitably know their child best, and this screening tool also celebrates the developmental domains that children are meeting as well as the areas that need monitoring or referring to specialist services.

The ASQ

Is a series of 21 questionnaires for children (1 month -5 years). These questionnaires cover age related questions in 5 developmental domains:

- COMMUNICATION verbal and non-verbal communication skills
- GROSS MOTOR children's use and co-ordination of their arms and legs
- FINE MOTOR –children's use and co-ordination of their hands and fingers
- PROBLEM SOLVING children's ability to work out cause and effect
- PERSONAL-SOCIAL children's self-help skills and interactions with others.

For each age group and domain there are activity sheets to assist parents if required. These activity ideas are easy and enjoyable.

On admission the Nurses hand out this questionnaire to the parent. Once completed Denise and Lindy mark the questionnaire. We then discuss the results with the parents/caregivers/Whanau and the results are recorded on the PCCS database.

For those children whose results indicate that further assessment is required, this is stated in the discharge letter forwarded to the child's Paediatrician/Primary Health Care Provider.

This initiative may assist in addressing the well documented presence of developmental delay in the complex congenital heart disease children under our care.

Ana Kennedy has been instrumental in introducing this pilot study of the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) to the PCCS in May 2014.

Born Warrior Kayla Salter

Kayla was born in March 2005 at 31 weeks weighing 3lbs. Two weeks after she was born, we were called into the Neo Natal Unit to talk with the doctors. That day was just a big blur, yet I still remember the heart-breaking feeling when our whole world changed.

We were told that Kayla's heart did not function as it should be. She was diagnosed with Tetralogy of Fallot, a congenital heart condition consisting of four anomalies requiring open-heart surgery.

That day we were also put in touch with a family support worker from Heart Kids, who were invaluable at our time of need. They gave us information on what to expect and basically held our hand through the journey that is now our life.

In September 2005 Kayla had an open-heart surgery at six months old. Since then, she has been thrown a lot of hurdles to try get over. In 2012 she was diagnosed with a growth hormone deficiency and started growth hormones in 2013. She also has Sub Pulmonary Stenosis which is being checked by cardiologists every 6 months.

Kayla and our family have been lucky enough to still have the support of Heart Kids with Kayla going to Camp Brave Hearts this year and also lots of family events.

We have tried to let Kayla be a 'normal' 10-year-old and this year she decided to show off and came third in school cross country. We are very proud of how far she has come and not letting a heart condition slow her down!




