



A federal election will be held on Monday, May 2.

You may vote in this federal election if you:

- Are a Canadian citizen
- Will be 18 or older on election day
- · Can prove your identity and address

Registering to vote

If you're already **registered** on the voters list, you will receive a personalized **voter information card** from Elections Canada that directs you where to vote.

If you don't receive this card by Wednesday, April 13, you will need to register or update your registration information. It's simple:

- Your local Elections Canada office
- Your polling station on an advance voting day, or
- Your polling station on election day

Ways you can vote

- Vote by mail
- Vote at your local Elections Canada office
- Vote at your advance polling station on, Friday, April 22;
 Saturday, April 23; or Monday, April 25
- Vote at your polling station on election day, Monday, May 2
- Voting in advance at home (contact us for details)

Voting at the polls

Find your polling station for an advance poll or for election day by:

- Checking your voter information card
- Typing your postal code into our Voter Information Service

Remember to bring identification

- When you vote, you must be able to prove your identity and address. Consult the list of ID authorized by Elections Canada.
- The CNIB identification card is now an authorized piece of voter identification – you may use it along with another piece of authorized ID.



- Level access to polling stations and local Elections Canada offices.
- Sign language interpretation, requested in advance by calling 1-800-463-8080 or TTY 1-800-361-8935.
- Braille voting templates, large-print lists of candidates and assistance in marking a ballot at polling stations.
- Materials in multiple formats (i.e. Braille, Braille, American Sign Language and Langue des signes québecois, audio CD and large print), available on the Elections Canada Web site.
