NAPLAN

The NAPLAN testing will take place for Year 3 and Year 5 students in the week commencing Monday 13th May. NAPLAN tests in Reading, Writing, Language Conventions and Numeracy provide point in time information in relation to student performance.

There are always a number of contextual factors that will influence how well a student performs on a particular day in these tests.

NAPLAN tests are intended to complement the existing range of school-based assessments and it is important we ensure students are not overwhelmed by the experience or that the tests are given undue emphasis.

The NAPLAN results assist in providing one part of the picture of your child's demonstrated learning. I ask that parents avoid any disruption to the Year 3 and Year 5 classes during the week the NAPLAN tests are being conducted. A pamphlet was sent home today. If you did not receive one please call into the office for a copy.



Key Issue 1: Increased capital funding for new & existing schools

The Low Interest Loan Scheme (LILS) has operated since the early 1990's. It provides \$25 million to non-government schools with \$15 million going to the Catholic system. Loans are provided at a rate of 1% for new schools and 3.5% for upgrades of existing schools.

- The quantum available to the non government sector has not increased since 1995
- The rate of interest has not changed despite the current unprecedented low interest rate environment



\$15 million would build 2 Primary Schools

\$15 million does not even build 1 Primary School

Catholic Education seeks,

- an increase of the total LIL pool to \$50 million with \$30 million available to the Catholic system
- this amount be indexed annually in line with increases in the Building Cost Index (BCI)
- a commitment to finding long term funding solutions to meet the demands of population growth. These might include grants, subsidies for contributions to LGA infrastructure, collaborative planning or public/private partnerships





Key Issue 2: Australian Government Review of Schooling Funding

The Australian government is currently reviewing funding for all schools and it is likely that the government will soon propose new funding arrangements. At present, there are concerns that Catholic schools will not obtain the funding needed to continue offering a quality education, while also keeping school fees as low as possible.

The chart highlights that students in Catholic schools, on average, receive less government funding than that provided to students in government schools and consequently operate with less total resources even when private income is added on.



This will be a significant issue leading up to the Federal election in September this year as any change to current funding arrangements which reduces government funding to the Catholic sector will have a significant impact on Catholic schools and in turn school fees.

Catholic education seeks to ensure that the crucial role of Catholic schools in the Australian education landscape, as a low fee provider of quality education, will continue to be recognised with appropriate funding.

Catholic Education seeks a commitment from the next state government that the implications for Catholic schools will also be considered in forming a state position on whether to sign up to the Federal Government's funding reforms

Fact Sheet 1: Challenges posed by population growth

Perth has been the fastest growing capital city in Australia over the past 10 years. Since 2001 Perth has grown by 346,000 people, or 25%. Catholic Education has experienced strong demand over this same period with enrolments growing from 59,974 in 2001 to 71,774 in 2011, an increase of 20%.

The Catholic system's ability to expand existing schools and build new schools is restricted by:


- · levels of Capital funding
- local government planning processes
- increasing requirements for contributions to local infrastructure

The population growth in Western Australia is expected to continue for some time.

The chart shows the projected increase in the 5 – 19 yr old age group.

It is estimated that an additional 100,000 students will need to be accommodated over the next 13 years with approximately 18,000 to be in Catholic schools or a 25% increase on current numbers.

This is the equivalent of 20 new primary schools and 10 new secondary schools.



The need for a collaborative approach with the State Government is strongly endorsed by Catholic Education and this needs to occur now.

Fact Sheet 2: Why fund Catholic Schools?

Projected savings to the government

The projected growth of Catholic schooling will not be possible under the existing funding regime. This presents a significant problem for the government as every student enrolled in a Catholic school saves the government considerable sums of money.

From a recurrent funding perspective more than four times the state funding will be required for every child that attends a government school because they could not get into a Catholic school.

From a capital funding perspective, the Catholic community takes responsibility for sourcing and purchasing suitable land for new schools and contributes the majority of the construction costs. Adding another 30 schools to the state government infrastructure requirements will add billions of dollars to state expenditure.



Providing additional funding to the non-government sector to meet the schooling needs of Western Australia's growing population makes good financial sense with savings to the government in the hundreds of million dollars.
