Work on the Guelph Goderich work on the Gueria Goderica extension of the C. P. R. is pro-gressing steadily. It is expected that the line will be open for traffic from Guelph as far as Elmira by the first of July or Angust and it is possible that Linwood will be reached before winter in which case the entire line will be completed and trains running on schedule time by the middle of 1907.
