### NEED ANY HELP MAKING ENDS MEET?

As most of you know, with the economy the way it is, it's more difficult today than it used to be to maintain a decent lifestyle. Many of us are experiencing less money coming in and as much or more going out.

This is the first of three articles describing some basic financial practices that could help manage your money.

### **Economics for the New Economy**

The term economics in Ancient Greece meant "rules of the household". This definition, although pronounced some 3 to 4 thousands years ago still rings true, and perhaps with a louder and sweeter ring for today.

The term, "rules of the household" is best used today talking about economics. We can divide the economics of a household into three major categories:

- Taxes
- Household Debt
- Household Income

### **Taxes**

Many people love to get a refund from their taxes because, well, it is like extra cash, so to speak. However, they don't realize that it actually costs them money to do so, plus the government gets a little bonus from each one of us who practice this.

We in the United States have what we call a "pay-as-you-go" system of collection of taxes. A deduction for taxes is deducted for you, so your taxes can be paid at a later date. So, throughout the year a certain amount of money goes into a bucket with the your social security number on the bucket.

When taxes are filed on April 15, your tax bill is subtracted from what accumulated in the bucket for the previous year. If you have more in the bucket than your tax bill, you get a refund check, if there is not enough you have to pay more.

Now what do you suppose the Federal Government does with your money while waiting for your tax return to be filed on April 15? Yes, you are correct if you said earning interest! I repeat...earning money on your money. So let's turn this around, and make this

beneficial for you.

If you took your refund check and spread it out over the year, you would have extra cash per month to pay household bills or *additional cash flow*. You might also be able to save the additional cash flow and you make money on your money instead of the government.

You can adjust your W-4 form every year and specify how much you would like deducted from your paycheck. Example: Take last year's tax you paid, add 10% for contingency, divide by 12 and you have what your monthly withholding deduction should be.

Now, this is a quick and easy rule of thumb, but to be more accurate you should actually include all your tax consequences for the coming year and your tax preparer should do this for you, to determine more accurately your tax liability and thus how much should be deducted from your paycheck. Remember it is your money and the W-4 form can be adjusted throughout the year!

I had on my to do list a road trip to travel on Highway 50, known as The Loneliest Road in America, from Rancho Cucamonga, California, through Las

Vegas, Nevada, and then on towards Fallon, Nevada, and heading home through Carson City, Nevada, on Highway 395. Lucky me I had five days off for the Labor Day weekend, so I went.

Leaving at the crack of dawn, I would take Interstate 15 to Las Vegas hoping to beat the morning traffic that was inevitable at the construction zones that was occurring in the Vegas area. This region has increased a thousand fold in the number of homes and new casinos. It is amazing; hopefully they have enough water and sewage treatment plants.

As usual I got lost trying to find US Route 93. Traveling through the morning commuter traffic in downtown Las Vegas is simply insane and I took the wrong off ramp and was heading towards nowhere fast. Finally getting my senses and bearings back I headed back on Interstate 15 hopefully to find that elusive off ramp. Yes I did ask for directions.

At last I found US Route 93, better known as The Great Basin Highway. When you look at it on a map you'll notice that gas stations are far and few in between cities, so you had better gas up before venturing into no man's land, which of course I did. While gassing up there were several riders there from Ore-



gon and we talked about where we were going. They stated that the Hotel Nevada in Ely was the place to stay and what a blast they had there the previous night. I of course had lodgings at the KOA camp ground, something that I would curse before this trip was through.

Once on US Route 93 the scenery became huge, the road stretched on for miles with no traffic in sight.
