The defense claimed that Jack and Jill were trespassing and therefore assumed the risk themselves. After the case was deliberated by the jury (audience members), the defendant was found not liable of any charges.

Community Meetings Scheduled March 17 and 23 Building Closing Process Continues

The Facilities Use Committee has been meeting since September to look at things such as enrollment projections, school finances, plant facilities and program offerings as related to the Manson elementary and Barnum middle school buildings. The committee was made up of eight parents and two community members. MNW administrators and a non-quorum number of board members attended the meetings as well. Both director districts as well as open enrolled parents were represented. A summary of the committee's findings are printed in this newsletter.

Two architectural firms were also consulted regarding the structural state of the two buildings being considered. These companies were Facilities Cost Mangement Group, Omaha, and FEH and Associates, Sioux City. The comparison obviously favored the Barnum building over the Manson elementary in that its newer section is 20 years newer, is air conditioned and comes closer to being in compliance with fire and disability codes. However, as the Facilities Use Committee findings point out, there are other factors to be considered, such as transportation costs and future sharing opportunities

An option that is being considered is that of a merger with Rockwell City Lytton or an even larger sharing arrangement with RCL and Southern Cal. Because the enrollments of the involved school districts are falling so rapidly, (ours projects to less than 550 students by 2015) this may be the most stable long-term alternative. This arrangement would be similar to East Sac, which has achieved the stability of a district with approximately 1000 students by combining the communities of Sac City, Lake View, Wall Lake and Auburn.

A last step that must be taken before the Board of Education can enact a building closing is to have open public meetings. At these meetings, a review of the financial need for the building closing and the Facilities Use Committee findings will be presented. Community members will be given the opportunity to ask questions and to voice their opinions over an open microphone for a pre-determined amount of time per speaker. These meetings are scheduled to take place at the elementary gymnasium March 17 in the elementary gym and March 23 in the middle school auditorium.

Strengths of the Manson elementary site:

1. The largest community would have the elementary
2. There would be a connection to the west side of the district
3. Future sharing options might be enhanced; transportation savings
4. Would have only one campus
5. Would be accessible to vital services and business partnerships.
Weaknesses of the Manson elementary site:
6. Crowded-not enough space for Pk-6
7. Would lose two gyms (at Barnum) and an auditorium and other program specific areas
8. Loss of students to the east side of the district
9. Remodeling costs high due to asbestos and ADA problems
10. Building has no long term future-would have to plan for replacement.
Strengths of the Barnum site:
11. Better, bigger, more efficient building
12. More programming opportunities in program specific areas
13. Connection to the east side of the district is a bigger pool of students
14. Room for daycare, possible expansion of early childhood and after-school programs
15. Building is on a main route to major work center (FD)
16. Not leaving a nice building sitting empty.

Weaknesses of Barnum site

1. Higher utilities
2. Preschool transportation problems
3. Transportation (shuttle) costs
4. Loss of west side students
5. Loss of easy access to vital services and business partnerships
6. Will be under-utilized because of large unused spaces
7. Less convenient for elementary ed classes for high school students.
Both sites were listed as involving the loss of the middle school concept since grades 7 and 8 will move to the high school.

How Would Sharing With Rockwell City Lytton Change Things?
Positives:

1. The district would keep/grow its high school programs
2. The district would maintain a first class middle school
3. There would be better utilization of staff (more efficient student to staff ratios)
4. Open enrollments might increase to a stable combined district.
Negatives:
5. Extremely large geographical area with possible losses of MNW students on the east side of the district
6. Increased travel times for students
7. MNW students in Manson might be busing out of town from PK through grade 8 depending on the location of the MNW elementary and the middle school.

## Notes from PK-8 Principal Rose Davis

Although we have gotten off to a great start at MNW elementary and middle school this year, there are always other issues that come to the forefront throughout the year that need to be addressed. Because of an increase in bus referrals and incidents of misuse of cell phones and other electronic devices, improved bus behavior will be a top priority at the middle and elementary schools in the upcoming weeks

The safety of our children while they are riding the district's buses is of utmost importance. One of the ways that the school will show this is through the purchase of digital cameras for some of the buses. With these cameras, the bus drivers will be able to record digital footage and administrators will be able to review tapes in the hopes of addressing misbehavior Students who are creating an unsafe or uncomfortable atmosphere will have consequences.

In the weeks to come, teachers and administrators will be talking to our students about what good bus behavior looks like and we hope our parents will reinforce this dialogue at home.

The following are the simple yet non-negotiable rules that are aligned to the bus behavior forms:

## F (facing forward)

A (aisles have to be clear)
M (Touching only my things, not others')
I (If it's inappropriate, I won't do it)
L(No bad language)
Y (No yelling)

## News from M rs Skophammer's Art R com

Wow! What a busy season. And, what a great time of year for students to learn and incorporate art fundamentals into their lessons in every area of learning. I've seen this taking place in the classrooms as well as my art room and it brings a big smile to my face every time I see art fundamentals and basics crossing over into the core subjects.

We're been making ceramic pots using the pinch and coil method in 5th and 6th grade. One of the 6th grade classes created pots using slabs of clay which they texturized with the patterns on the soles of their shoes. This was done by rolling out the clay, pressing the shoe on the clay to give it a unique texture, joining the slab of clay to the pinch pot base, and then finishing the clay pot to give it a unique look with glaze. These pots had the look of Native American Art.

Fourth graders have been studying the fine art of metal embossing by using metal and a stylus. We used the subject matter of dinosaurs as a starting point and the art work took on a life of its own. Fourth graders also learned about the artist Edvard Munch and The Scream that is still a popular work of art today.

Third graders have completed various projects One of these has been drawing the world's largest snowman wearing a patterned sweater. We studied energy conservation and found out that we could save lots of money by wearing a sweater or layers of clothing instead of always turning the heat up.

Second graders have completed acetate projects studying famous artists. It's exciting to draw and color on acetate while learning about artists.

Kindergarten and first graders completed a unit on self-portraits and have been using collage as a way to complete some holiday units of study. The various textures and colors in collage allow for a variety of exploration!

Optional kindergarten students created Rudolph from wood. They have also created large fish using bright colors

Fourth grader, Miranda Jud, and third grader, Sara Wedemeyer, have placed nationally in the Crayola Art Exhibition! Sara's work entitled "What a Large Mouth You Have" and Miranda's work entitled "WoW! will be published in the 2008-2009 Crayola Exhibition Book. Their work will also be displayed on the Crayola's website. Their pastel works were created in art class while studying the coral reef. Each depicted life under the sea. Congratulations, students!

We've continued to study about conservation, fire prevention, and how important it is to use a seat belt. We've designed posters just like professional advertisers to relay the message.

## COUNSELOR NEWS

As we are half way through the school year it is an important time for seniors and senior parents. There are a lot of things to be getting done and here is a checklist to be looking at to see if they are finished.

FAFSA form - This is the single piece of information that you can do to ensure financial aid for your son or daughter if they are going on to college. The Free Application for Free Student Aid (FAFSA) is a time sensitive document that needs to be completed ASAP to ensure maximum financial aid for your child. Go to www.fafsa.ed.gov to begin the process. The closer to January 1 that this is completed the more opportunities you will have access to. If you need assistance or have questions the best FREE source out there is Iowa College Access Network (ICAN) @ 877-272-4692.

Remaining 2008-09 ACT Testing Dates - If you are planning to attend a 4 year college you must take the ACT test. Remaining test dates are: April 4 (deadline to register is February 27) and June 13 (deadline to register is May 8). Remember you can take this as many times as you would like and you can get registration information in the guidance office or at www.actstudent.org

Scholarship opportunities - Local scholarship applications will be available in the guidance office starting February 10 through March 10. There are numerous state and national scholarships that are available in the guidance office. A list of these are updated weekly at www.mnwcougars.com on the school homepage. On the homepage go the the "Quick Links" drop bar and click on "Scholarships."

FAFSA Meetings - A representative from ICAN will be available to provide one on one help completing the FAFSA at the MNW HS on February 24 from noon $-8: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ if you are having problems or just want some assistance. You can call the high school office to schedule a half hour session anytime. You will need to bring your FAFSA PIN \# if you have that along with a copy of your 2008 tax return.

College Visits - Go out and visit colleges you are interested in. Each senior is allowed 3 college visits during the school day if you want to go and visit schools of interest. It is great to do this if you have questions or just want to go during a school day and get a feel for campus life. Call the admissions office of the college you intend to visit and set up an appointment with them. Then just be sure to call the school office and let them know your son or daughter will be gone

## What is Rtl? <br> Amy Champagne, AEA Rep

RtI stands for Response to Intervention. It is a process used by teachers in the MNW School District to address different student needs. When students are struggling with a skill or concept, they may require additional help to master the skill. Using data, teachers identify the students who need help and provide this through a Supplemental Intervention group. During this small group time, teachers regularly work with the students using research-based strategies to improve skills. Teachers also closely monitor progress throughout the intervention. When students master the skill being worked on, they no longer need a Supplemental Intervention.

Occasionally, students continue to require extra assistance. They may then receive an Intensive Intervention. This intervention is provided in a very small group, or one-on-one setting, and includes an increased amount of time. Again, progress is monitored closely by the teacher so that the instruction can be changed to fit the learner.

The RtI process can also be used for students who have already mastered skills and need to have their curriculum expanded. A variety of assessments help teachers know which students would benefit from Supplemental or Intensive Interventions throughout the school year. The teachers at MNW are really strong at figuring out what kids need to be successful in their learning. RtI is just one process that helps them provide a rigorous and attainable curriculum for all.

The Food and Drug Administration is conducting an investigation into the source of a salmonella outbreak, which has resulted in illness and death in some states. The contamination has been traced to the Plant Corporation of America. This company makes peanut butter and peanut paste. As a result of this outbreak, there have been a number of food recalls. These include products that have the peanut butter and paste in them. A list of recalled products can be found on the Food and Drug Administration's website.

The food service department of Manson Northwest Webster schools continues to use peanut butter in the breakfasts and lunches served. The Iowa State Department of Education's Food and Nutrition Div. (Commodity Div.) has been consulted and the peanut butter used at school is safe. If you have concerns or questions, please do not hesitate to call the school.
