Rev. Cecil Donahue

He was born in Statesville, NC February 21, 1955. He was the second of five children having an older brother, and a younger brother and two younger sisters. He grew up



in Charlotte graduating from North Mecklenburg High School in 1973 going to college at Pfeiffer studying Math and Christian Education. For enjoyment Cecil sang in the Concert Touring Choir at Pfeiffer, traveling with the Choir up and down the east coast, once on a cross country tour, plus two trip to Europe. After graduating in 1977, Cecil worked as a dorm director and math teacher at Louisburg Junior College in Louisburg, NC. Two years later he married Jan Brittain and went to Candler School of Theology a school of Emory University in Atlanta beginning classes August of 1979. Graduating in 1982, he entered a Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) program at Emory University Hospital earning a basic and 3 advanced units while serving as a chaplain.

Cecil's first appointment was in a three point charge in Rosman, NC. The primary church was Rosman but served Selica and English Chapel, the only UM church situated in the Federal National Forest. During these years Wade and Riley were born and Jan answered a call to ordained ministry. So, in 1987 we moved back to Atlanta for Jan to apply all her previous seminary credits to the Masters of Divinity degree. While Jan completed her degree, Cecil worked full time as an Associate Minister at Ousley UMC in Lithonia, GA. The next chapter of their lives carried Jan, Cecil, Wade and Riley to England to serve in the British Methodist Church. While Jan served full time at 3 of the churches on the Kingswood Circuit, Cecil served two churches and took care of the boys. The time spent in the British church and with the wonderful British people is a highlight of his ministry. From the shores of England, Cecil returned to the WNCC in 1991 to take a 1/2 time appointment at Mars Hill UMC while being the primary care giver for the boys. In 1993 he went full time piecing together the church with a new ministry as the United Methodist campus minister at UNC Asheville. From the Asheville/Weaverville area Cecil and his family moved to the Statesville District with Jan serving at New Salem UMC and Cecil serving Rocky Mount UMC. During these five years Wade and Riley excelled at North Iredell High School and Cecil had a fruitful ministry in Mooresville. Then in 2003 Jan was moved to Christ UMC in Greensboro which was a great opportunity for a woman to serve a major church. Cecil was appointed to Pleasant Union UMC. It was a good match for Cecil and his talents. While at Pleasant Union Jan, Cecil and Riley lost Wade in a car accident. It was a horrible time

TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR THOSE ADJUSTING TO A NEW PASTOR

- 1. Give your name to the *new* pastor for several months. He *has a* lot of names *and* faces to remember, so help him out *by* giving your name until he *asks* you to stop. And, another part of this one is, avoid playing the "You should know me by now" or the What's my name?" games. Your new pastor will be eager to learn you and your help will be needed.
- 2. Always speak to the minister first. Your new minister may be uncertain as to your identity, so by all means make yourself known. And, at all costs, avoid 'The new pastor doesn't even know me" game.
- 3. Invite your new pastor to *your* home for a visit, even better, for a meal. That's an excellent informal *way* to get to know each other.
- 4. Make sure you let your new pastor know when you need him. He is not a magician or a diviner; he doesn't magically know when someone is ill or facing surgery. Another game to avoid: "I was *sick* and the pastor didn't even come."
- 5. God is able to minister to you despite any particular minister's failures. *But* you have to let God do so. "I don't go to church because I don't like the minister" is revealing your own shortcomings and disbelief in God, not the ministers ineptness.
- 6. Let your minister express his *uniqueness* and his experience. His ideas, though different from the former pastor's, are likely better and will work, not just as well, but better. Be open to his leadership. There's more than one solution to a problem. We each have different gifts to share.
- 7. Related to that is commandment number 7: Be positive in your comparisons to the former pastor. Positive is, "Your *way has* some interesting parts compared to Rev. Newman." Negative is "That's not the way So-and-So did it." While comparisons are normal, be kind in them.
- 8. Adjust to the new pastor. Your former pastor's strengths and weaknesses are apparent to you, and your new pastors strengths *and* weaknesses *will* become apparent after a while. One of the strengths of United Methodism's itinerant system is that the average United Methodist lay person will come to know the rich variety of people God has called into the ministry. Our system allows a local church to be guided *by* well-rounded leadership over the years.
- 9. Pray daily for your new pastor. He needs your prayers continually, not just as he is getting started with you. Let your pastor know that you're praying for him. You'll be surprised at how well things go for him and for you if you'll tell your pastor of your *daily* prayers.
- 10. Finally, remember to whom and to what you owe loyalty. Your loyalty belongs, not to a former minister, not to the present minister, but to Christ and His church. If you're clear on that, your *new* pastor will be pleased and your other loyalties will assume their appropriate places.

25 Ways to Build Up a Church

- 1. Ignite the spiritual fires of your own soul.
- 2. Carefully study your Bible with the aid of good resource materials.
- 3. Remember you are the church; the place where you study and worship on Sunday is a building.
- 4. Support your church fellowship with regular attendance.
- 5. Frequently pray for your church leaders.
- 6 Look for ways to encourage your brothers and sisters in Christ.
- 7. Discover your own unique and best method of witnessing to others and do it often.
- 8. Give freely and generously of your time, talents, money, and prayers, remembering all that you have or ever hope to have belongs to God.
- 9. Believe in your church and speak highly of its accomplishments and possibilities.
- 10. Systematically invite people to attend study and worship with you on Sunday as well as on other occasions.
- 11. Don't spend a lot of time criticizing others for what your church is not doing. Do something yourself.
- 12. When you use your church building facilities, seek to leave it better than when you found it.
- 13. Frequently ask your church leaders, "What can I do to help?"
- 14. When you are prone to criticize your minister and others, remember that they are human and therefore also make their fair share of mistakes.
- 15. Refuse to harbor hard feelings toward anyone.
- 16. When you attend a church business meeting, attend with a Christ-like spirit. Look for the good and the constructive.
- 17. Encourage frequent and wise use of your church building facilities.
- 18. Endeavor to get all the facts about events, happenings, and decisions in your church before offering your advice on most subjects.
- 19. Lend your enthusiastic support to new forms of worship, programming, and outreach.
- 20. Be an active member of a prayer and work group.
- 21. When your co-workers do something worth-while, tell them about it.
- 22. When members sin, love them, forgive them, care for them, and let bygones be bygones.
- 23. Dare to dream creative and constructive dreams of what your church can become.
- 24. Pursue your creative and constructive dreams for your church as if your church depended on you and you alone.
- 25. In all things for your Christian life and church, first of all ask, "What would Jesus do?"
