Class: **3 Ways to Appliqué** – June 14, 2016 – 9:00 am – 12:00 pm **New Location this month only**: St. Marks Methodist Church, 84th & Pioneers

Appliqué comes from the French *appliqué* which means to "put on". In appliqué, one layer of fabric is placed over another layer of fabric and is sewn in place. Appliqué opens a whole new design world to the quilter allowing for many more possibilities than just piecing alone.

The art of hand appliqué covers a wide spectrum from primitive folk art to the sophistication of Baltimore Album quilts. Different techniques can be used create the same effect with no one technique being the "right" one. Beginning quilters should experiment with several different techniques to find the one that he/she is most comfortable with. *This class is suitable for beginners as well as the experienced quilter.* 

Three talented members of the Lincoln Quilters Guild will share their methods which result in beautiful appliqué designs – Donna Welte, Jaynee Wolfe and Carol Curtis.

They will provide you with tips for both hand and machine *appliqué* using techniques for needleturn, freezer paper, and starch ... it turns out there are as many different *methods* as there are *quilters*, *and this class will focus on three*! Regardless of how you prepare your pieces for hand or machine *appliqué*, learning how to stabilize and stitch your pieces is key. When you appliqué a quilt, it will be a work of art!! No machine is required for class.

The class will be divided into three groups and each instructor will teach one of the techniques and then rotate to each group until all are completed.

Heat resistant plastic sheet for templates
Freezer Paper
Spray Starch or Sizing
Thread to match fabric
Needles for hand sewing
Small child's paint brush
Scissors, small and typical sizes
Pins
Various cotton fabric choices
Irons will be available, but you can bring one
