Objectives of the Workshop

This workshop aims at understanding the role of agriculture and commodity markets in countries in situation of fragility. Food insecurity usually stems from a combination of structural and triggering factors, as well as domestic and external forces. The workshop will explore and provide an overview of the factors at stake in the African continent and, more specifically, in African countries with fragile state institutions. The presentations focus on the impact on poverty, social stability and food-security of long-term processes such as the 'deagrarianization' transition, income diversification, global reforms and trends in trade and capital markets. At the same time, the workshop also deals with the role of the food price dynamics, investigating the poverty impact of the recent international food price shock as well as the driving food price determinants across African countries and in some country-cases. Since the welfare effects of a food crisis are also shaped by national coping strategies and external assistance, the workshop hosts papers on domestic and international responses in specific contexts, such as food relief in protracted crisis. Furthermore it explores the potential of leveraging rich endowments of agricultural and natural resource commodities to prompt a sustainable and shared process of economic development.

The debate over the two day workshop will be functional to draw policy implications in terms of national actions and donors' engagement. Moreover, it will also look at the consequences in terms of global trade, financial flows, labour market rules and governance.
