From the Pastor

There are those years when things slow down at church after Easter, but this is not one of those years. Quite a bit is happening this spring. First, Adult Forum time is full. On April 3, Pastor Beth will have a Summary of Phase One of the Community Minister project. On the 10th, Margit Gundlach will share a Chernobyl Remembrance for the upcoming 30th anniversary. On the 17th, Erik Jelinek from the synod will be preaching and will visit with us about the synod partnership on Community Ministry. The last Sunday in April is set aside for congregational reflection and/or decision on strategy for community ministry.

On May 1 and 8, Jill Ness will lead discussions on the videos from the recent Why Christian? conference. Many of the themes of this conference say a great deal about our community ministry strategies. May 15th is a Gardening Day for everyone. And we conclude the Forums on May 22 with Bonnie Block leading us through Wisconsin Council of Churches Poverty Initiative. All of these are important topics.

And in the meantime, the community ministry project continues to take shape. The congregational council reviewed the emerging strategy for the community project, and the <u>discussion draft of the community ministry</u> is now posted on the website. The grant writing process for the ELCA partnership grant has begun.

The Off the Square Club Shower Project received enough donations during the Easter season to move to the development of the contracts with Vogel Construction and LSS for the construction to take place this summer. A Letter of Agreement with LSS to proceed with construction is in the development stage for approval at the April Council meeting.

In the landscaping area, the contract with Ryan signs is in the final stages of development for approval. A contract with AMA builders for the railing repair is also in the final stages. The congregational council has asked the landscaping committee to refine and negotiate contracts based on bids with Barnes for tree removal, wall repair, and site preparation at various places on the grounds and Ageless Concrete to pour new concrete for the front patio and an area on Hancock Street. The negotiated contracts, which would be reviewed by the executive committee and signed by them. Individually the contracts range from \$1,600 to \$18,000. Together they would total between \$32,000 and \$40,000, and do not include lighting revisions or plantings.

Finally, after a Lenten, Holy Week and Easter season, often things slow down in worship. But not this year. The worship team is assembling the presentations on the clothing of the sanctuary. The 160th anniversary plans for the Oakwood concerts on May 22 are in full swing. And we will soon be dedicating the glassware commissioned for the 160th anniversary project (probably on Pentecost.)

All in all, it is an important time for us in worship, learning, caring for our building, reaching out to the community, and improving the facilities for the day shelter. We need your engagement, your prayers, and your support in these days. When you think about it, it seems that Easter is energizing us for new possibilities and new life as a community of faith in its 160th year.

PASTORAL REFLECTION

Pastor Ken described how discussions for continuing the community ministry initiative have started but that no definitive proposals have yet to emerge.

NEW AND OUTSTANDING BUSINESS:

Future Financial Planning

After motion, second, and discussion, the council approved a resolution to adopt the financial plan presented to the congregation at the quarterly meeting.

- Building maintenance and care: ~\$10,500 set aside for debt retirement, ~\$3,100 for immediate principal payment, and ~\$50,000 for building maintenance and improvements. For future bequests, earmark 5% of those general bequests for building maintenance and care.

- Outreach: 10% of general bequests -- i.e., ~\$34,000 of current monies -- provided for outreach efforts and which will be spent over the course of the next three to four years. As with building maintenance and care, this same percentage could be used for future bequests. Note as well that these funds would be in addition to funds currently set aside in the budget for outreach efforts.

- **Reserves for operating expenses:** maintain six months of operating expenses that are held in reserve to cover operating expenses. At present, this amount would be ~\$180,000.

- **Mission initiative:** ~\$100,000 set aside for a special project of some kind that is yet to be determined. The goal here is essentially to spend this money on some project rather than use the funds for debt retirement, and so expand the mission of St. John's rather than just maintain it.

Copier

A new copier/printer device is needed. A motion was made, seconded, and approved to take out a new lease. This lease will be almost \$100 less per month -- \$325 rather than \$415/month under the current lease -- largely because the number of pages being printed or copied each month has declined.

The \$20,000 Limit on Council Spending

Members at the quarterly meeting asked about raising the \$20,000 limit on council spending initiatives. Section C12.05(c) of the church's constitution provides: "The Congregation Council may enter into contracts of up to \$20,000 for items not included in the budget."

This provision has been in the constitution for several decades now. When adjusted for inflation, the purchasing power of \$20,000 has certainly declined. But, this amount represents around 18% of St. John's annual budget, and the council feels that any decision to spend that much of the annual budget should be brought to the congregation. Accordingly, the council believes that there be no changes in this figure at this time.

Landscaping

With the warmer weather, Matt finally has had some luck with contractors returning with bids for various aspects of this project. In the last few days, bids for signage, railing, replacement and installation of patios have emerged. These bids include: \$6,000 for Barnes to do some prep work with plants and patios, \$1,650 for AMA Builders to remove and install a new backside railing, \$18,000 for Ryan Signs to redo completely the signage in St. John's, and \$6,000 for Ageless Concrete to pour new patios at the front and Hancock Street entrances.

Given the warm weather, action on these proposals is now needed so that this work can be scheduled soon and not pushed back into late summer. Accordingly, council members made, seconded, and passed an enabling resolution for the Landscape Committee to negotiate contracts for the above work.

Work on repairing the slope of the back patio, new plantings, and possible electrical repairs related to outdoor lighting still need bids and will have to be coordinated with the work above.

Tom indicated that St. John's received sizable bequests in 2015 that have led to an increase in assets, and the council is seeking congregational input for how to handle these bequests. Alice then presented an initial plan and its four objectives on how to handle these monies.

- Building maintenance and care: \$63,600 set aside for debt retirement and for building maintenance and improvements. For future bequests, earmark 5% of those general bequests for building maintenance and care.

- Outreach: 10% of general bequests â€" i.e., \$34,000 of current monies â€" provided for outreach efforts and which will be spent over the course of the next three to four years. As with building maintenance and care, this same percentage could be used for future bequests. Note as well that these funds would be in addition to funds currently set aside in the budget for outreach efforts.

- Reserves for operating expenses: maintain six months of operating expenses that are held in reserve to cover operating expenses. At present, this amount would be \$180,000.

- Mission initiative: \$100,000 set aside for a special project of some kind. At present, the community outreach effort is laying the groundwork for an expanded role of St. John's in the neighborhood. These funds could be used for this expansion. But the specific scope and nature of that project has yet to be determined.

Members offered feedback about these objectives and the amounts at issue and were generally supportive. The council will take this feedback into consideration.

All other business having been considered, the meeting was adjourned.
