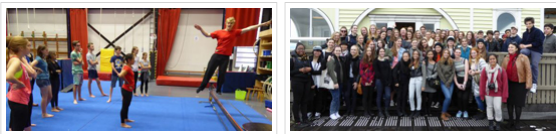

During the Easter holidays 62 Art, Film, Drama and Dance students 'adventured' to Melbourne for three days to experience all of the different forms of 'The Arts'.

Soon after our plane landed in Melbourne, we jumped straight into a circus performance workshop at the world-renowned *Circus Oz*. We were taught how to juggle, walk the tight rope, hula hoop and the art of the devil sticks and diablo. After the workshop we took, for some of us, our first tram ride through Fitzroy, back to the hotel where we prepared for Chinatown. That night after a delicious Chinese meal, the group split up to go to the musical theatre production *Dirty Dancing* and the Art-house film *X + Y*. Both productions were enjoyed by all – as was the hot chocolate in the chilly Melbourne air.

Day two began with a scenic walk through the various alleys and laneways in Melbourne to reach Federation Square. When we arrived there, we split off to enjoy the Ian Potter National Gallery of Victoria Centre and ACMI (Australian Centre for the Moving Image). The Art students enjoyed a folio viewing looking at the art diaries of award winning Victorian Art students. After a little shopping during lunch, we moved to Melbourne University's Victorian College of Arts where we toured the Art, Music, Film, Dance and Drama schools with University staff and Mansfield High School 2013 Graduate, Teresa Hsieh. That night after an Italian dinner (and a chocolate birthday cake for Mr Redhead) on famous Lygon Street, we went to the action packed circus production *Elixir* at the historic and beautiful Spiegeltent. Before travelling by tram back to the hotel, we stopped in the city for a warming hot chocolate and doughnut fix.

The next morning we ventured out to beautiful St Kilda with a warming break in the weather to have a walk along the Historic St Kilda Pier and past the Acland Street shops (the dresses!...the cakes!!!) and the iconic Luna Park where we stopped out the front for a group photo. Afterwards we caught the tram back into the city to indulge in some shopping and a café lunch, before heading back to the airport to fly home.

Mansfield Literary Festival

The Mansfield Literary Festival will be held during the week beginning Monday 25 May. During that week and in the months leading up to the Festival, students will be able to participate in a variety of competitions and activities which include writing and reading competitions, culminating in public presentations of winning students' literary endeavours and awards ceremonies. The prize-winning writers will have their work published in a Festival booklet for which there is a cover design competition. As well, students will be able to dress as their favourite literary character and a prize will be awarded for the best costume. The book trailer competition will allow students to promote their favourite book to the school community. There will be lunchtime viewings of films based on well-known literary works. We hope that as many students as possible will become involved in the Festival which is designed to foster the creativity of our talented students and to promote the quest for excellence in our school. Below are details of the Literary Festival's competitions and activities.

Reading Competition (Years 7 and 8)

Students are to keep a tally of books, recording title and date read, using reading sheets from the library. It is an honour system. All genres can be read – try to get a balance. Books must be in English. English class teachers are to keep a tally of books read for each student and for the class. There will be class and individual prizes for each year level. The start date was Thursday 12 February, the day of the Festival launch. The competition closes on Monday 18 May at 3pm. The Co-ordinator is Mrs McKirdy.

Literary Character Costume Competition (Years 7-12)

Dress as your favourite literary/storybook character. Judging will be during Festival Week at lunchtime – date to be advised. To enter the competition, submit your name to Ms Watts (awattt101@eq.edu.au) by Wednesday 20 May. A prize will be awarded for the best entry.

Book trailer competition (Years 9-12)

Promote your favourite book in a book trailer one minute in length. Submit entries to Ms O'Sullivan in G2 staffroom by Monday 18 May. A prize will be awarded for the winning entry.

The week of the festival will include: screenings of films based on well-known literature; readings of winning short stories and poems; judging of the costume competition; and presentations on assemblies.

Year 9 Geography Students Welcome Guest Speaker



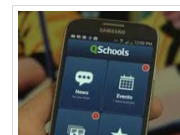

Queensland Core Skills Test Representatives

Expression of Interest – Administration of Core Skills Test

The Queensland Core Skills (QCS) Test is administered each year by the Queensland Studies Authority. This test is held at designated test centres. For reasons of public accountability, security of test materials and proper conduct of the test, the Authority appoints to each test centre, members of the community who carry out certain duties on behalf of the



Authority as **Chief Community Representatives** and **Community Representatives**. Chief Community Representatives and Community Representatives do NOT supervise the administration of the test. The duty of these representatives is to report to the Authority office on the conduct of the test. In 2015 the test will be conducted on **Tuesday 1 September and Wednesday 2 September**.

Expressions of Interest are invited from members of the community who are interested in being nominated for the representative positions. Payments are made. Further information and an application package can be obtained from the school's Upper Office. As the **closing date / time for all positions is 3pm on Friday 22 May**, interested people need to collect, complete and return an application package to the school office as soon as possible and prior to this date.

It is not too late to commence making instalment payments and we will be contacting parents this term to chase up any outstanding fees.

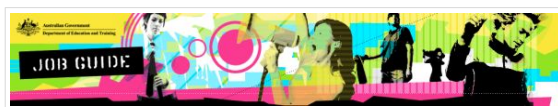
