## Questions

Question 1. Please provide any additional arguments you wish to make in favour of the no change option.

We agree with the arguments put forward by the Scottish Government in section 2.04 of the Consultation Paper. To make further changes at this stage, given the fact that marriage law has only been changed in the very recent past, seems premature.

Question 2. Please provide any additional arguments you wish to make against the no change option.

We consider that the Government would be justified in taking a pragmatic approach which recognises the reality of the situation arising as a result of the recent changes to marriage law made in Scotland, albeit that we acknowledge that this maintains a status quo (by continuing the current imbalance) which is less tidy than some might wish.

Question 3. Please provide any additional arguments you wish to make in favour of the option of no new civil partnerships being entered into from a date in the future.

We have no comment to make.

Question 4. Please provide any additional arguments you wish to make against the option of no new civil partnerships being entered into from a date in the future.

We would wish to agree that there are likely to be some same sex couples who, notwithstanding the fact that marriage between same sex couples is now recognised in law, nevertheless regard marriage as inappropriate for same sex couples. Some such couples may hold such a view for religious, or other, reasons. To withdraw the availability of same sex civil partnerships would leave such couples without any formal civil recognition of their relationship.

Question 5. Do you have any comments on the Government's view that there are insufficient reasons for introducing opposite sex civil partnership in Scotland? If yes, please outline these comments.

We would agree with the view expressed by the Government expressed in the Consultation Paper but would also observe that it could be argued that the introduction of opposite sex civil partnerships might undermine the institution of marriage. Marriage is undertaken as a lifelong commitment providing stability not only for the married couple themselves but also for any children cared for by the couple. At a time when there appears to be increasing instability in family life, the introduction of an alternative form of recognition for opposite sex relationships might be seen as unhelpfully undermining the stability provided by the lifelong commitment given by the parties to a marriage.

Question 6. Please provide any comments you have on the partial Business and Regulatory Impact Assessment (BRIA), on the partial Equality Impact Assessment (EQIA) and on the screening report for the Child Rights and Wellbeing Impact Assessment (CRWIA).
