For more than 100 years the Bedford Historical Society, with the aid of its hard-working volunteers and the benefit of many generous charitable donations, has been very active in the community.

We **collect and preserve** all things Bedford. We own an extensive array of letters, photographs, family Bibles, maps, official documents, household belongings, postcards, records of social organizations, newspaper clippings, souvenirs of important events, family collections of letters and pictures, business records, children's toys and books, and much, much more.

We offer a wide selection of **books on Bedford history** and other **Bedford-related merchandise** at our sales booth on the Fourth of July, Bedford Day, and other occasions.

We offer **6 meetings a year** featuring lectures by experts on a variety of local history topics.

We conduct tours of historic Bedford.

We participate in the **Historic Bedford program** for the town's schoolchildren.

We answer research requests from the public.

We publish an informative newsletter.

# Our archives: Bedford's attic

Since 1893 our archives have served as Bedford's community attic. We now have the largest collection of private historical documents, museum artifacts, and photographs in Bedford.

> Our documents date back to 1651, our collection of more than 3,000 photographs goes back to the mid-1800s (you see a few of them here), and our collection of objects begins with prehistoric arrowheads and continues through colonial days into the present. That's a lot of history!

> Our archives and office are located in the Stearns Building at 2 Mudge Way, which we share with the Police Department. The Stearns building, originally constructed to house the Bedford Free Public Library and the Bedford Historical Society, has provided a permanent home for our collections.

## Where to see us

We don't have a museum of our own, but that doesn't stop us! You can see some of our treasures displayed throughout the town. Here are just a few of our offerings:

- Early **children's toys and games** at the Bedford Public Library
- A display on **Bedford's firefighters** of the past photographs, log books, and other memorabilia at the Town Hall Auditorium
- Part of a Rufus Porter mural at the Town Hall Auditorium
- The Davis Family spinning wheel, housewares, and other antiques at the Job Lane House on North Road
- The original **oak case that long housed the Bedford Flag** (now replaced with a photographic replica) at Town Hall
- Displays on **Bedford industries, farming, Native Americans, prominent citizens, law and order organizations, four centuries of architecture, the Bedford Springs health resort, and** more at the Stearns building (the police station)
