Bully Zero

Alarminglly, every day in Australia thousands of children and teenagers suffer the humiliation and fear of bullying. Bullying can take many forms: the sly teasing, the exclusion from a group, the verbal and physical attacks, the spreading of lies and finally the world of cyber bullying.

As part of our unit of work on community issues, the Year 11 VCAL class as well as four other classes were invited to hear Oscar Yildiz and Ali Halkic from the Bully Zero Australia Foundation* address them on this significant issue.

Oscar started his presentation by defining the term "Bullying" and giving the students many examples of what would constitute bullying behaviour. He explained the differences between the sexes when it came to bullying. Female bullies tended to be more covert, while males were more "in your face" about it. Surprisingly, most bullying behaviour (over 80%) happens in front of peers, who choose not to intervene. Those who do come to the aid of the victim are called "UPSTANDERS". We were shocked to hear that Australia has been ranked number one for bullying on social networks with one in four children bullied online. Most alarming is the fact that 80 % of Australian children under 10 are now active on social networks.

Cyber Bullying was the focus of Ali Halkic's powerful presentation to the students. Ali's only child Allem was a "normal" 17 year old teenager. He had many friends, was popular and happy. In 2009, a former friendship turned sour over a girl. It quickly escalated to threats towards Allem spiralling out of control to include hundreds of text messages and messages via MySpace. There were also threats to involve well known violent gangs. In a state of despair, compounded with a number of nights of no sleep, Allem made the irreversible decision to write a suicide note for his parents and jump from the Westgate Bridge on the 5th of February 2009. Five years later, as we listened to the story, some of us in the audience openly wept for the inconsolable man in front of us and for his young boy who thought he had no other option but to end his life. Ali believed that because his son was home, in his room, he was safe. He couldn't fathom that there was danger lurking in Allem's room in the form of social media. Ali's advice was for students to communicate with their parents, to have parents as friends on social media and to ask for help if

they are victims of bullying. Suicide should NEVER be an option.

Ali and his wife have turned their anguish and grief into helping others. They were instrumental in the installation of safety barriers on the Westgate Bridge, thus preventing others from suffering the same fate as their son. They were responsible for the changing of laws in Victoria. Allem was declared a victim of crime. The bully who threatened Allem was convicted of stalking.

We were all so focussed on Ali's every single word. The home time bell rang, usually the time when there is a mass stampede towards the buses waiting outside the school, yet not one student moved from their seat. Our attention could not shift focus. Hopefully, the presentation served its purpose.

STUDENTS REFLECT ON THE BULLY ZERO PRESENTATION

What did this presentation mean to you?

This presentation was a real eye opener for it made me take a step back and think about a few things. The story about Allem Halkic was really emotional. Dealing with bullying can be really hard; I have dealt with bullying before and been in the position where I don't want to go to school. Knowing that there is "help" out there, the Bully Zero organisation, is a relief. It also helped me realize people still hurt after you are gone and that what you say/do affects others even after you are gone.

Ali, Allem's dad really got the point across about how bullying can lead to suicide. His son jumped off the Westgate Bridge at the age of 17 because a 21 year old was bullying him. The 21 year old still to this day does not take any blame for what he did, even though he threatened and bullied Allem. It is because of Allem jumping off the Westgate bridge that the barriers were put up. This prevents other teenagers having the same fate.

Bullies may not realise you can go to jail for up to 10 years and you will be in the company of murderers, rapists and paedophiles etc. Is it really worth it?

What did this presentation mean to you?

I thought that Ali Halkic was brave to talk about how his son Allem's passing has affected him and his family. This presentation made me think about how many times I have said something hurtful to someone as a joke, but they may have taken it seriously and got hurt from it. I also felt sad for Ali, because he said he blames himself for what happened to Allem. He said "I paid for his phone and I paid for his internet". I was surprised when he said that Allem was a happy person and that he had a normal life and it took just a few days of no sleep and someone to bully him to make the awful choice of taking his life. But as Ali said that 3-4 days of no sleep can make you feel like you're not yourself and you think differently and act differently.

The presentation from Johnny the policeman was also important. I didn't realise you may face a 10 year prison sentence for bullying. The police powers in this area have increased dramatically. The police may trace calls and deleted messages. Bullying will not be tolerated.

What did this presentation mean to you?

This presentation made me realise how much cyber bullying can affect someone to the point of them killing themselves. It was very sad to hear how Ali's son Allem took his life at such a young age, it was very sad to hear what Allem went through. I believe this presentation made us all think twice about how to

speaking to someone or judge them, because you never know how they will react to the words or how they're going to take that judgment. This presentation meant a lot to me, because hearing about someone take their life at such a young age and not being able to have a future is really hard. This presentation made me open my eyes and realise that suicide is not the only solution for young kids these days in similar situations. Knowing that Ali spreads the message to other young kids and helps them through bad situations is very comforting. I believe everyone should listen to the story of Allem, it will make you realise that suicide isn't the only option. You can speak to your parents and call the Bully Zero Organisation for help. Ali's pain was so clear to us and we were grateful to him for sharing his story.
