On Tuesday evening, 2 June, I was proud to attend the Northern Sydney Institute 2015 Excellence Awards which recognised Sam Parkinson, Year 12 (2014), as the TAFE Vocational Education and Training Student of the Year.

Sam attained his Certificate III in Information, Digital Media and Technology (Network Administration). Sam received units towards his ATAR and gained a head start in the IT industry. He was ranked 8th in the state for his TVET course and was awarded a University of Technology Bachelor of Information Technology study scholarship. Sam is currently working two days a week as a systems engineer and completing his Bachelor of Information Technology.

On behalf of Epping Boys High School, I wish Sam every success in his future.

NSW All Schools Swimming

Extending from the successful NSWCHS carnival, nine of our students progressed to compete at the New South Wales All Schools Swimming Championships. This is a state-wide event with public, Catholic and independent schools all competing. Epping Boys High School competed in the 6x50m All Age Relay (Haydyn, Alex, Anthony, Tom, Jack, Bayley) and 14 Years Relay (Michael, Liam, Ciaran, Anthony). Haydyn also competed in the 12 Years 50m Butterfly.

Well done to these boys for their efforts. They have represented the school to the highest standard!

Deputy Principal - Senior School - Lowcock

Year 12 Week 7 has seen every Year 12 student hold informal conversations with the Principal, Year Advisor, Relieving Head Teacher Senior School or myself to discuss aspects of their final year: progress in their studies; how they are feeling at this stage; ways to improve; things the school can do to help them at this stage; future directions and reflections of their time at EBHS. It has been beneficial for both the students and the staff with the information shared. A very pleasing aspect of the discussion was how positively the boys spoke of their time here at EBHS and of their teachers who work so hard for them to achieve to their best.

Numbers are looking good for the Graduation Dinner, and some boys have decided to go alone, even if their parents can't attend. I hope these boys are able to find "adoptive parents" on the night as the evening obviously will mean a lot to them, as part of the winding down of their secondary studies.

I see there are 36 different assessment tasks left in the last three weeks of this term and the first two weeks of next term in 27 different subjects. I hope parents can cope with the stressed young men who are undertaking these various tasks! The two week period of the Trial HSC starts on July 27.

Year 11 While mentioning assessment tasks, Year 11 do not have quite as many (25 in 20 subjects) but there is a need to be well organised and to plan for the due date of the task - last minute cramming or all night vigils are not the way to achieve the best results. Students should also ensure they follow up on the feedback their teachers give them so they can improve for future tasks.

Research has shown that feedback given to students by their teachers is one of the main ways to enhance learning. When a teacher at EBHS gives feedback to a student, the next step for the student is to use the advice of his teacher to improve his result in the future. This improvement process may involve catching up on work missed, doing further reading or research, focussing on answering the questions asked, better setting out of responses, participating more in class discussion (helps to verbalise their thoughts) and further discussion with the teacher, as well as a variety of other aspects.

Year 10 A group of our Year 10 boys is being given the opportunity to do a school to work program which will be one day per week throughout Term 3. We have invited boys who have indicated they are keen to leave school as soon as possible, or immediately they turn 17 (the legal leaving age), or who are disengaged in their studies, or boys who need to find some direction in their life as regards their future studies and plans. The program will involve industry and TAFE visits, guest speakers, assistance with resume and job applications, interview practice, individualised career transition plans and more. The boys hopefully will be better prepared for the next stage of their life – whether that is further study at school or TAFE, apprenticeships or direct entry into the workforce. EBHS has received limited funding for this program and at this stage it is cost free to the boys. However, the limited funding means limited numbers can participate.

A very experienced Careers Advisor in this sort of program, Judy Green, has kindly made herself available to run this program for the boys. I hope those who are given the opportunity make good use of this new and rare experience.

Due to a lot of questions recently on the RoSA for **Year 10**, I include the following information based on the BOSTES (Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards NSW) criteria.

Students will generally be eligible for the RoSA after four years of secondary school. To qualify for the RoSA a student must have:

- attended a school;
- completed courses of study that satisfy the Board's curriculum and assessment requirements for the RoSA;
- complied with all requirements imposed by the Minister or the Board; and completed Year 10.

Students leaving school who are not eligible for the RoSA will receive a Transcript of Study. This will display a Grade from A to E (with A being the highest) for any completed Stage 5 and Preliminary courses (Years 10 and 11, typically). It will also show any VET or Life Skills courses completed up until a student has finished school.

For the satisfactory completion of a course, it is the student's responsibility to:

- follow the course developed or endorsed by the Board;
- apply yourself with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school; and
- achieve some or all of the course outcomes.

Principals may grant students leave for legitimate reasons, such as illness or physical injury. Any extensive period of unexplained absence may result in non-completion of course(s) and may affect eligibility for the award of the RoSA.

It is a requirement for the award of the RoSA that Year 10 students attend school until the final day of Year 10, as determined by the school system or Principal, unless an exemption has been granted by the Principal.

If there is a danger of not completing a course satisfactorily, a warning, in writing, in time to correct the problem and satisfactorily complete the course will be issued.

If a student has not completed a course, they will receive an 'N' determination. Any mandatory course will be listed as 'Not Completed' on the Transcript of Study and this will mean that the student will not be eligible for a RoSA.

Students have the right to appeal against an 'N' determination. Appeals are first heard by the Principal and, if not satisfied with the result, a student can appeal to the Board of Studies. The Boards' decision is final.

On course completion, a student will receive their VET credentials from the relevant Registered Training Organisation (RTO) and the course will be listed on their RoSA.

Subject Selection Evening for students moving from Year 8 to 9

Subject Selection Evening for students moving from Year 8 to 9 will be held on 14 of July. This is the first school day back for student in Term 3. At Epping Boys High School students have the opportunity to select 3 elective subjects. Two of the subjects are 200-hour courses and one is a 100-hour course. P&C Meeting – 1 June Feedback



Thank you to all parents attending and contributing to our meeting.

Mr Michael de la Pena presented the Science Facility's plan to hold 'Vivid' Installations during *The Evening of Music* event (which also coincides with National Science Week). The Science Facility was successful in being awarded a \$500 grant award and the P&C agreed to support the project with a further \$1,500.

School bus replacement: The current school bus is a 1991 model and is now needing regular maintenance and repairs and is becoming unreliable. The school bus is used regularly to take boys to sporting events, excursions and Duke of Edinburgh events. Mr O'Brien has requested that the P&C fund a replacement bus.

At the same August meeting Mr Simon Percy, School Counsellor, will present on "Dealing with mental health concerns in adolescent boys and young men".



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Law Society of NSW Mock Trial - Jaye Dunn - Social Sciences


The Law Society of NSW conducts a Mock Trial competition for high school students each year. It gives participating students invaluable knowledge on the operation of the legal system, as well as assisting to develop their debating and critical thinking skills. Each round of the Mock Trial is presided over by a real local court magistrate or practising lawyer, giving the students connection to the legal world.

On Monday 25 May, the Epping Boys Mock Trial team took on Pymble Ladies College in the third of the non-elimination rounds. The Epping team were the prosecution in the mock criminal trial regarding negligent driving. James the solicitor, along with barristers Sahil and William, performed exceptionally well against our well-trained opponents. Cameron and Alex played the role of our witnesses and were cool and calm under the pressure of questioning and cross-examination, even throwing in some of their own answers, rather than just the prepared ones. Nikhil also played the important role of the Court Officer. Not everyone involved could have a speaking role so our boys were well supported by a team of researchers, who were present on the night as the audience. They were Michael, Kyron, Jayfer and Jacob.

The boys stood up to the challenge of the girls and with their well-prepared questioning, cross examination and excellent opening and closing statements, won the trial, "beyond reasonable doubt." James, in his role of solicitor, had prepared well researched notes for the barristers in the trial. The questioning and cross-examination of our solicitors were fantastic and both Sahil and William presented very worthy opening and closing arguments, respectively. The team handled the pressure from the barrage of objections from the opposition well and did the team and the school proud. Unfortunately, the team lost on points 277-274, but are well placed to see us move into the next round. Well done, boys!




