Each workshop will focus on different technology areas, such as using the internet, email, or shopping and banking online.

The aim of the workshops is to help you confidently access the internet and learn a little bit about how it works – what you can do, what the buttons on the browser mean, and how to make the text on the screen bigger and easier to read.

For those who feel more confident with using the internet, why not learn how to explore and search for things while protecting your computer. Online shopping is a fun way to buy, and it can save you time and money. Learn how online banking and paying bills online is a safe and secure way to manage your money.

The workshops will be hosted by Peter Blasina, the 'gadget guy' from Channel Seven's Sunrise program (see picture below), who has been spreading the word about new technology and its benefits for more than 25 years.

Telstra Connected Seniors is a national program designed to help older Australians learn about new technology. Since the program started in 2007, Telstra has delivered workshops to assist over 65,000 older people get online and stay connected to family and friends.

The workshops will be held on 7th and 8th February 2012 at our North Adelaide and Mawson Lakes residential sites.

Beginning Conversations

Recently, Helping Hand's Grandparents as Parents program (GAPP) held a forum entitled Beginning Conversations, held at Playford Civic Centre.

GAPP provides support for grandparents who are raising their grandchildren. Our aim is to connect people who are in similar situations, and to provide services such as relationship skills, networking events, parenting information and support with childhood learning and behaviour management.

The purpose of the forum was to give a voice to grandparents, and provide an opportunity to discuss the unique issues and concerns that affect them and their grandchildren.

By bringing together service providers and grandparents, we were truly able to begin the conversations and work towards recognition and change for this large, but often overlooked group of carers.

Presenters included the grandparents themselves, Tristan Cox from the

Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs (FaHCSIA), and representatives from the Indigenous Grannies Group, Save the Children SA, Families SA and Grandparents for Grandchildren.

Discussions centred on building relationships, managing the effects of trauma, government changes and more. A panel discussion gave the opportunity for grandparent representatives to have their say on various issues including finance and children's needs as well as focussing on some of the positives about grandparenting full time.

With the aid of evaluation forms and a Post It board, we were able to capture the thoughts, opinions, suggestions and questions from the participants. This collated information will be sent to FaHCSIA and Grandparents for Grandchildren.

They will pass it on to the relevant Ministers to inform future discussion on grandparents caring for grandchildren, and further increase recognition of this valuable carer group.

Ingle Farm Commemorative Pavers

Helping Hand Ingle Farm recently celebrated the opening of their new commemorative paver walk. The walk, consisting of over 80 engraved pavers, has been the result of several years of dedicated planning and work by Ingle Farm staff and the Auxiliary.

"I was introduced to fantastic people who know exactly what I am going through, and even got some possible solutions to issues I am facing in my caring role" "It was great sharing experiences with other carers — the sharing of our thoughts, worries and problems with others in this situation are a must to keep carers on track"

"It was so nice to be looked after, laugh and not to have to make any decisions – other than what to choose from the menu!"
