### NEW JERSEY 4-H TO HOST SCIENCE OF SOIL YOUTH SUMMIT

The NJ 4-H Program of Rutgers University will be hosting the Science of Soil 4-H Youth Summit on Jan. 15, 2014 at Rutgers University in New Brunswick. Young people in grades 6-8 from public, private or parochial schools, as well as youth involved in student clubs, after-school programs or home-school groups are invited to participate.

New Jersey is known as the Garden State with over 730,000 acres of land farmed. However, NJ is also known as the most densely populated state in the nation, which creates challenges to our balance between people, nature and land use. Soil is the foundation for life. It acts as a filter to protect the quality of water, air, and supports growth of plants and animals.

Teams comprised of 6-8 youth and at least one adult advisor will join together with faculty, staff, and educators from the Soil Conservation District on the Rutgers Cook Campus to discuss soil science research and gain exposure to career and research opportunities in soil science related sciences. Teams will participate in a series of hands-on activities to enrich their knowledge and understanding of soil science and learn about the characteristics of healthy soil. After the summit, the teams will work on a soil science related service projects in their local communities.

# Want a New Year's Resolution You're Sure to Stick With?

## Sign up for Rutgers Environmental Steward training

Are you looking for a New Year's resolution that you're likely to stick with, once you embark on the journey? How about a way to give something back to your community in a way that's meaningful and guaranteed to get you out and about?

Consider joining the 2014 class of the <u>Rutgers Environmental Stewards program</u>, which helps non-scientists to become citizen-scientists. Classes begin the first week in January in Passaic, Warren, Atlantic, Middlesex, and Somerset counties, and run through May.

The Rutgers Environmental Stewards program <u>teaches participants about land and water stewardship, best</u> <u>management practices, environmental public advocacy, and leadership</u>. This program began as an innovative partnership between Rutgers Cooperative Extension and the Duke Farms Foundation, but now has expanded to locations throughout the state.

The curriculum is designed to introduce non-scientists to the science underlying key environmental issues in the New Jersey. Academics are joined by colleagues from government and the non-profit sector to share understanding and insights with the students.

"Students will learn about current environmental issues, as well as how to communicate about those issues effectively in the local community," said Amy Rowe, environmental and resource management agent with Rutgers Cooperative Extension, the Passaic County program's coordinator.

"The program is similar in format to the Rutgers Master Gardener program in that a different subject matter expert lectures the class each week," adds Rowe, who is leading the inaugural Passaic County program.

In order to serve the entire state, training is offered in regional locations and recruitment has begun in earnest for the Class of 2014. Information for the Passaic County class is below:
