OBON

Obon is a wonderful representation of Jodo Shinshu as a living religion. It exhibits the important Shin teachings by incorporating the body, mind and spirit. Most of our important Jodo Shinshu religious days are observed by a religious Service. Obon includes the activity of a dance to enhance our participation and appreciation for its meaning. The Obon dance is not the

only physical component, as there is much activity, as sangha members tirelessly prepare food and other accommodations for members and others in the general public. It is a time for sharing the practical and spiritual values of our religion. It is a time to dance.

Most members are familiar with the story of Moggalana dancing with joy, after becoming aware that his mother had been released from the sufferings of the after-life to a state of bliss. Thus, the Obon dance replicates this story with an activity that expresses our joyous gratitude to those who have passed on, whose life efforts have made our lives possible. It may seem ironic that this "gathering of joy" is a response to the death of loved ones. But this perspective is one that is engendered if one is able to truly hear the teachings of the Buddha. While our ordinary mind is overwhelmed by the grief and loss of a loved one, the wise and compassionate words of the Buddha supports our hearts with an expanded reality. Our sadness is balanced by memories of love and support given to us by those who have passed on. The sadness of observing the end of a linear life, is balanced by this Obon dance that symbolizes the cyclic nature of all life. Each life must end, but our recognition that our life is the result of the efforts of others, inspires us to continue this perpetual cycle.

The Obon dance is the most obvious display of the Buddhist concept of interdependence. But we might be reminded that all the activity and effort put forth to present the Obon dance for our members and the general public, is also a reflection of this interdependence. If our ordinary, egocentric mind is troubled with the idea that this work is a burden, then we might be reminded to hear the words of the Buddha. Our efforts in preparing this event, is the same as the efforts of those loved ones who have passed on. If it were not for their hard work, the words of the Buddha may not be available for us. The sadness of death and the drudgery of work might depress us. But the Buddhadharma reminds us of the joy and gratitude of ordinary life. The Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu, is the constant reminder of this gift received from others. The Obon dance of joy and gratitude is the natural expression of our awakening to this true reality.

I know that visitors to the Obon event are often impressed by the dedicated work of temple members. The tireless effort of the sangha members, are a powerful explanation of Shin Buddhism. Participants of all ages demonstrate the Shin Dharma in their activities. The working is the dance. Here, the teachings transcend philosophy, meditation, Dharma talks and chanting. The whole activity of Obon becomes a living demonstration of Shin Buddhism.

There is sometimes a misunderstood perception that, because of the many memorial services, Shin Buddhism seems to focus on death. Actually, the opposite is true. Buddhism has always emphasized the importance of the present moment. One of the important messages of our memorial services, is the interconnection of all things. On reflecting upon the loss of a loved one, we personally feel and realize the impermanence of life. We acknowledge and express appreciation for the efforts of those others who have contributed to our lives. Thus the teachings become real for us, as we realize that we are still connected to those who have passed on and also to all others who are still alive. We become the instruments to pass-on the melodies of the past to those in the future, just as our grandparents and parents have done for us. This is one reason why we dance with joy.

I recall dancing with my parents at the Hatsubon (1st year memorial) of my grandmother. In later years, the dance was for my father or another relative. Although there were tears in my eyes, there was great comfort to have this opportunity to honor them. I recalled the many years of dedicated service they provided the temple as ordinary sangha members. Obon is a special time. A homecoming. A time to feel connected to those who have passed on, and to those who are still with us. It is a chance to meet and greet old and new friends; working, dancing, serving others in a spirit of Oneness. Obon is not just about death, it is about life: a life of Nembutsu.

A NEW BEGINNING: BTSD

WELCOMES AKAHOSHI-SENSEI

Starting August 1, the Buddhist Temple of San Diego will welcome Rev. Kenji Akahoshi as its resident minister. Kenjisensei becomes the 13th resident minister in the temple's 87year history.

Rev. Akahoshi first visited BTSD on May 12 as a guest speaker when he delivered two messages – one to the Dharma School students and a second to the adults. He was very well-received by the Sangha. On June 9, Kenji-sensei and his wife Karen visited BTSD and sites around San Diego. With the recent departure of Rev. Mukojima, Kenji-sensei traveled to San Diego to officiate the Hatsubon and O Bon services on July 28

Officially, the first big event involving Kenji-sensei, and his wife, will be the temple's Bon Odori on Saturday, August 3. Prior to the odori, sensei will conduct an Introduction to Buddhism presentation in the hondo. The event is open to the public.

Kenji-sensei brings to BTSD a rich and dynamic approach of experiencing Shin Buddhism and the Nembutsu teaching that affect personal experiences in today's world.

With BTSD being his first ministerial assignment, Kenjisensei will serve as a kyoshi minister, a status designated by the Buddhist Churches of America. He will be mentored by Rev. Marvin Harada of the Orange County Buddhist Church.

Kenji-sensei is originally from San Jose where he practiced dentistry for over 30 years and was an active member of the San Jose Buddhist Church Betsuin. His background with the Betsuin included membership on the Board of Directors and serving as church president (1995-96). Kenji-sensei conducted study classes under the Betsuin's BEC program and was involved with Dharma School. He received a master's degree in trans-personal (spiritual) psychology. He attended and graduated from IBS in 2010, while he was transitioning out of dentistry. Kenji-sensei was ordained in the tokudo ceremony in 2010 and received kyoshi status from the Hongwanji in Kyoto in December 2012.

Karen Terao Akahoshi is the daughter of the late Rev. Eiyu Terao who started the Spokane Buddhist Church and also served at the Alameda Buddhist Temple. Karen wrote a fivepart series that appeared in the Wheel of Dharma chronicling her life growing up at the Spokane church. Her series was part of a speech presented at the Northwest District Buddhist convention. The Akahoshis have two adult sons, Garrett and Kirk.

Please extend a warm San Diego welcome to Rev. Kenji and Karen Akahoshi, and becoming part of the BTSD Sangha. *Gassho*,


BEACH PARTY REFLECTIONS
