

Message from Peter Couche

In what has been a busy few months, the good news to emerge is that we have been offered, and have accepted a position within the University of Adelaide, to join the Faculty of Health Sciences and in particular to benefit from the support of the prestigious Florey Medical Research Foundation. Since its inception in 1963, the Florey Foundation has worked to raise funds for medical research and continues to do so today in full collaboration with the University of Adelaide.

The Peter Couche Foundation stands to gain, not only from the fundraising capabilities of the Florey Foundation but in the opportunity to access and benefit from outstanding medical expertise, advice and counsel. Furthermore, we will be given access to a wider pool of resources, and the chance to diversify our support. We will particularly and keenly seek the input of Professor Alastair Burt, Executive Dean of the Faculty and look forward to a long and mutually beneficial relationship in which his advice will be both gratefully welcomed and critical. We sincerely thank Professor Burt for the invitation to join him and the team.

We will of course retain our identity, and focus, which is to advance brain repair

following a stroke. All money raised will continue to be directed in its entirety to the University to be used solely for research into therapies for stroke.

Naturally, our relationship with Professor Simon Koblar and his team will remain intact. The focus of the work in Professor Koblar's laboratory continues to be the delivery of a clinical trial for the treatment of stroke, using stem cells isolated from the patient's own tooth. As previously outlined, the technical and regulatory hurdles that need to be overcome even to get to the starting line are formidable, particularly given recent significant cut-backs in research funding.

The Peter Couche Foundation continues to seek the advice of key individuals and organisations to facilitate each of the key milestones in this path towards a clinical trial. This includes advice on expansion of the dental stem cells to large numbers in a clinical manufacturing facility, an ethical protocol for the surgical implantation of the stem cells and approval by the Regulators, The Therapeutic Goods Administration, who oversee all clinical trials in Australia.

Despite these formidable challenges we

remain focused on achieving a stage where the translation process towards a novel treatment for this terrible condition can be significantly advanced.

As I complete this message, I ask you to consider the following. The problem of stroke is widespread in our community – and endemic to our affluent lifestyle. This disease can and does strike anyone, at any time, and completely without warning. Its effects may vary from mild headache, to complete disability, loss of speech, or worse. This entire area, in particular our area of interest, is poorly understood. Hence the urgency of our mission.

We are most keen to start well in our new home, and so we make a special plea for your support. I kindly ask you to consider making a donation to The Peter Couche Foundation. With the generous support of our donors, we can continue to support this incredibly important research and reach for a better outcome for victims of stroke. To all our donors, I sincerely thank you and look forward to an exciting year ahead.
