Tales from the Field: Montana Bird Conservation and Citizen Science

Monday Sept 14th, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. Hope Lutheran Church 2152 W. Graf Street in Bozeman



Montana bird conservation efforts have matured in many ways over the past three decades. Priorities have been established, partnerships formed, and opportunities for birders to engage in data collection and conservation action continue to increase. With new monitoring efforts, eBird, Montana Online Birders (MOB), and the upcoming "Birds of Montana" we have access to more information than ever before about our birds and their

habitats. This presentation will provide examples of (and anecdotes from) this evolution, drawing from Dan's experiences with joint ventures, Christmas Bird Counts, Jewel Basin Hawk Watch, eBird, and more. In addition to enjoying photos of Montana's birds and habitats, the presentation is intended to inspire attendees to play a personal role in "citizen science" birding to help advance bird conservation.

Dan Casey has been a fixture in Montana's ornithological community for nearly 35 years. He was the primary author of the 2000 Montana Bird Conservation Plan, and received Montana Audubon's Conservationist of the Year Award in 2006. He served 25 years as the regional editor for Montana CBCs, is a member and past Chair of the Montana Bird Records Committee, a moderator of the MOB Yahoo site, regional eBird reviewer, and co-author of the upcoming "Birds of Montana". He has worked for Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks (16 yrs.), American Bird Conservancy (15 yrs.), and now for Ducks Unlimited as the Northern Great Plains Joint Venture Coordinator based in Billings.

Bird Notes

The month of September is arguably the best month of the year for birding. In early September the shorebird migration is still near its peak, the raptor migration will be building throughout the month. It that isn't enough to keep you busy, the peak passage of all of the passerine family groups will occur during September. So, whether you chose to climb a mountain to view raptors, or watch for warblers in your backyard, the opportunities to enjoy birds are nearly limitless this month.

And speaking of shorebirds, Cottonwood Reservoir produced several exciting birds this past May. Two Whimbrels were spotted at Cottonwood May 13th, by Andrew Guttenberg. Later that day Vic Fesolowitz was able to get photographs of the Whimbrels. This was only the second time Whimbrels have been seen in this part of Montana. On May 25th, Forrest Rowland found two

Dunlin and a single Stilt Sandpiper at past two or three Cottonwood Reservoir. This was a first both of these shorebirds for Cottonwood.

A pair of **Swainson's Hawks** nested again this year just off of Davis Lane in west Bozeman near Madeline Lieb's house. Even with an apartment building being built next to the nest tree the Swainson's Hawks were able to fledge several young. Anyone who dared to stop nearby and look at the screaming hawks, risked being raked by the attentive parents.

Blue-gray Gnatcatchers were present in this area again this summer. A single gnatcatcher was seen at Lewis and Clark Caverns State Park on June 17th, by Tom Forwood. At least two and possibly a third gnatcatcher were found in Cottonwood Canyon east of Cardwell. A male and female were photographed by Tom at a nest, to confirm breeding. These gnatcatchers were present at this location from late May till at least mid July.

A male and female pair of Western Bluebirds was seen at a nest box in Kelly Canyon east of Bozeman on June 13th, by Cheryl and Ron Farmer. This is the first time a pair of Western Bluebirds has been seen together during breeding season in the Gallatin or surrounding valleys. The

years more Western at Bluebirds have been reported in the area, southeast of their established range, then ever before.





on May 13th, near Central Park Pond between Belgrade and Manhattan, by Byron Butler. This was only the forth record for southwestern Montana. The rarest warbler of the spring migration was the Black-throated Green Warbler found by Matt Keefer, along the Sourdough Nature Trail in Bozeman May 8th. The Black-throated Green Warbler was the 25th record for Montana, but only the forth or fifth away from the northeast corner of the state. Ovenbirds were seen and heard at several spots in Gallatin and Park counties this summer.

A beautiful male Lazuli X Indigo Bunting was photographed by Hobart Collins June 13th, along the Triple Tree Trail south of Bozeman.

Dec. 3: Rosalie Edge, Hawk of Mercy: The Activist Who Saved Nature from the Conservationists. Dyana Z. Furmansky.


Jan. 21: Of a Feather: A Brief History of American Birding. Scott Weidensaul.

membership is still receiving the newsletter by mail, which costs \$9/member/year. (Note that the contributions we receive from National Audubon Society through membership renewals is only \$5/member/year...)

Additionally, if you choose to receive the newsletter by mail <u>please</u> let us know if you change your address or will be out of town for an extended time (stop/start for mailing September through May). Each returned newsletter costs an <u>additional</u> \$0.59 to the Chapter -- and you miss receiving your newsletter! (Note that emailed newsletters can find you anywhere...)
