

#### **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

I often sing the praises of the women of Congregation Beth Israel. Yes, I admit I am a bit biased, but time after time, they are there for our Congregation. I would like to fill you in on the latest gift from this group of hard working women. At our March Board meeting they presented us with FOUR checks. The first was a check for \$6000, to sponsor the years' worth of Shabbat Family Dinners. This covers not only the food costs, but the preparations, handled by Leslie Green, our Shabbat Dinner Coordinator. These dinners have become a wonderful social event as well as an outreach to nonmembers. Next, we received a \$2000 check for religious school fieldtrips; This will enable some of our students to visit the Holocaust Museum in Houston later this year. The women of Sisterhood also issued a check for \$5000 to replenish the Camp Scholarship Fund. As a reminder, there is still time to apply for a partial scholarship to a Jewish Camp for member children. So far, we have rewarded three scholarships to our children, and hope to encourage more of our students to attend summer camp. Last but not least, a check for \$20,000 for our Operating Fund was given to us by the Women of Sisterhood. This money is greatly needed to just assist with day to day operations of our facility. Sisterhood also reported that they are sponsoring a program for sight impaired children at the Corpus Christi Museum of Science and History. Thank you ladies for not only helping Congregation Beth Israel, but for helping our general community as well. Finally, this month will be Sisterhood's annual 2<sup>nd</sup> Night Sedar, not really a fundraiser, more of a service they perform for our congregation. As I recite my praises for the Women of Sisterhood, let me also say how excited I am about the first successful Brotherhood function that was held last month. A nice sized gathering of men of all ages took place at Many thanks to Greg Marks and his B&J's Pizza. committee for having the initiative to start this new group. Hope this will lead to many more functions.

# **RABBI'S MESSAGE**



Passover and Jewish Greatness

We Jews have always done things a little differently. We even start our history as a nation differently to most other nations, particularly nations of the ancient world. A look at most national creation stories uncovers a clear pattern – the ancestors of the nation almost invariably come from great nobility, sometimes even descended from the gods themselves, and the nation was usually formed in a blaze of heroic glory. And what about us? We start as slaves, oppressed by one of these other great ancient nations.

It cannot be stressed how different this makes us in the annals of the history of nations and how we conceive of our greatness as a people. For nations like the Egypt of ancient times, their greatness was inherent. Born of gods, Egyptians were great because it was their due and because the gods decreed

it. Greatness was an entitlement of history and birth, an inheritance for all time. And yet that greatness, the glories of ancient Egypt, have faded into the desert sand while we, born of slavery and oppression, are still here.

Perhaps this is because our Jewish concept of greatness starts from rock bottom. From where we started we could only go up! And thus for Jews greatness is born of humility and striving. Unlike other ancient peoples we are well aware of our own shortcomings, put in sharp relief by our humble origins. We do not see ourselves as naturally entitled to greatness. Our ancestors were slaves not gods. Rather we understand that greatness must be earned. That is why, despite all our history since the Exodus, so much of our liturgy and thought harks back to that central narrative. We understand that to attain greatness from our lowly roots we have had to strive for it. And, as a people, and as individuals we have often succeeded at greatness despite so many obstacles in our way.

As Jews today, as we prepare for Passover, we also understand the nature of the greatness that must be earned. As Jews we do not frown on wealth and status, but these are not our measures of greatness. Rather we remember our slavery and redemption and strive towards greatness in morality and ethics, in truth and justice, in kindness and compassion. While Egypt and all the other great empires we have outlived sought greatness in how much of the world they could conquer and own for their glory, we seek greatness in fixing the world for the benefit of all humanity.



# **Men's Club Corner**



#### HISTORICAL MARKER DEDICATION FOR RABBI SIDNEY A. WOLF- BY HELEN WILK



Rabbi Sidney A. Wolf lived the majority of his life in this little city called Corpus Christi and he lived in such a way that he impacted every aspect of daily life in a positive manner. He did that for every person who lived here THEN, and all those who came afterward.

He did not view people according to their ethnic, religious, racial or economic divisions. Instead he viewed them as representatives of humanity all of whom deserved fair treatment and respect. While serving in the pulpit of Temple Beth El for 40 years and during his 11 years of retirement he implemented those views in many ways and made this city a better place in which to live for ALL its citizens.

Many of you know about the unique joint Thanksgiving service he and his colleague and friend, Rev. William Munds from the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd began in 1934. It was so unusual Time Magazine wrote about it in their Nov. 1936 issue and titled it "Love in Corpus Christi". That ecumenical service will celebrate its 81<sup>st</sup> anniversary this year.

And some of you have learned about his reaching out to the Black community in 1950 by inviting an African American colleague, the Rev. Sidney Smith of First Congregational Church

To preach from the pulpit of Temple Beth El and asked Rev. Smith's wife, Beulah, choir director at Solomon Coles Black school to bring her group to join that service and to continue doing so in following years. In 1950 Corpus Christi, like all of the American south, was racially segregated.

He was not a man who grandstanded but a man who knew what the right thing to do, was...and did it! And As Carl Kuehn said in his remarks, that is the description of a MENCH. A perfectly wonderful Yiddish word that almost needs no explanation.

When it was necessary to speak out publicly, he was not afraid to voice his views. When the city's public golf course was finally opened to Hispanics and Blacks, but they could not use the lockers or any of the concessions, he rose to speak as a member of the Parks & Recreation Board to remind the board and the

public that these people were citizens of Corpus Christi and taxpayers who had every right to use all the facilities. The board voted to open all the facilities to ALL the citizens.

But there were many small acts of kindness done quietly, too.

That's really the way he preferred it. So when my good friend, Hollace Ava Weiner wrote about Sidney Wolf in the anthology, "Quiet Voices, Southern Rabbis and Black Civil Rights," she spoke to a member of the local African American community, who told her, "I remember the first Boy Scout shirt and tie I ever owned. Rabbi Wolf went and bought it. My mother was a domestic. She couldn't afford it."

Hollace also spoke with the late Dr. Hector Garcia who said, "although he kept a low profile, he was well-known in town and respected as a humanitarian." Rabbi was the "go to" person for problems in the minority communities.

My good friend, architect Jack Solka, who grew up here, remembered the impact it had on him when Rabbi took Jack's confirmation class to visit local churches...including the Black St. John Baptist Church. It gave him a new perspective to see black angels...it made him wonder and think. That occurred at a time when there were separate waiting rooms, water fountains & lunch counters. You bet that visit made the kids think...and that was Rabbi's purpose.

From his knowledge and love of music, he also helped to create the Corpus Christi Symphony Orchestra. In 1945 he and the new director of Del Mar Junior College department of Music, Dr. C. Burdette Wolfe, finally launched the CC Symphony. Rabbi served as the initial president of the Symphony Society. He raised funds for the purchase of musical scores, to print programs and publicize the concerts. After his retirement from the pulpit he taught music appreciation classes at Del Mar Adult education series and at Corpus Christi State University. If any of you attended last Saturday night's symphony concert to hear a magnificent performance of Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, you know what beauty the symphony continues to bring to our city.

For all these reasons and many, many others Sidney Wolf deserves to be recognized by the State of Texas as a person to be honored for his impact on our community. It has been my privilege to have known Rabbi Wolf and his equally remarkable wife, Bebe. I am proud to have brought this information to the Texas Historical Commission in Austin and so pleased that they approved the granting of this historical marker. I want to express my gratitude to Anita Eisenhauer, chair of our commission, for helping bring me to this moment.

A remarkable, gentle, unassuming man came to our city in 1932 and influenced changes that improved the quality of life for all its citizens. Just as the orchids he lovingly grew, enhanced the beauty of his home, so did the words of his mouth and his commitment to social justice make Corpus Christi a better place to live.
