



### SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"His heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things." Jesus felt pity, and so he taught. Jesus gave his teachings out of love and concern. He gave them because he knew that they were what his followers needed. He did not teach in order to control, manipulate, brainwash, or coerce us. He did not teach in order to show his wisdom or prove his superiority. Jesus gave us his teachings as a way of guiding us, protecting us, and walking alongside us, like a good It's important for us to welcome the shepherd. teachings of Christ and his body, the Church, in this spirit. Too often, people misconstrue church teaching as something restrictive or controlling instead of understanding that Jesus handed down these teachings to us in order to help us find happiness and fulfillment. When we live according to church teaching, we are doing more than just being "good." We are also staying close to the shepherd of whom today's psalm speaks: "In verdant pastures he gives me repose; beside restful waters he leads me; he refreshes my soul." These benefits are ours when we follow the voice of the One who loves us. Sometimes, we may not like what the voice is saying. Sometimes we may be drawn towards a different path or think that the grass is greener elsewhere. But by humbly acknowledging that the Shepherd, and his church have great wisdom and a unique perspective to share, we will be led in the right direction. Though it may feel like a sacrifice at first, ultimately this loyalty to the flock will enable us to enjoy the contentment of those who declare, "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want."

### SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

With Labor Day just six weeks away we are in the middle of summer vacation time for most school systems. Some folks plan a significant trip for vacation, traveling some distance to visit relatives or see sights or take in events. Others work out a number of "staycation" activities that include day trips to places like the zoo, the museum, a local beach, or a nearby hiking trail. Statistics tell us that Americans work nearly 180 hours more a year than employees in many other countries. While the US labor force is at the top in productivity per employee, we substantially ahead of the workforce in some places with more liberal vacation policies. This weekend's Gospel offers the same dilemma that most business owners face. The disciples reported back to Jesus what they had accomplished. He recognized their need for some quiet and rest. But they could not get away from the crowds who were continually after them. It's like the company that launches a new product or service that suddenly becomes a massive hit. The entrepreneur is faced with the problem of how quickly to expand while not overextending the company in the market and at the same time providing for the legitimate needs of the partners and employees. If you will, the Christian "franchise" faces some of the same problems in the world today. There is rapid expansion in some places (Africa, Asia, South America) while there is still a need to maintain "business" operations in the original markets (Europe, North America). At the same time we want to put out a quality product-if we can even talk about the message of Christ in that way. You see how the analogy breaks down very quickly. But Jesus knew that his followers needed some quiet each day to be able to show his love to others. Prayer and reflection are essential if we are ever going to be "productive" Christians.
