## **From Our Missionaries**

We were in Rwanda to meet with the leadership of the Lutheran Church of Rwanda (LCR), to visit parishes and projects of the Church, to meet with Robin Strickler, our ELCA Mission Personnel, and to learn about the progress of Robin's project in partnership with the LCR, the Rwamagana Lutheran Secondary School. Robin is married to Pastor John Rutsindintwarane, the LCR Secretary General. This is the fourth in a series of blog entries that provide highlights of our experiences in Rwanda.

In April 2006, Robin Strickler took a 60mile walk down the Shenandoah Valley in Virginia to raise money for secondary education in Rwanda. She raised over \$20,000 with the help of congregations and individual Lutherans who were inspired by her dream. Today, her dream is becoming a reality as the classroom building of the Rwamagana Lutheran Secondary School rises from the red clay of Rwanda.

Having married a native Rwandan, Pastor John Rutsindintwarane, Robin was aware of the need for English language secondary education and the desire of the Lutheran Church of Rwanda to establish a school. She enlisted the support of her home congregation, Muhlenberg Lutheran Church of Harrisonburg, VA as well as that of LCR's ELCA Companion, the Sierra Pacific Synod. As interest in the project grew, other congregations and individuals came on board. By 2007, the Rwanda School Project was designated a 501(C)3 Organization, the Sierra Pacific Synod had donated money to buy land in Rwamagana, and Robin was officially designated Director of the school project by the Lutheran Church of Rwanda.

The country of Rwanda has come a long way since the genocide of 1994 decimated much of the population. Although Rwanda's economy continues to have a subsistence agriculture base, the aim of the Ministry of Education is to focus on education (science and math in particular) in order to make Rwanda's best natural resource its people. It envisions a service / technology-based economy, which requires a well-rounded educational system.

Robin lists the following facts as evidence of the need for Rwamagana School:

- Only 15% of Rwandans are currently able to attend secondary school
- Only 42% of high school teachers are certified many are themselves college students
- The country is close to 100% primary enrollment in early grades but only 40 to 60% are finishing primary, depending on the region - less than half of them are attending high school
- Current, public school fees are too high for most families and most schools go to 9th grade only. The vast majority of seats in private schools are for those who can pay.
- Rwanda's courts, universities, high schools and technology systems are still employing many foreign (e.g., Ugandan, Tanzanian) staff because so many of the intelligentsia were either killed in the genocide or fled the country
- Rwanda has a significant need for people with strong leadership and problem-solving skills - two areas of focus on in the school through the Expeditionary Learning framework For more information about Expeditionary Learning, go to http://www.elschools.org/
- The Rwandan government is making a switch from being primarily Francophone to primarily Anglophone. There is no English-language high school in Rwamagana, the capital of the newly formed Eastern Province. There is no school in Rwamagana that accepts students who can't pay.

About 75% of the pastors in the Lutheran Church of Rwanda are primary school leavers.



When in Rwanda in September, we visited Robin at the temporary headquarters of the Rwamagana School located in a building of the African Evangelical Enterprise Center in Rwamagana. The center is a vocational school for street children and serves about 180 youth. To date, there are 22 Rwamagana School students who are taking classes in preparation for entry into S1, or 7th Grade, in 2010. Twelve of these students are former street kids who expressed the desire to achieve their secondary school education. The students are divided into two classrooms and their curriculum focuses on English language, science and mathematics. Because of their varied backgrounds, the students range in age from 13 to 18. When complete, the school will have the capacity to educate 430 students in grades 7 through 12.



English language and teacher training have been ongoing since 2007; however, this past summer special trainers came from Wisconsin to train the staff in the Expeditionary Learning framework.

EL is based on the Outward Bound program in which participants learn skills, practice problem-solving strategies, and gain self-confidence by doing physically challenging activities. This framework also emphasizes sustainability, responsibility and care for the environment.

We enjoyed meeting the students, teachers and other staff of the school. All seemed very enthusiastic about the program and the future of the project. Robin told us that one of the students led Morning Prayer that morning for the first time, and he did it all in English. This was a major accomplishment for the young man who less than a year before spoke no English at all.

After greeting the students and hearing a report about the progress of the school, we drove to the building site to see what had been accomplished so far. The facilities will include a chapel that will be used jointly by the local Rwamagana Lutheran Congregation and the school. We were shown where the chapel will stand and how the property had been cleared and leveled for the canteen and dormitories. The classroom building foundation was almost completely dug, and there was hope that the building would be completed before the end of the year.



We watched as the work crew carefully dug the foundation by hand, dislodging large rocks as they dug. There were no earth-moving machines in sight. We took time to thank the workmen for their hard labor. Building a school in Rwanda is truly a hands-on experience- from start to finish. Many hands are making Rwamagana School possible.
