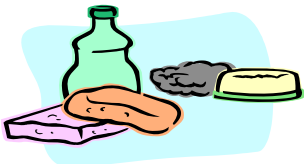

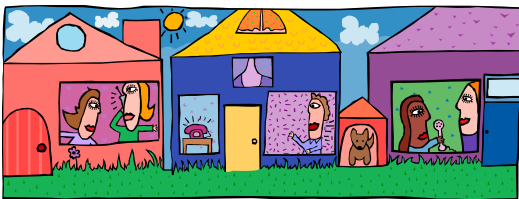

Minister's Message:

Newsletter article July 2013



Aloha! O-bon season is finally here. It's that time of the year again when Buddhists and non Buddhists alike gather for 2 nights of dancing, eating and meeting new and old friends. Arguably, it is the happiest of all the festivals that Buddhists celebrate and it is deeply ingrained in the culture of the Japanese-American community here in Hawaii and elsewhere in the U.S. mainland or wherever a large community of people of Japanese and Japanese descent are living.

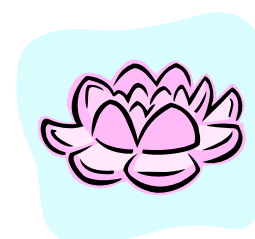
O-bon is an abbreviation of *urabon*, the Japanese transliteration of the Sanskrit word *ullambana* which literally means to "hang upside down" To be hung upside down causes unbearable pain and suffering and the original reference to this unbearable suffering was from the Urabon Sutra, as taught by Shakyamuni Buddha. In the story, the Buddha's disciple most gifted for supernatural powers named Mokuren Sonja, used his supernatural powers to visualize his mother who had died and discovered to his sorrow that his mother, due to past karmic debts, had been reborn in the realm of hungry ghosts, suffering intensely from insatiable hunger and thirst. Driven by the sense of filial duty for his suffering mother, Mokuren Sonja asked Shakyamuni Buddha for instructions on how he can save his mother from the realm of hungry ghosts and the Buddha then told Mokuren Sonja to make offering to the monks who had just finished their summer retreat. Mokuren made offerings of food to the monks and collectively, the monks dedicated all the merits they have accumulated from their religious work to Mokuren's mother and through this action, Mokuren Sonja's mother was saved from the realm of the hungry ghosts. It is said that in his immense joy at the salvation of his mother, Mokuren Sonja started dancing and this was the origin of the Bon dance.

The meanings of Obon, in this story refers to filial piety and repaying gratitude for one's parents, the notion of the suffering realms such as the world of hungry spirits as part of the 6 realms of samsaric existence, and the merits gained through making of offerings, in other words, the practice of dana and generosity as a means to counteract the karmic consequences of the poison of greed. To our parents we owe our life, we were born as human beings because of our parents and we are alive and well in the present because of the care and nurturing that we have received from them. Our obligation to them is of such importance in Buddhism that Shakyamuni Buddha spoke repeatedly to his disciple Ananda "The weight of obligation we owe to our parents is as boundless as the heavens". Obon is also a story about the suffering realms, specifically the realm of hungry ghosts. Although one may not easily believe in such other worldly realms after death, such realms exists within the real world. Thousands of people, mostly children, are starving in any given time in many parts of the world, although not necessarily because of their unwholesome past karmic actions. The suffering of hunger does exist, either through a real lack of food and other needs or the insatiable hunger created by excessive greed. Lastly, as a means of rooting out greed in our hearts, the Obon story reminds us of the practice of making offerings, of giving generously and wisely to those who are truly needy in the spirit of compassion. Although in Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, we do not practice dana for the purpose of accumulating merits, giving wisely and generously is still an important Buddhist practice to reduce one's ego and self centeredness.

With ever mindfulness of the meanings of the story of Obon, we can even more appreciate and enjoy the occasion. The Bon season is a time of reflection and expression of gratitude to our departed parents, ancestors and other loved ones and we dance in joy, secure in the thought that, because of the Primal Vow of Amida Buddha, those that have preceded us are all in the realm of peace and tranquility, in the Pure Land. I wish the members and non members alike, indeed anyone who joins us in this joyous occasion, a very happy Obon Festival. Namu Amida Butsu!

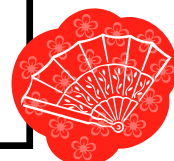

- Set up chairs on temple porch

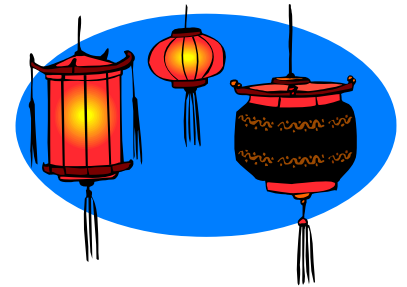
July 27 (Saturday)

July 28 (Sunday)

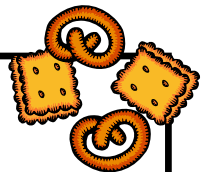
- Cleanup
