February UNC Meeting Report

The February UNC meeting included the following topics:

- ☐ A report from ANC 1A08 commissioner Cliff Valenti who mentioned a possible development on the 400 block of Newton Place.
- ☐ ANC 4C commissioner Timothy Jones mentioned the groundbreaking at the former Billy's Simpson's and the 4c newsletter.
- ☐ Board member and chair of the Standards and Compliance committee Deborah Colvin talked about the progress that the committee has been making. They've already met and developed a list of priorities that the group will look at, such as rats, mosquitoes, and code violations.
- □ Nuri Heckler of Greater DC Cares addressed the assembly with an update on the progress of painting the Rec Center. To date the walls have been painted yellow about two-thirds the way up and painting the doors will be next. They are also developing plans for a community mural. Heckler also mentioned that DC Cares is

planning a cleanup of Georgia Avenue on April 24th from Raymond Elementary school south. Additionally, addressing Heckler's request the assembly voted to write a letter of support for DC Cares to adopt the Park View Rec Center in a mentoring capacity. Lastly, DC Cares, partnering with the Howard Business School, is providing a free tax clinic for those earning less that around \$46,000. It is by appointment on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. The number to call is 202-777-4456.

☐ The guest speaker at the meeting was Cecilia Jones, President of the Northwest Columbia Heights Community Association (NWCHCA). The topic of her presentation was the Neighborhood Watch Program. In addition to crime, Jones stated that other aspects of the program can include city services, infrastructure repair, and block parties. Any activity that helps neighbors get to know each other makes an area safer and builds community.

February ANC 1A Report

ANC 1A did not meet in February due to the snow, so there is nothing to report. The next meeting will be held at 7 p.m. March 10th at the Harriet Tubman Elementary School. At this meeting the developer of the Park Morton project, Landex, will be presenting their latest plans.

Park View UNC Budget Meeting

All UNC members are invited to participate in the 2010 budget meeting, which will be held after the regular monthly meeting on March 3rd. It will end promptly at 9:00 p.m. At the meeting the UNC Treasurer will outline what, from a financial perspective, is required to effectively run the UNC

and ask for feedback from members on how funds should be allocated to best accomplish the organization's goals, including setting aside a prudent reserve. If time permits, fund raising will also be discussed. Members, please mark your calendars for this important meeting.

Park View's Kim Roberts Compiles Poetry Anthology Focused on Washington

A new poetry anthology – *Full Moon on K Street, poems about Washington, DC* – has recently come out and we have Park View's own Kim Roberts to thank. In a review of the work published in *The Washington Post*, Sunday, February 10th, it was described as "the first anthology of modern poetry to be wholly for, about and by current and former Washington residents — [teeming] with poets who've distilled the region's lifeblood into verse over the past 50 years."

Roberts has lived in Washington since 1987, with much of that time working out of her home in Park View. Its hard to believe that a work such as this could have been compiled and edited by anyone other than Roberts, an accomplished poet in her own right with a deep appreciation for the city she calls home.

Crime Report for 1/22/10-2/21/10



In comparing crime for the past month with the same period last year, total crime decreased 13% this month. A year ago there were 38 reported crimes within 1,500 feet of the Park View Rec Center compared to 33 reported crimes this month.

As with last month, the largest increase in crime for this period over last year is in thefts from autos, which rose 112%. Of the 33 reported crimes, 26 were property crimes and 7 were violent in nature.
