READINGS FOR MAR. 29 FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Jeremiah 31:31-34 Psalm 51 Hebrews 5:7-9 John 12:20-33

"Lent" is a season of hope. It refers to the lengthening of days. From Jeremiah we hear the promise of God's forgiveness and a new covenant. "I will be their God, and they shall be my people."

The three Synoptic Gospels—Matthew, Mark, and Luke—paint a picture of Jesus' agony the night before he died. John stresses Jesus' divinity because he was writing for Christians who were questioning whether Jesus was God. He shows the Son of Man in contact with the Father in heaven and clear in his purpose—his time had come. As Paul tells the Hebrews, Jesus knows that in his suffering he will be made perfect to save us all.

In the Gospel, Jesus bewilders his disciples and the truth-seeking Greeks with his foundational Christian teachings: in dying to this world we live; those who devote their lives to God will have eternal life; and through service comes greatness. By dying, like the grain of wheat, Jesus will produce much fruit.

OUR PARISH PATRON, ST. JOSEPH

This past Thursday, March 19, we celebrated the feast of St. Joseph. As you know, St Joseph is our parish patron saint and is also the patron of the universal Church. Join us today at noon in the gym at the St. Joseph's Table! Thanks to the generous leadership of Bernardina Masci, our parish has been celebrating our feast day with the delicious food provided at our St Joseph's Table since 1978. Seeking the intercession of St Joseph, we come together to pray, to enjoy a great meal, and to share our friendship and love with each other. This is a great recipe for celebrating our parish feast day.

The tradition of the St Joseph's Table has its origins in Sicily in the Middle Ages. There was a great famine when food was scarce and many people were starving. The poor had only their faith to rely on. St Joseph was known as the protector of the Holy Family and the patron of Sicily. And so, the faithful of Sicily sought the intercession of St Joseph as they prayed for successful crops. Their prayers were answered, and the famine came to an end. In gratitude, people promised to make an annual offering of their precious possession – food – in the service of the community.

St Joseph's feast day is one of the most important on the Church's liturgical calendar. (We also celebrate the feast of St Joseph the Worker on May 1st.) What do we know about St Joseph? Clearly his relationship with Jesus was intimate and long-standing. In the Scriptures, Joseph is mentioned as the father of Jesus. He appears in the infancy narratives where he is said to be of Davidic descent. Joseph was a carpenter and trained his son as a carpenter as well. Mary was betrothed, or engaged to Joseph, but was already pregnant with Jesus before Joseph took her into his house. An angel appeared to Joseph in a dream and instructed him to take Mary into his home, and informed him that the child had been conceived by the Holy Spirit and that his name would be Jesus. Joseph, however, disappears from the New Testament after the family's pilgrimage to Jerusalem. He probably died sometime before Jesus began his public ministry.

St Joseph, pray for us. Lead us to a deeper, more intimate relationship with your Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

LITURGY OF THE WORD – WEEK FIVE EXCERPTS ABOUT THE HOMILY

"A Familiar Talk"



The word homily in Greek is *homilia* which means "a familiar talk." It is meant to connect with the assembly and be relevant to the lives of the people who are the

local Church. Homily is "familiar talk" because the readings are the language of faith enriched by the claim of believers. Tradition flows from the Word and life and back to God who gave us the nourishing Word.

In 1982, the U.S. Catholic bishops presented *Fulfilled in Your Hearing: The Homily in the Sunday Assembly*. The homily takes its life from a particular liturgical moment and from the integration of the Gospel into every aspect of Christian life. In the preaching event, God's active word renews and empowers God's people for mission. The document gives us some insight on preparing a homily and what every homily should contain. According to that document, the homily begins with "faith" and then faith leads to a response. Each person who "breaks open the Word" in the midst of the assembly should know the people and their concerns. The homilist is a person of prayer and one who "dwells" with the scripture.

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy said that "by means of the homily the mysteries of the faith and the guiding principles of the Christian life are expounded from the sacred text during the course of the year" (S.C., 52) Vatican II distinguished the homily from the popular form of preaching of that day, the "sermon." While the sermon often relied on biblical texts, especially to prove a doctrinal point, it was not rooted in the scriptural readings of the day. By contrast, a homily flows from "the sacred text" and is "highly esteemed as part of the liturgy itself." (S.C., 52)

HUMAN DIGNITY & CONSCIENCE PROTECTION

On March 10, the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, proposed *rescinding* federal regulations that protect health care providers from being coerced into performing abortions.

The current regulations enforce laws making it illegal to insist that a doctor, nurse or other health care provider participate in acts that violate their moral or religious principles. Rescinding these regulations puts providers at risk of either violating their consciences or leaving the medical field.

Citizens must object to the proposal to remove conscience protections no later than April 9, 2009.

PROJECT MARK, MARCH 22 READ CHAPTER 15

This Chapter of Mark's Gospel follows on last week. Jesus is now before Pilate, sentenced to death, mocked by

the soldiers, walks to Calvary, is crucified, dies, and is buried. Mark is very much into this story and sees its centrality to the life of the faithful. He tells it with a certain precision, order and economy. He wants us to trust that the promises of the Messiah are fulfilled. He rests his thoughts in his own faith. We recall that he is writing after the resurrection. It is with the passionate conviction of faith that he presents the story and preserves it for all generations. For as long as we return to these words of Mark we are visiting the first accounts of the Gospel story and its' writer gives profound deference to this part of the story. As we move towards Holy Week, we are invited to rest with the story and find our own emphasis, the one which helps us to center on the wonderful story of salvation.

Have your actions ever been mocked because you are a disciple of Christ? How, if you could be a member of the crowd watching do you see the story unfold? Have you ever sat with or observed as someone was dying? Think how you might sit with Christ as he "dies," this Good Friday? What does Jesus' gift of his death for you mean to you?
