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Applying to Syracuse

e're pleased that you're applying to Syracuse University. This publication contains all the information you need to complete your application. Because of the different enrollment options and admission plans, as well as special requirements for our individual colleges, we encourage you to read through the following material carefully before filling out the application form.

You have four options for applying to Syracuse University. You may submit our electronic application, which can be accessed on our web site at *admissions.syr.edu* You may submit the application form, which begins on page 15 of this booklet. You may submit the Common Application and the Syracuse University Common Application Supplement electronically at *commonapp.org* Lastly, you may mail hard copies of the Common Application and the SU Common Application Supplement, found on page 37 of this booklet. Your application must be submitted by the appropriate deadline (pages 3-4).

When you apply to Syracuse University, you apply through the Office of Admissions to one of our nine undergraduate colleges, based upon your academic interests. Some of our colleges may have special admission requirements. Be sure to check pages 7 through 14.

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How We Make Our Decision

Here are general criteria we review carefully for all applicants to Syracuse University. All students are considered for admission without regard to financial need.

What you've done

We want to know that you're prepared to begin your studies. We look to see that you've pursued a college preparatory curriculum in secondary school and that you've challenged yourself with honors courses, advanced placement coursework, or meaningful electives when possible. If you've taken college-level work, we're interested in your performance. Your grades are the most important indication of your achievement. We also carefully review your current year's performance.

Where you've done it

Through our contact with counselors and secondary school and community college visits in the fall, the Admissions Committee understands how schools may differ from one another in relation to curriculum, grading policies, overall quality of students, etc. We closely review your school's profile to put in context your course selection and grades. By better understanding where you've attended school, we can best judge your overall performance.

Standardized test performance

While your coursework performance tells us the most about you, we also look at your SAT or ACT scores. We will consider the highest score you have achieved on either test. If you choose to take only the ACT, you must also take the optional Writing Test.

What you're like

By reading your personal essay and short-answer responses, we learn about your goals, interests, experiences, and values. Also, you may have a personal interview with a member of the Admissions Committee in the fall, either on campus or in selected cities across the country. While a personal interview is not required, this face-to-face meeting is an ideal way to further personalize your application.

What others think

We look to recommendations from your counselor and two teachers to help us get a sense of you as a person—your capabilities and accomplishments. You may also submit personal recommendations from other members of your community.

What you do after class

We review your extracurricular activities, volunteer work, and employment to understand not merely their relation to the major you wish to study or career you plan to pursue, but also how they illustrate your organizational and leadership skills or your commitment to helping others. We like to see that you can manage your time and achieve academically while being involved in other activities.

A special talent

Several programs at Syracuse University have a talent component to them. We need to know you have the skills, creativity, and motivation for success in these programs. Art and design, transmedia, and architecture applicants must submit a portfolio of original work for review: drama and music students must audition or submit a portfolio, with the exception of those applying to the Bandier Program for Music and the Entertainment Industries. Talent will be evaluated by faculty members in the chosen discipline. and their evaluation will be shared with the Admissions Committee (see pages 7 through 14).

Good student, good character

We're looking for more than just academically capable students at Syracuse. We want students who are responsible and have demonstrated integrity and good citizenship. Your character is exhibited in many ways throughout your application for admission: in written recommendations, in evidence of your interest in your community and your peers, and in the overall presentation of your application to the University—is it complete, accurate, thoughtfully prepared, and on time?

The selection process

Last year, we received approximately 20,000 applications for a first-year class of 3,050 students. We have specific enrollment goals for each college. The Admissions Committee must make difficult decisions about which students will be admitted. These decisions are not always a statement of your ability, but a matter of competition. Students may indicate a second- or third-choice college of admission and will be considered on a space-available basis.

Enrollment/Admission Options

Admission

Students may apply for fall or spring semester. If applying for fall, first-year applicants to Syracuse University are offered two ways to apply: either through our Early Decision option or through the Regular Decision plan.

Early Decision

If Syracuse University is your first choice, you should seriously consider applying for an Early Decision. As an Early Decision candidate, you agree to enroll at Syracuse University if admitted to your preferred college. You may apply to other colleges and universities with the understanding that you will withdraw these applications if admitted to Syracuse University.

Early Decision candidates must submit the Early Decision Commitment Contract, included in this booklet, as part of the application for admission. This contract must be signed by you, your parent or guardian, and your guidance counselor.

If you are applying for financial aid, you will also receive an early estimated financial aid award package. While Early Decision is binding, financial considerations may affect a student's ability to enroll.

Regular Decision

Most applicants to Syracuse University apply for a Regular Decision.

Applications must be postmarked or submitted electronically by **January 1**, **2008**. Applications postmarked after January 1, 2008, are considered only as space remains.

Students who complete all of their admissions requirements (including auditions and portfolio reviews) by January 1, 2008, will be provided the best opportunity to be notified of an admission decision in March.

Early Admission Early Admission is an option for secondary school *juniors* who have completed all but a few course requirements for secondary school graduation. It is the responsibility of students to meet requirements to obtain a diploma from their secondary school at the end of their first year at SU. A personal interview is required. Contact the Office of Admissions for additional requirements. High school juniors who will finish all of their graduation requirements early must apply under the Regular Decision plan.

Enrollment

Single Enrollment

Single enrollment means you apply to one of our nine undergraduate colleges where you will earn a bachelor's degree. This is the most common option.

Dual Enrollment

Dual enrollment means you apply to two different colleges and have two different majors, but you receive a single bachelor's degree granted by both colleges. Most dual enrollments are readily completed in four years; you must satisfy major requirements in each college.

Combined Enrollment

Students interested in arts and sciences and engineering and computer science may want to consider our combined enrollment option. It allows students to have one major in The College of Arts and Sciences and one major in the L.C. Smith College of Engineering and Computer Science. It leads to two degrees, one conferred by each college. This enrollment option requires an additional year of study.

Transfer Students

We encourage transfer students who wish to apply for the fall to apply under the January 1 Regular Decision Plan deadline to receive full consideration for admission and financial aid. Enrollment in some colleges and programs may be limited. However, transfer applications will be evaluated by the Admissions Committee as they are received and become complete after the January 1 deadline. Spring semester transcripts may be required, but applicants should not wait until the conclusion of the semester to apply. We will continue to aid students as funds remain. The Office of Admissions will be pleased to assist you through the transfer process.

Applying for the Spring Semester

We welcome both high school and transfer applicants for the spring semester. Applications should be postmarked by November 15. Exceptions to the deadline may be requested.

For high school students wanting to take time off or pursue part-time study prior to starting college, spring admission is an option. The University offers spring orientation for students entering midyear. On-campus housing is available.

Transfer students should submit fall transcripts as soon as possible. Credit evaluations will follow the admissions notification.

First-Year Student Admission Requirements and Application Instructions

Requirements

To be considered for admission to Syracuse, you must meet the following requirements:

- **1** Be enrolled in, or have graduated from, an accredited secondary school. (To learn more about the University's home-schooling requirements, contact the Office of Admissions at 315-443-3611.)
- 2 Be taking, or have taken, a college preparatory curriculum, including four years each of English, science, social studies, and mathematics (through geometry and intermediate algebra) and a minimum of three years of a foreign language.
- While not required, you may have an interview with a member of the Admissions Committee. You may schedule appointments Monday through Friday on campus or at our Metropolitan New York Office of Admissions in Manhattan. We also conduct interviews in metropolitan areas across the country. Visit our web site at admissions.syr.edu or call 315-443-3611 for locations.
- 4 Admission to Syracuse University is contingent upon graduation from secondary school and a continued record of good citizenship and character. You must provide a final secondary school transcript after graduation, by July 31, 2008.

Instructions

- Complete the application form (pages 15-19), including the short-answer questions and 250-500 word essay question (page 18).
- Complete the Secondary School Counselor Evaluation (pages 21-22) by filling out the top portion and giving it to your guidance counselor to complete.
- Fill out the top portion of the Academic Recommendations (pages 23-26). Give one each to two teachers you have had in college preparatory subjects from the sophomore year on. Have them fill it out and return the completed recommendation to your guidance counselor.
- 4 Satisfy any special admission requirements for the Syracuse University college to which you are applying (pages 7-14). If you wish to apply to another Syracuse University academic division as a second or third choice, you must meet the requirements specified by that school.

If you are submitting a paper application, all materials for admission consideration (except for portfolios and auditions) should be sent in the envelope provided. Please refer to the inside back cover for the appropriate mailing address.

- Take either the Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) or the test battery of the American College Testing Program (ACT). If you choose to take only the ACT, you must take the optional Writing Test. Be sure to have your test score reports forwarded to Syracuse University. The SAT College Board number for Syracuse University is 2823. The ACT Assessment Code for Syracuse University is 2968.
- 6 The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or International English Language Testing System (IELTS) is required of all applicants whose native language is not English. This requirement can be waived in certain situations. Please visit admissions.syr.edu/applying/international.cfm for a more complete explanation.
- 7 International applicants only: See pages 29-30, providing information on citizenship, financial support, and sponsorship.
- Request that your guidance counselor submit the Senior Grade
 Report (page 27) from your secondary school as soon as possible.
 Students applying under the Early Decision plan should submit their first available senior year grades.
 The Admissions Committee will not make a decision without senior year grades for students applying under the Regular Decision plan.

Transfer Admission Requirements and Application Instructions

Transfer Admission

If you have attended an institution of higher education for any period of time after graduating from secondary school and received graded credit in academic coursework, please apply as a transfer student.

Transfer students are evaluated primarily on the basis of their collegelevel work. To be considered for admission to Syracuse, you must meet the following requirements:

- Complete and submit the Syracuse University Undergraduate Application for Admission (pages 15-19).
- Write a 250-500 word personal essay. In addition, if you have not already done so in your personal essay, you must complete the descriptive statement asking you to provide information on your college-level class experience and why you are applying to Syracuse University as a transfer student (page 18).
- Request that the registrar of each college or university you have attended submit two official transcripts of your record directly to Syracuse University. If you are currently enrolled in another institution, ask that the transcripts be sent as soon as you have completed the current semester. When these are received, we will send you a final transfer credit evaluation.
- 4 Submit the academic recommendations to two professors who are able to assess your capabilities.

- f you will have completed fewer than 30 credits of college-level coursework, please submit an official copy of your secondary school transcript.
- The Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or International English Language Testing System (IELTS) is required of all applicants whose native language is not English. This requirement can be waived in certain situations. Please visit admissions.syr.edu/applying/international.cfm for a more complete explanation.
- See pages 7-14 to be certain you have met the special requirements of the college to which you are applying as a first, second, or third choice.
- 8 International applicants only: See pages 29-30 for information on financial support and scholarships.
- While not required, you may have an interview with a member of the Admissions Committee. You may schedule appointments Monday through Friday on campus or at our Metropolitan New York Office of Admissions in Manhattan. We also conduct interviews in metropolitan areas across the country. - Admission to Syracuse University is contingent upon a continued record of good citizenship and character.

Transfer Credit

Syracuse University grants transfer credit for courses successfully completed at other accredited institutions or through means described in the "Academic Rules and Regulations" section of the Syracuse University Bulletin: Undergraduate Course Catalog. In general, transfer credit is allowed for courses worth three or more credits where you earned a "C" (2.0) or higher and for which there is a comparable course offered at Syracuse University. Transfer credit is evaluated after you are admitted, and, generally, notification of approved credit is sent within two weeks. You do not have to commit to enrolling until you have received your credit evaluation.

If you are submitting a paper application, all materials for admission consideration (except for portfolios and auditions) should be sent in the envelope provided. Please refer to the inside back cover for the appropriate mailing address.

School of Architecture

The School of Architecture requires four years each of college preparatory English and mathematics, and recommends having taken at least one year of physics, precalculus, and art. Students are only admitted to the program in the fall semester.

Portfolio Requirements

A portfolio of creative work is required for admission to the School of Architecture. This is a personal statement about you, your visual training, interests, values, and aspirations. It is to your advantage to take the time to present yourself well.

A portfolio is required for admission to the School of Architecture. The deadlines for submission are:

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Your portfolio should contain approximately 15 to 20 pieces of work. The images may originate from such media as drawing, painting, 2D and 3D designs, photography, woodworking, sculpture, or any other visual media that demonstrate your interest and aptitude in creative and graphic work. Samples of freehand drawings are required. Mechanical and architectural drawings are not necessary and, if included, should exemplify design and creativity, not simply technological skills. Keep in mind that good design also incorporates presentation and proper editing.

SCHEDULING AN IN-PERSON PORTFOLIO REVIEW

You may schedule an on-campus portfolio review with an architecture faculty member by appointment Monday through Friday, or during a Fall Reception program or our Campus Portfolio Day. Off-campus opportunities include appointments at the University's Lubin House in New York City or the Greenberg House in Washington, D.C. on predetermined dates.

Portfolio reviews are also offered in various cities. Please refer to our web site at *soa.syr.edu* for details and updates. You may also obtain information by calling the School of Architecture at 315-443-2256.

MAILING YOUR PORTFOLIO

If you opt to send your portfolio, it should be mailed directly to:

- Clearly indicate your name, mailing address, e-mail address, and "Syracuse University School of Architecture" on the outside of portfolio.
- Place your work in a flat binder no larger than 10" x 13".
- Include a paragraph about yourself, your interests, and your aspirations.
- Do not mail original work. Reproductions should be highquality photographs, photocopies, or prints. Slides and CDs are not acceptable and will result in a disadvantage in the admissions process.
- Label each portfolio item with information about the medium used, type of project, original size, and any other comments you wish to make about the piece.
- Return postage must accompany the portfolio if you wish it to be returned. Portfolios will be returned at the beginning of the next academic year.

Music performance through Arts and Sciences: If you are pursuing this option while enrolled in The College of Arts and Sciences, you will need to complete an audition. Please refer to the Setnor School of Music audition requirements for the College of Visual and Performing Arts (pages 8-14).

L.C. Smith College of Engineering and Computer Science

Required high school subjects: four years of college preparatory mathematics (including precalculus) and laboratory science (including physics and/or chemistry)

S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications

Photography and graphic arts students:

Students are not admitted directly to the photography or graphics programs. A portfolio and coursework in graphics, newswriting, and photography are required before admission to these majors. Students generally present their portfolio for review in their sophomore year; therefore, no portfolio is required at the time you apply for admission to Syracuse University. The photography and graphics majors may require a minimum of five semesters to complete. Direct any questions about this portfolio to Professor Anthony Golden, 315-443-3367.

College of Visual and Performing Arts

- The School of Art and Design and Department of Transmedia require a portfolio review.
- The **Department of Drama** requires an audition or portfolio review.
- The Setnor School of Music requires an audition, except for the Bandier Program for Music and the Entertainment Industries.
- The **Department of Communication and Rhetorical Studies** does not have special admission requirements.

Students are responsible for completing their portfolio reviews and auditions in person (with options on or off campus) or by mail. This process can be completed before or after you submit your application but should meet all University deadlines. In-person portfolio reviews and auditions can be scheduled by calling the college's Office of Recruitment and Admissions at 315-443-2769. Options for in-person portfolio reviews and auditions may also be found on our web site at *vpa.syr.edu/index.cfm/page/undergraduate-admissions* If you decide to mail your portfolio or audition materials, clearly indicate your name and the program to which you are applying on the outside of your materials.

Submitting Your Portfolio

IN PERSON

Refer to page 8 for information on scheduling an in-person review. Please note that if you are submitting a media portfolio (art video, computer art, film) in person, you must be prepared to leave a copy of your portfolio with us. Only actual work (no tapes, scripts, disks, or slides) can be seen off campus.

BY MAIL

It is not necessary to submit a portfolio by mail if you had it reviewed in person unless you requested an "advise only" review or were told to resubmit.

All materials described below must be sent to:

Clearly indicate your name and the college to which you are applying on the outside of your materials. **Portfolio materials sent with your application will not be reviewed.**

If you would like your portfolio returned, include a self-addressed, stamped (with appropriate postage) envelope large enough to contain it. It will be returned to you in the summer unless you call to request it sooner.

Do not send original work of any kind. Send only duplicates. A disk is preferred over slides. Make sure your slides, disks, etc. are viewable. Work should be in focus, not too dark or too light, and should have accurate color.

If preparing a **disk**, please note:

- Two-dimensional work on disk must be readable by a PC.
- Images should be formatted as JPG or PDF files and saved in one file folder for easy viewing. The longest side of images should be no less than 600 and no more than 800 pixels (approximately 300 dpi).
- Title images with the corresponding number on fact sheet (see next column).
- Please label the disk clearly with your full name.

If preparing **slides**, label the front of each slide with:

- Your full name (include middle name)
- A number that corresponds with the description on the fact sheet (see next column)
 - A red dot in the lower-left corner
- If you have multiple shots per image, label the slides in sequence (2a, 2b).
- Please put slides in a box, **not** in slide sheets.

All portfolios must include a typed fact sheet to correspond with slides or disk.

Please list:

- Your full name (including middle name)
 - Address
 - Phone number
 - · E-mail address
 - Status: first-year student or transfer
 - Program to which you are applying
- Proposed major (transfer applicants, please indicate if you have a strong second interest)
 - Semester you plan to enter SU
- High school students must list art courses that will be completed by graduation.
- Using each slide/image number, indicate: size; medium; date completed; if done in the classroom or independently; if based on real life, photo reference, or imagination; and concept/ideas.

Special Notes for Transfer Applicants to the School of Art and Design and Department of Transmedia

Transfer applicants are encouraged to complete the application and portfolio review as soon as possible, since space is limited in some programs. Please note the following information:

- Transfer portfolios are evaluated on campus only, usually by a faculty member in the student's proposed major. Please indicate you are a transfer candidate when scheduling your inperson appointment or submitting by mail. Disks are preferred.
- If you have experience in the area in which you hope to major, please show examples of your work in that area.
- Please include with your portfolio an unofficial college transcript. This is **in addition** to the two official college transcripts you send with your application for admission.
- Include a paragraph explaining why you wish to study art, what major you hope to pursue and why, what you expect from the major, and your career aspirations.
- In-person reviews with faculty are only available when classes are in session and depend on faculty schedules.

A portfolio is required for all students seeking admission to the School of Art and Design. Students applying to the B.S. degree program in environmental design (interiors) have the option of showing a portfolio specific to that major rather than a traditional portfolio (see page 11).

PREPARING A TRADITIONAL ART PORTFOLIO

- Present a minimum of 12 and a maximum of 20 pieces of your best and most recent artwork.
- Include at least eight works from reallife observation such as still life figure drawing, portraits/self-portraits, and landscapes.
- Works copied from photos, magazines, masterworks, and works exclusively from imagination are not considered strong portfolio material.
- Works in other media such as sculpture, ceramics, etc. are encouraged in addition to observational drawing.
- Drawings, paintings, etc. should show consideration of the background and composition. Avoid "floating" figures or objects.
- If showing your sketchbook, please flag the best pages for viewing. This will not count as one of your 12 to 20 original art works.

- Concepts (ideas), originality, and creativity are very important.
- Quality of work is more important than quantity. Show your strongest work.
- Sewing skills will not be considered in the portfolio, and fashion illustrations should not make up the majority of the portfolio.
- Do not include sewn garments, T-shirt designs, yearbook layouts, scrapbook pages, or images only involving manipulation of software. Do not include more than two gesture drawings or technical/mechanical drawings. Any cartoon work must be your original ideas, characters, etc. and not derivative of another's work.
- Organize works by year completed with vour earliest works first.
- It is not necessary for prospective first-year students to show work from an area they are considering as a major.

- Portfolios should be neat, clean, and organized. Matting or mounting helps protect the work but is not required. Lay a clean sheet of paper between each of the works, but do not attach it to the work itself.
- If submitting two-dimensional computer-generated work (using Photoshop, Illustrator, etc.), please note:
 - All images will be evaluated on their artistic merit and not on the manipulation of software.
 - Work must be original, not clip art.
 - Images may be submitted by hard copy or disk (see "Submitting Your Portfolio By Mail" page 9).
 - Briefly explain how you created the image and the software used.

PREPARING A PORTFOLIO FOR THE B.S. DEGREE PROGRAM IN ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (INTERIORS)

- If you have taken art and/or design classes, present a traditional art portfolio (see the previously described requirements).
- If you have not taken art and/or design classes, show evidence of your ability to communicate and to think in dimensional space by providing 8 1/2" by 11" drawings (photocopied) as outlined:
- 1. A drawing of a room in your home. Include the visual details to show its ambience and functions. Also show how the room relates to the surrounding environment as well as to the users of the space.
- 2. A drawing, in color, of a threedimensional object, such as a piece of furniture.
- Students must include with the portfolio a one- to two-page statement outlining their interest in environmental design (interiors).

Portfolio Preparation: Department of Transmedia

A portfolio is required for all students seeking admission to the Department of Transmedia.

PREPARING A PORTFOLIO FOR ART PHOTOGRAPHY, ART VIDEO, COMPUTER ART, OR FILM

If submitting a media portfolio for art video, computer art, or film, you may either submit by mail (see "Submitting Your Portfolio") or, if you visit in person, please be prepared to leave a copy of the portfolio with us. Art photography applicants do not need to leave a copy of their portfolio. All work must have original concepts. Traditional artwork is also acceptable. Media portfolios are as follows:

Art Photography

- Twelve to 20 prints. Formats include prints, slides, CDs, or URL.
- Video or film transferred to VHS videotape.
- You must also submit any writing about your creative ideas in addition to the above.

Film

- Film applicants must submit a fiveminute film transferred to VHS videotape only (not a CD). A five-page written script for a five-minute film is acceptable if you do not have a film. If you have both, please submit both. Please label your videotape with your name.
- Applicants must attach a paragraph stating why they wish to study film.

Art Video

- Original work done in the medium of video is preferred.
- Submit a **series** of video works that demonstrate technical competence and strong conceptual development. Submissions must be made on **one** DVD or VHS tape.
- A written fact sheet must be attached to define the title, running time, and the student's role on the recording (director, camera, editing, etc.) for each work included.
- Accomplishments in other media art forms, especially photography, film, computer art, audio art, and performance art, may be submitted.
- Photography may be submitted as 35mm slides or as digital prints. Films should be submitted on video (see formats above). Computer art should be submitted on DVD, VHS, or as digital prints. Audio work should be submitted on CD or audiocassette.

 In addition, art video applicants must submit a written essay on subjects such as media literacy, critical approaches to music video, personal media versus corporate media, etc. This must be typed and double-spaced.

Computer Art

- Submit time-based media such as animation, video, interactive media, and/or traditional work.
- Applicants should also submit a one-page statement of intent.
- Preproduction materials such as storyboards are encouraged.
- Computer art applicants may submit the following media: DVD, VCD, CD-ROM, slides, photos, and prints.
 Web sites should be sent as an active URL. Digital media will be viewed on a Mac, so please check compatibility.
- Please note that students interested in computer animation should have strong drawing skills. Strong math skills are critical for special effects.

DEPARTMENT OF DRAMA

Each drama program requires an audition or portfolio review. Students are responsible for submitting their auditions or portfolio reviews in person or by mail.

IN PERSON

Please note: Acting and musical theater applicants should schedule their audition before January 1, 2008 as audition spaces are limited. If they are filled, you will be asked to submit a taped audition in lieu of auditioning in person.

Acting

- Prepare and memorize two contrasting two-minute monologues from modern plays (one comedy and one drama) by characters reasonably close to your own age. You may be asked to make adjustments and/or perform an improvisation during the audition.
- Submit (1) a current resume listing all productions in which you have been involved, and when and where produced; (2) a brief statement describing why you are choosing a career in acting; and (3) a photograph of yourself alone. This does not have to be a professional head shot.

Musical Theater

- Acting: Prepare and memorize a twominute monologue from a modern play (comedy or drama) by a character fairly close to your own age. This should not be taken from a musical.
- Voice: Prepare and memorize two songs from musicals of contrasting styles, moods, and time periods (a ballad and an up-tempo number). Neither song should exceed 90 seconds. Be prepared to sing one of these songs. The second will be heard if needed. You may bring your own accompanist, but an accompanist is provided. You must bring your sheet music in a binder so that the pages may be turned easily (a small, hard-back three-ring binder works best) and in the key in which you will sing it.
- Dance: All musical theater applicants are required to participate in a dance audition. If you are auditioning in person, you will be asked to learn a short dance combination to be performed in small groups. Students will be evaluated to assess level of achievement, aptitude for dance study, and potential for success in a demanding training program for musical theater that equally emphasizes acting, singing, and dance.

Students should demonstrate the physical facility to participate fully in rigorous studio work. Prior dance training, while desirable, is not always required for acceptance. Enthusiasm and obvious potential may, on occasion, substitute for prior training. Candidates should dress in basic dancewear or rehearsal attire—clothing that allows freedom of movement. Women should wear leotards and tights. Men should wear jazz pants or tights and a T-shirt. Jazz shoes are recommended for both men and women. No bulky or oversized sweatpants or sweatshirts are permitted.

• Submit (1) a current resume listing all productions in which you have been involved, and when and where produced; (2) a brief statement describing why you are choosing a career in musical theater; and (3) a photograph of yourself alone. This does not have to be a professional head shot.

Design/Technical Theater

- All applicants must submit a portfolio containing examples of sketches, drafts, or photographs of productions you have designed; artwork (paintings, sculpture, drawings, prints, photographs) not related to theater work; and class projects and/or craft projects that show evidence of creative/artistic ability. This should be your best and most recent work. These may be submitted as slides or photographs of the original work.
- Portfolios may also include projects that showcase skills in technical areas: anything you have constructed, sewed, painted, or were responsible for creating and/or executing. Include a brief explanation of the part you played in the creative process.
- Remember that the quality of the work is better than quantity. Ten to 20 well-chosen pieces that show variety should be sufficient to showcase your skills.

Include a short explanation of the work such as an artist statement or concept. Be prepared to answer questions about your work, including the concepts followed and the materials used.

- If you have not documented your artistic skills in a portfolio, you may submit 10 to 15 photographs in black and white and/or color that show your visual sensitivity. Please include an explanation of why you chose the subject or scene (composition, texture, form, color, light) to photograph.
- Letters of reference from directors, theater teachers, technical directors, or other professionals who can speak to your creativity, work ethic, or leadership must be submitted with your portfolio.
- Submit (1) a resume of theater work listing skills and/or classes taken in any area of theater or art and (2) a statement of purpose indicating what led you to consider this major, your expectations, and your career aspirations.
- Portfolios are reviewed in consideration of the following criteria: drawing, painting or photography, composition, concepts, presentation, use of color and other elements of design, variety of work, and technical skills demonstrated.

Stage Management

- Your portfolio should consist of samples of stage management production materials such as a complete production book, running notes, or other materials that show evidence of organizational skills and stage management abilities, as well as photos of past productions if possible.
- Submit (1) a current resume listing all productions in which you have been involved, and when and where produced; (2) a brief statement describing why you are choosing a career in stage management; and (3) letters of reference from directors, theater teachers, or technical directors with whom you have worked.

BY MAIL

Students applying to the Department of Drama who wish to mail their audition or portfolio must follow the guidelines in this section. It is important to note that you are required to fulfill the same requirements for the major to which you are applying as listed under the in-person guidelines. Please note: All materials described below must be sent to the Office of Recruitment and Admissions, College of Visual and Performing Arts, Syracuse University, 200 Crouse College, Syracuse NY 13244-1010. Do not send them with your application.

Acting and Musical Theater

Acting and musical theater applicants may mail a VHS videotape, DVD, or CVD of their audition along with the written materials and photograph as described under the in-person guidelines. Please follow these instructions for your taped audition:

- Only VHS videotapes, DVDs, and CVDs will be accepted. The tape should be filmed in the SP mode.
- Your tape, DVD, or CVD and all written materials must be clearly labeled with your full name (including middle name), intended major, and first-year or transfer status.
- You should be the only person represented on the videotape, DVD, or CVD, and you should perform against a plain backdrop or wall.
- On the tape, DVD, or CVD you must comment on your background and training, experience in performance, and personal goals in the theater.
- Videotapes, DVDs, or CVDs of high school productions are not admissible.
- Musical theater applicants must also include a dance segment that demonstrates the candidate's aptitude for serious dance study. The tape, DVD, or CVD should include evidence of jumping and turning abilities; awareness of body position, direction, and line; rhythmic sensibilities; and appropriate stylistic elements and performance qualities relative to the student's background and training, if applicable. Students should wear appropriate dance attire, and the video should be a full-body shot, approximately one minute in length.

Design/Technical Theater

Design/technical theater applicants may mail an art portfolio of slides and photographs on CD-ROM or DVD. You must attach to the portfolio all of the written materials as described under the in-person guidelines. Please follow these instructions for mailing your portfolio:

- All portfolios must have one attached typed fact sheet that lists:
 (a) your full name, including middle name; (b) address; (c) phone number; (d) e-mail address; (e) first-year or transfer status (f) semester you plan to enter SU; (g) college to which you are applying; (h) area of interest in design/technical theater (set, costume, or lights).
- Transfer students must attach to the portfolio unofficial college transcripts and/or a list of courses that will be completed by the time they plan to attend SU. This is in addition to the two official college transcripts that must accompany the application for admission.
- Do not send original work or original sets of color slides or photographs.
 Send only duplicates.
- Make sure the slides/photographs/ discs are readable/viewable. They should be in focus, not too dark or too light, and should have accurate color. Indicate the top of each slide you submit with an arrow.
- All slides and photographs should be numbered and labeled with your name and the title of the piece. A fact sheet that describes each by number should include (a) the title of the piece; (b) the size; (c) the medium; (d) date completed; (e) if done in the classroom or independently; (f) if based on real life, photo reference,

or imagination; and (g) concept. When more than one slide is used to illustrate a piece, label the slides in sequence (2a, 2b).

- Put slides in 8 1/2" by 11" slide pages. Slide boxes are not acceptable.
- If sending production photos, please indicate what part you played in the creation or execution of the item or items shown on the photo or slide.
- You may provide a video clip (two to four minutes) of a specific sequence from a production that showcases your work.
- If you would like your slides/ photographs/disks returned, you must include a self-addressed, stamped (with appropriate postage) envelope large enough to contain them. They will be mailed to you in May unless you call to request them sooner.

Stage Management

Stage management students may mail a portfolio as described under the inperson guidelines. You should submit duplicated materials, not originals. All materials should be clearly labeled with your full name, year of entry, and desired major.

SETNOR SCHOOL OF MUSIC

An audition is required for all applicants to the Setnor School of Music, except for those applying to the Bandier Program for Music and the Entertainment Industries. Students are responsible for submitting their audition in person or by mail.

Whether auditioning in person or by mail, you must submit a typed resume listing the following (please bring two copies if you are auditioning on two instruments):

- Your full name (including middle name)
- Address
- Phone number
- · E-mail address
- Primary instrument
- · Intended major
- First-year or transfer status
- Previous music study in school as well as private music study. Include the name of your teachers or classes and the length of time studied. Also bring a selected list of works studied (solo repertoire included), where and when they were performed, method books, etudes, etc.
- Voice students should also list any roles or solos in musical theater or featured solos in a choral setting.
- Composition students are also required to submit several representative written original compositions in addition to the audition.
- For a list of recommended audition literature, visit our web site at *vpa.syr. edu/index.cfm/page/undergraduate-admissions* and click on "Music" and then "Audition Requirements".

IN PERSON

- It is to your advantage to audition in person. It is an excellent opportunity for the faculty to share with you an analysis of your professional music preparation to date and your potential success in music.
- Students are responsible for scheduling an in-person audition. We highly recommend that you audition on one of our scheduled audition days on campus or in New York City. Individual appointments are available on campus if necessary. See page 8 for information on scheduling an in-person audition.
- Students may audition with or without accompaniment. Taped accompaniment is not acceptable. An accompanist will be provided only for voice auditions; please bring a legal copy of your sheet music in the proper key. Please note that sight-reading will be included in the in-person audition.

BY MAIL

You must submit a hi-fi VHS videocassette or DVD recording of your audition. **CD recordings are not acceptable.** All recordings are expected to meet the same standards for quality and repertoire required in an in-person audition. When at all possible, it is best to audition in person, as only those students will be considered for Setnor School of Music Scholarship Awards. Please note that all materials must be sent to the Office of Recruitment and Admissions, College of Visual and Performing Arts, Syracuse University, 200 Crouse College, Syracuse NY 13244-1010. **Do not send these materials with your application.**

- The recording must be on a highquality videocassette on the standard VHS format or a high-quality DVD.
- The recording must be clearly labeled on the outside with your name (including middle name), e-mail address, primary instrument, and intended major.
- The recording must be free of background noise with appropriate balance between solos and accompaniment.
- Digital or artificial accompaniment is not acceptable.
- Each recording must begin with a statement giving your full name (including middle name), phone number, date of recording, first-year or transfer status, desired major, instrument, and titles and composers of works presented.
- Along with your recording, submit all required written materials (including resume). Transfer students must attach copies of their transcripts. Recordings will not be auditioned unless all required information is included and the requested paperwork is attached.
- Limit recordings to a maximum of 20 minutes.
- Students submitting a recorded audition will be required to re-audition for placement after arriving at Syracuse University. Students are expected to perform at the level indicated on their recorded auditions or they may be advised to change their major at the end of the semester.

All applicants for admission to Syracuse University who are not United States citizens or United States permanent residents ("green card" holders) are required to complete the information on the next page. United States citizens or United States permanent residents are not required to do so.

This is necessary for all non-immigrant applicants who need Syracuse University to issue the document (I-20 form) that will enable you to apply for an F-1 Student Visa. If you are on another non-immigrant visa and will remain on that visa during your studies, you do not have to submit financial documentation. Please be sure to indicate on the first page of the application the type of visa you now hold.

In addition to completing the financial information part of the application, you must also show proof of sufficient funding* (\$47,825, see breakdown under "Expenses"). For an explanation of acceptable proof of funding, please see page 30.

Students who are academically admissible to Syracuse University but do not have proof of sufficient funds will be notified. An official admission letter and forms needed to get a student visa cannot be issued until acceptable financial documents have been received.

Keep all financial documents sent to Syracuse. You will need this information when you apply to the U.S. Consulate for your visa. Please think about the *total* cost of your education in this country. You will need further resources for additional years, and you cannot depend upon the University or upon working in this country to meet your educational expenses. You must have enough funds to pay for your entire education plus travel, clothing, and vacations.

The United States government does *not* permit international students to work during their first calendar year in this country. It is very difficult to get permission to work during the summer unless there is substantial proof of economic necessity caused by a change in financial sponsorship. If permission is granted, you must find your own employment.

In addition to the listed expenses, international students must plan on expenses for the winter break and summer months. These additional personal and living expenses are anticipated at \$3,500. If you are returning to your home country or are traveling to another location, you need to anticipate those travel expenses.

Attendance at summer sessions is voluntary and requires an additional tuition charge. The usual course load is six credits for each of the two summer sessions.

Merit Scholarships for International Students (Non-U.S. Citizens or Non-U.S. Permanent Residents)

All students who apply for admission are considered for merit scholarships, which are awarded regardless of need. Awards are granted based on a student's academic credentials at the time of application and are awarded soon after notification of admission.

Merit-based scholarships are awarded to entering first-year students in the form of Founders' Scholarships, Chancellor's Scholarships, and Dean's Scholarships.

Syracuse University also awards merit-based scholarships to entering transfer students in the form of Chancellor's Scholarships and Dean's Scholarships.

These scholarships are renewable each year as long as the student maintains a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale.

However, international students at Syracuse University are not eligible for need-based financial aid from the United States federal government or Syracuse University.

Payment Plans

Monthly Payment Plan

Syracuse University offers a Monthly Payment Plan that spreads charges for each semester over monthly installments. There is a nonrefundable application fee of \$60 for participation in this plan. The fee will be included in the first month's bill. You do not have to send in the fee with the application.

Prepaid Tuition Plan

Syracuse University's Prepaid Tuition Plan allows first-year students who are not receiving financial aid to prepay four years of undergraduate tuition charges at the initial fall semester rate. The prepayment is due by the August 1 preceding the initial fall semester.
