1. This contest is open to **ALL** students in grades 7 and 8 enrolled in public schools. Each student is invited to submit one short story to his/her teacher, who will select **no more than three per grade level, per class period** to send to HEA.
2. The short story **MUST BE ORIGINAL**. It should **not** be a re-telling or an adaptation of any previously written work. It should be related to Hawaii and be within the scope of the writer's experience. A short story is a narrative that quickly presents a complication or conflict, a climax, and an outcome. It may emphasize plot, people, events, or merely a single episode. It must be limited to few characters and small amounts of description and explanation. It may be comic, serious, or even tragic but should arouse interest and empathy in the reader. Teachers should guide students through the writing process.
3. **FORMAT**
 - a. **The short story shall be no fewer than 650 words and no more than 1,000 words, typewritten on one side only, and double-spaced.**
 - b. **The entrant's name should NOT appear on any of the manuscript pages.**
 - c. **The FULL TITLE should be stated at the top of the FIRST PAGE of the manuscript.**
 - d. **A COVER FORM, giving HEA the right to publish the entry if it is a winner, shall be attached to the manuscript. The form accompanies these rules. Both the form and the rules may be duplicated.**
4. Entries will be scored, using the attached "HEA Guidelines for Judging a Short Story, Revised 11/91." Judges look for short stories that readers will remember with pleasure and respect.
5. **DEADLINE: ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY 12:00 NOON ON FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 2010.**

3. **FORMAT**
 - a. **The short story shall be no fewer than 750 words and no more than 1,200 words, typewritten on one side only, and double-spaced.**
 - b. **The entrant's name should NOT appear on any of the manuscript pages.**
 - c. **The FULL TITLE should be stated at the top of the FIRST PAGE of the manuscript.**
 - d. **A COVER FORM, giving HEA the right to publish the entry if it is a winner, shall be attached to the manuscript. The form accompanies these rules. Both the form and the rules may be duplicated.**
4. Entries will be scored, using the attached "HEA Guidelines for Judging a Short Story, Revised 11/91." Judges look for short stories that readers will remember with pleasure and respect.
5. **DEADLINE: ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY 12:00 NOON ON FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 2010.**

H.E.A. GUIDELINES FOR JUDGING A SHORT STORY

HEA definition of a Short Story:

A SHORT STORY IS A NARRATIVE THAT QUICKLY PRESENTS A COMPLICATION OR CONFLICT, A CLIMAX, AND AN OUTCOME. It may emphasize plot, people, events, or merely a single episode. It must be limited to few characters and small amounts of description and explanation. It may be comic, serious, or even tragic but should arouse interest and empathy in the reader.
